



The Race Committee sent us on course 8 down to Rocky and Edwards, back up to Manly West and East a couple of times, before a final Cannae to Lady Bay and home.



The winds were fickle, and you had to pick the shifts - W, WSW, ESE, ENE and NE with an ENE for the final leg home. The breezes made it a day of repeat starts as we all bunched up at various parts of the harbour with all 5 boats in close proximity on the last time out of Middle Harbour.

A surprised Flakey Mojo took 1st place (thinking they were too far behind to even place). Ten Sixty and San Toy raced to the finish with only 19 seconds at the end - but handicaps - being what they are, placed Ten Sixty 2nd and San Toy 4th; Shear Magic taking 3rd spot on the podium. Ludicrous Mode was 3rd across the line and 5th on handicap.

2022 NSW STATE YOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP SAILING REPORT

Sailing YOUTH

The 2022 Youth Sail NSW (Coaching Clinic & Youth Champs) started bright and early for most Open Skiff sailors with roughly 20 people driving to Point Wollstonecraft Sport & Rec Centre to participate in the coaching clinic that was prior to the Youth Champ Regatta.

We arrived at 8:30 am and spent the morning rigging our boats and going to meet the rest of our class as well as our coaches. That morning we sailed our boats out past the head of the bay where we completed a number of laps around a course of three marks. We also completed a few short practice races. After lunch we were back out for more training, however this time we were split into two groups so that the coaches could teach us separately. Our coaches gave us lots of tips and feedback on and off the water which was valuable.

Day two of coaching was windier and after the morning session we were forced to retreat to the shelter of the bay with the wind gusting over 25 knots. Where we focused on being proactive instead of reactive to the wind.

When we got up on Friday the wind had picked up even more and it was raining. Our coaches took the opportunity to teach a couple of theory sessions on rules and reading the weather. Most of us stored the weather talk in the un-retrievable (*sic*) section of our brains as we went outside to check our boats in preparation for the regatta.

In the morning we began to get ready for the long day ahead and tried to eat our daily intake of food as we

knew that we would be on the water most of the day. In total we were on the water for about four hours and completed three races. Our course was a long sail out into the middle of the lake. With so many different classes of boats it was a hustle out there and a long wait to get all the races underway. The conditions were light initially, but it started to blow and got a bit crazy for a while before easing off again.

The next day was similar, we sailed out to the middle of the lake and managed to fit in four races. One of the more entertaining moments was when a Manly Junior boat got stuck on the start line and as we raced past them for our start we could hear the skipper and crew yelling at each other to start moving. This was followed by Toby capsizing many times as he tried to do a wheelie on his boat.

On Monday we woke to find that there was not a breath of wind. However, we got ready and were poised to go out. I spent the morning sitting on the wharf listening to the radio on the boats trying to work out if we would go out or not and watching Toby fish and Jamie collect Razorfish. I also took it in turns with Louis to ride around on Toby's Ebike. At about 1:30pm we heard on the radio that we would be going out for two races. The first race was won by Orlando from New Zealand, the second race was won by a considerable margin by Toby.

Once we had come in we packed up ready to leave and waited for the prize giving to start. The final results were Ewan in 1st place, Addi in 2nd place and me in 3rd place. It was a fun regatta and I hope it runs again next year.

BIO on Jonah:

Jonah is one of Manly Yacht Club Juniors' top sailors. Jonah came third at the recent NSW Sailing State Youth Championship consistently sailing in the top 4 in a tight fleet which included Australia's top O'pen Skiff sailor and two "gun sailors" from Manly Sailing Club in New Zealand. Despite the weather throwing everything at the fleet including wind the first day, fluky breeze the second day and a late start on the last day waiting for a breeze, Jonah did his thing and finished in the front of the fleet every race.

Jonah is mixing it up this season with the Juniors and will be coaching, competing in the O'pen Skiff Club Championship and teaming up to sail a Flying 11. As a coach it turns out Jonah wants to have fun and came up with using his RIB's bailer to spray the fleet with water.













nine boats ventured down the harbour, around Shark and Clark Islands, past the Opera House; under the bridge; and up the Paramatta River to round all 7 islands of the course.

The nine boats started individually with a 45-minute start time spread from first to last but the PHS handicaps would decide the results at the end of the day. Insufficient numbers meant that the 2 boats that would normally sail in division 2, had the longer course 1 for division 1 to contend with - more entries in race 2 allowed the race committee to move these boats back to their correct division - see marathon 2.

The winds blew WNW all through the race time, sometimes briefly dropping below 10kts, but were mostly gusty 15-25kts. Apart from the 2 "division 2" boats the fleet seemed to stay in touch, passing, then being passed and then regaining ground. Back at the club, it was agreed that it had been a great day of sailing - albeit a bit long for a couple of the boats (and therefore the race committee).

Congratulations Khaleesi, San Toy and Lost Horizon - 1st, 2nd and 3rd on handicap, Khaleesi fastest around the course, followed by Jupiter and San Toy who was closest to the start.

Thank you, Race Committee - Barry, John, Ian, Carlos and Bob - and Bob for double duty as RSA and Arthur with the BBQ tongs. Welcome newly minted Race Director Ian Dennewald.

Our old man died the other day. He lived a huge life. Too much to go into here but seeing how much of it was on the water, I thought I'd share a few passages in pictures.

Alec joined the merchant navy at sixteen. Apart from a couple of sails on a 16-foot skiff and a VJ, he was all ships to begin with.

Later, working for Qantas in South East Asia gave him a chance to get on some smaller

craft. He raced a Dragon in Singapore and a GP14, *Maridadi*, with Mum in Kota Kinabalu. We also had a little half-cabin, *24 Cascade St*, to visit the local islands.

A nuggety 30-foot sloop, *Kinabalu* was his

first boat back in Sydney.







He cruised and raced a Clansman, *Montrose*, for many years – winning the state titles in 1979.





Another career change saw Alec return to the merchant navy, eventually captaining three cargo ships across Asia and South Africa.


SEPTEMBER 18: LASER MICRO REGATTA

COURSE 1 - the shortest course for the shortest light window. 12 boats decided to participate and all 12 returned within 15 or so minutes of each other - well done sailors.



At Manly, we are connected to Pittwater, Crystal Bay, Middle Harbour and Rushcutters Bay. This makes it easier for us to share resources, such as volunteers, advertising, First Aid Courses, regattas, information about Sailing Dates, local grants, etc.

Other areas in NSW are:

North Coast, Mid-Coast, Central Met, South, West, Central Coast.



Each of these regions has a member of the Sailability NSW Executive looking out for them.



Our patron at Manly is Michael Regan, Mayor of Northern Beaches Council. This month, we thank Michael for issuing us with 20 Parking Permits for our Volunteers and Carers on Sailing dates in 2022-2023. He is always willing to help us out whenever we find ourselves in need.

3.9.22.- RAINY SATURDAY WORKING BEE

We decided to go ahead with the Working Bee in spite of the rain, as most of the jobs required could be completed inside, and the regular lifejackets didn't really care whether it was raining or not, they still needed to be checked over and washed.

After a short discussion on the new Child Safe Standards, the 14 who had turned up for the Working Bee split into 5 groups.

LIFEJACKET checking and washing - completed under waterproof shelter outside in the rain.

SELF-INFLATABLE lifejacket gas checks. **TIDYING** of storage cupboards. **REVERSAL** of changes to jib sheets. **TIDYING UP** and checking of First Aid Kit. **HOSPITALITY** cupboard check and tidying.

SAILING DAYS IN SEPTEMBER



7.9.22. A WARM WEDNESDAY

Finally, half-way into September we had a warm day with a pleasant breeze to attract lots of people to our Sailing Day.

We needed our full fleet of 7 303's to get everyone on the water, and all of the cleanly laundered life-jackets were used.

DAVID GIRLING 1942(?) - 2022



It has come to my attention that Life Member David Girling passed away earlier this year. Life membership is conferred on members who have made significant contribution to the club. There are very few members that are still around from David's time at the club, so please forgive any errors in this summary - Maz Radford.

David joined the club in 1971 and served as Commodore between 1975 and 1978. In his professional life, he was an engineer - which came in handy when repairs were required around the club.

EXTRACT FROM THE HISTORY ARCHIVES DETAILING DAVID'S EARLY DAYS AT THE CLUB...



Manly Yacht Club up to 1974

"... activities attracted a large fleet of Stingrays which introduced Meg and David Girling and Ian Mitchie to the club. David became Commodore, Meg entered the Social Committee and Ian became Club Captain and all started fund-raising events such as wine bottling and fancy-dress parties which all contributed to the purchase of new rescue boats and an increase in club funds. The Stingrays were so fast that they needed a rescue boat with a much more powerful motor than the club had ever needed for the smaller dinghies. This rather expensive rescue boat was ultimately instrumental in not only saving the sailors but the whole club."

When David first joined the club there were still a couple of 14' skiffs MJ's and MG's. He raced his stingray "Torpedo" for many years.

David was instrumental in raising funds; and, with then President Mike Mellowes and others on the Board, instigated the lease with then Manly Municipal Council to relocate the club to the Old Manly Baths which, along with our old club, was severely damaged in the devastating 1974 storms.

It took until about 1979 for the old building to be demolished and the move to the Old Baths. A mammoth effort on the part of all involved at the time.

David, together with Life Member Mike Mellowes wrote what looks to be the first handbook - something you all know is dear to my heart. David also introduced the first roster system for the club so that the same "committed volunteers were not worn out by overuse".

David became a Life Member in 1983 just before he left the club to take over a boat yard, moorings and slipway in Gravelly Beach, Tasmania which he ran until 2011.

In 2019 a small group of members formed a consortium to help our Junior Program grow by purchasing 9 Small Rig Open Skiffs (SROS) - formerly known as BICs - which they loaned to the club.

These SROS have been an integral part of our junior program giving hundreds of kids each year the ability to improve their sailing ability and have been critical to solving the gap between our beginner Optis and the Full Rig Open Skiff.

The total project cost for the new **SROS** boats was **\$26,500**.






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
