WOMEN'S CHALLENGE 2025

KEEPING OUR WHARF SAFE

We are aware of the ongoing safety concerns with kids jumping off the wharf, which poses a serious risk to both them and boat users. In response, MYC has taken the following steps:

- LETTER TO NORTHERN BEACHES COUNCIL & POLICE Highlighting the risks and requesting their support.
- **PROPOSED GATES & SIGNAGE** We are exploring the installation of gates at the northern and southern wharf entrances, with wording approved by local authorities.
- INCREASED AWARENESS & MONITORING Our members are encouraged to report any unsafe behaviour to MYC staff or committee members.

We appreciate the community's support in ensuring the safety of our club facilities.

COMMODORE'S REPORT

It's been a while since my last newsletter report so there are a few things to talk about. First up all of the MYC Sydney to Hobart yachts have made it back to Sydney. Unfortunately, not all managed to finish the race and nearly all of them suffered damage during the race. It was a particularly tough race with over 30% of the fleet forced to retire and very sadly there were two deaths along with a few injuries.

When the various inquiries are finished, I will share with you the results and what lessons we can learn from it.



I have no doubt that this year's race will again attract entries from the MYC fleet. Entries have just opened for this year's race. It will be the 80th Anniversary of this race.



Every year we hold a Skipper's meeting so the sailing committee can get feedback from everyone on how the sailing is been run and what improvements and be made to our sailing program. This year's meeting has provided suggestions which the sailing committee will consider and try and implement.



Mainly, a greater number of courses for the RO to select from; using some of the old MYC courses when the club is running MYC only Club Championship races; more summer series races. Overall, the feeling is that the sailing program is working well.

This year's Twilight series has been a huge success with over 40 entries though not all 40 turn up for each race. But, 42 entries is the largest fleet MYC has ever had in 30 years. All credit to the Race Director Lisa for her efforts.

Only two twilight races to go. This Friday,14th March, is the last Twilight Female Helm in the series, and the last Twilight race for this season is on the 21st March, which is now incorporating the end of season social. So, all are welcome to come to the club whether you have sailed or not in the twilights. Friends and family are welcome. BBQ and Bar will be open to 1130 and we have a DJ to entertain us. (It would help Maz to know how many are coming ... we wouldn't want to run out of steaks! ... reply to the newsletter email).



Recently we had to change some of our courses. Particularly for the twilight series.



To give some background here. Sow & Pigs reef was a mark of some twilight courses. Surrounding S&P reef are 4 cardinal marks. Over the years, boats have collided with these cardinal marks causing damage. Because of this Maritime have included a provision in their Aquatic Licence (yes, the club has to have a licence to race on Sydney harbour or an exemption) that clubs are not allowed to use navigation marks as marks of a course. We weren't using the cardinals at marks of the course but the reef itself. But it is fine point so Maritime has contacted several clubs (not just MYC) to remind them of the licence condition. So, to remove all doubt MYC has removed Sow & Pigs from all of our courses. Other clubs have done the same.

High teens and gusting mid-twenties from the south didn't make conditions pleasant for the fleet as they competed in the final 3 races of the series.

RACE 4 and 3 starters in Division 1 but only 2 finishers - *Mondo* over *Khaleesi* with *Absolut* scoring the DNF. 4entries in division 2 and the attrition rate wasn't as high - all finished. The 2 J24 casual entries scoring first and second - *Waterhound* then *Stock Car* with *Kia Kaha* 3rd and the other J24, *Koatic* in 4th spot.

RACE 5 and this time *Khaleesi* bested *Mondo* with *Absolut* scored DNS. *Kia Kaha* surfaced to first place in this race with Stock Car a consistent 2nd spot and Cath on *Kaotic* in 3 place - looks like *Waterhound* had the DNF this time.

RACE 6 was abandoned. Two laps each race - sounds like it was brutal out there!

The final results for the series in division 1 has *Mondo* in first place followed by *Khaleesi* and *Absolut*. And in division 2 Kia Kaha, *Kaotic* and *Cheap Thrills* take out first, second and third. Well done all!

An initiative by MHYC in collaboration with the other clubs on the harbour who all provide resources and race committees for this 2-day event. Ready, Get Set!!! did her part as the finish boat in a new part of the harbour for her, Course "C" west of Clarke Island. MYC Race committee was finishing Performance Class (Spinnaker) Divisions 1,2 and 3; the Performance Class (Non-Spinnaker) Division and the Classic Keelboats Division - a total of 60 boats. That would have kept the race committee on their toes. MYC boats were represented over a number of classes and divisions.

A light day 1 had the fleet starting late; and the forecast for day 2had the southerly coming in at 6pm - but alas, it arrived much earlier and so the decision was made to move the start to more sheltered waters in North Harbour much to the surprise of the Manly Skiffies Flying 11 fleet and the MYC lasers.



Congratulations Michael Rowe, first time helming a J24 (Kaotic) and landing on the podium in 3rd place. Phil Dressler also placed 3rd on Ça Va in Division 3 of Performance Class (Spinnaker). Dean Dransfield on *Escape* also deserves a mention. Second place in the same division and, although entered as MHYC, is also an MYC members so we'll take some credit.

The forecast NNE of 15-20 knots didn't disappoint although you might have thought there was little wind on the start line. Team *Moonraker*, keen to restore their reputation as a race committee, selected course 3 which took the 24 boats down to Cannae and across to Chowder Bay North before heading back to the finish line at Manly.

It was great to see *Esra Tew* re-joining the fleet after a 2-year hiatus; Mark and Jackie admitting being a bit rusty at this "sailing thing". Other casual entries and new members *Flite* (Beneteau 36) and *Younger Generation* (Young 88) joined the fleet for the first time. Hopefully we will see these new members in the Sunday racing as well.

Madama Butterfly crossed the line first (for the third time in the series) but has her placed 7th in the series so far and probably too far behind the leader to reach the podium. Shear Magic finished second only 2 seconds behind the leader, with Absolut another half a minute behind, really making it hard work for the race committee. Pompadi is comfortably ahead of the pack in the series results but with 5 races to go ... who knows?

What do you call a group of stand-ins? Stock Car, Sirius and Fast Company The only skipper present was Arabella from Stock Car


The twilight female helm results showed *Madama Butterfly* to be the winner on handicap in this race, however since there were no females on board, the results have been amended to reflect *Fast Company's* win. The scores are tight in this series with 2 boats on 8 points. On countback *Fast Company* is ahead of *Stock Car*, so the final race on <u>14 March</u> will be really important. There will be a tussle for 3rd spot too as *Waterhound* and *Phantom Menace* are within a point of each other and *Sirius* a half point behind them.

Fastest around the course was Rosie Lee on Farr N Away and closest to the start was clearly Fast Company helmed by Jessica Tavener.

If you are a little confused as to how some boats in the female helm series can be helmed by different people in the main series when it's the same race based on pursuit and handicap results, it's because skippers have not adjusted the helm on Sailsys for this race.




BUOY, OH BUOY MARKS AND GROUND TACKLE ... AND "HOW TO" STOW

When selecting tackle...



- BIG 13mm chain = inflatable
- Rope & SS thimble = teardrop





GROUND TACKLE FOR INFLATABLE MARKS ...

<u>I-1 to I-5</u> have 13mm chain. Attach the clip on the inflatable mark to this chain.

Store this ground tackle on top & second shelf as illustrated.

GROUND TACKLE FOR <u>TEARDROP</u> MARKS ...

Crates <u>1 - 6</u> on bottom shelf - stacked two (2) deep.

This ground tackle has rope and S.S. thimble ends. Clip marks to the thimbles.

Locate teardrop marks on hooks on the **UNDERSIDE** of the beam.

NOTE:- 2 marks on the end hook.



INFLATABLE MARKS ...

Hang from hooks on side of overhead beam

VERTICALLY CHALLENGED? ...

Please use the STEP LADDER ...

Most people should use the step ladder to remove or relocated the teardrop marks and the inflatable marks.

For ease of use – Locate teardrop marks first ... followed by inflatable marks

Step ladder is located just inside the access door to the equipment room.

PLEASE MAKE THE EFFORT TO LOCATE ALL EQUIPMENT AS SHOWN.

Commodore Catherine, also translating to a 3^{rd} on handicap, with casual entry *Stock Car* in 1^{st} place and ζa in 2^{nd} spot.

We are coming up to the pointy end of the series with one more drop, but it looks like the series results are set for division 1 - anything can still happen in division 2!



And with a slightly different handicap for this series the results: division 1 - *Khaleesi, Absolut* and *Kanreki,* and division 2 - *Stock Car, Kaotic* and *Ça Va*.

Tight racing between Double Handed yachts

Saturday's CYCA race to Lion Island was the penultimate race in the 2024/25 Club Marine Ocean Pointscore series.

Ian Smith's J/99 Jupiter needed to sail at its absolute best in terms of strategy and boat handling in order to maintain its lead in both Division 2 and the Double Handed Division against Andy Offord's extremely competitive Sunfast 3300 Borderline.

In a tight tussle, the competition between *Borderline* and *Jupiter*, has been very close all season, with both

boats sharing wins over the nine-race series this season.

Jupiter was joined by new co-skipper Matt Wenke. His addition to the team has kept the Ocean Pointscore alive for Jupiter.

After being smothered by two TP52s at the start, *Jupiter* quickly tacked onto port, ducking *Borderline's* stern and into clear air. Then taking *Wild West's* stern before tacking back to starboard into more clear air for the long tack to the north end of Taylors Bay. By this stage *Jupiter* was now ahead of *Borderline* and kept ahead through the Heads and into a steady 14 knots nor' wester in calm seas.

In what were ideal conditions, *Jupiter* needed to keep in front of *Borderline* all the way to Lion Island, with the breeze expected to swing to the nor' east favouring *Borderline*, which is particularly fast down wind.

Tactically, *Jupiter* stayed east, anticipating more pressure whilst *Borderline* favoured the coast route. The east favoured and *Jupiter* was over 1nm ahead by the Lion Island turning mark. Then the sprint was on for the downhill race back to North Head in the building 15 knots nor'easter.

Borderline crossed ahead of *Jupiter* as North Head loomed, with *Jupiter* keeping in touch with a couple of quick gybes in 18 knots of pressure into the Heads.

Then the final sprint to the finish line in Watsons Bay. *Borderline* crossed 46 seconds ahead, but *Jupiter* had done enough and comfortably clinched victory on IRC in Division 2 and the Double Handed Division.

The *Jupiter* crew were pleasantly surprised when they saw the final results. *Jupiter* came third overall on IRC, beating a couple of much bigger big boats.

Jupiter's co-skipper Ian Smith commented: "It was a fabulous race, perfectly executed in terms of tactics, boat handling skills, and steering in what were champagne conditions."



A "NOD" TO 75 YEARS

Reprint of history articles published in 2013

HISTORY OF PRESENT CLUBHOUSE (the old Baths Building)

In a letter dated 26 August 1974 the Hon. Secretary, Bon Ogilvie, wrote to the Town Clerk of Manly Council stating that –

'It has been brought to the notice of our Board of Directors that your council does not intend to repair and re-open the Manly Baths adjoining our club and that the brick premises could be available for other purposes.'

In his reply the Town Clerk advised that Council had not determined the future of the building but that the Club should make an appointment with the Town Planner, Mr. Burgess, to discuss the matter. Then the Town Clerk invited Club representatives to meet with members of Council in order to discuss the future of the Manly Baths and all structures on the eastern side of Manly Cove.

An encouraging start to a negotiation which is still ongoing...

Development Application drawings to convert the old Baths Building into a yacht club, dated February 1977, were prepared by Brian Wilson and finally approved by Council on 25 October 1978.

These plans showed the full length observation deck on the upper floor with boat storage underneath and a 5m wide boat deck projecting out over the water. There was MJ storage, a meeting room and change rooms at the lower level. Upstairs the clubroom and toilets were shown in their present location and the tiny caretaker's flat where the kitchen and office are now, remained. The street access to the building comprised a new bridge spanning from the East Esplanade to the landing on the stairway inside the building.

A new front entrance was to be established at this point.

Condition 14 of the consent required 'Restricted public access to the jetty being provided'.

A revised set of drawings was approved 26 November 1981. The main changes were the relocation of the toilets downstairs and the space vacated upstairs would become the canteen and bar.

The whole top floor was opened up. However, there was a finance problem mainly relating to the cost of the lower floor toilets and the difficulty of pumping sewage to the sewer in East Esplanade.

Condition 14, pertaining to restricted public access, remained. Council later changed its mind.

Following the agreement with Manly Council to lease the building to MYC and the Diggers Swimming Club the new tenants moved in and began to clean up and renovate.

The \$15,000 the Diggers received from the Skiff Club for their old building plus monies contributed by MYC and a bank loan were spent on the concrete observation deck. (Refer to the Perfect Storm).

Originally the deck was intended to extend across the whole frontage of the building but funds ran out. Phill Geddes was the engineer.

In 1998 a development application prepared by architect Jon Bianchino was lodged with Manly Council on behalf of MYC and the Skiff Club. It was known as DA 15/98 and it is still alive even now.

The design involved a broad launching ramp on the beach between the Skiff Club and MYC; boat storage under the park and on the site of the ex Digger's building; a paved forecourt and landscaping on top; a street level entrance hall to the Baths building, and that was only Stage 1.

Stage 2 comprised a hardstand, later to be called a rigging deck, in front of MYC. It would extend across the entire frontage and project 21.6 m into the harbour and there would be a pontoon beyond that. Bear in mind that in the days of the baths there had been a beginners pool adjacent to the building with a 50m swimming pool extending beyond it out

into the bay, so the hardstand did not seem to be excessively large.

Prior to the DA being lodged with Council there was numerous meetings involving the MYC, the Skiff Club, Council, Marine Ministerial Holdings Corporation (NSW Maritime) and the Dept. of Primary Industry (Fisheries). The MYC successful negotiators were Gene Scott (President), Bruce Davis and Chris Shead.

In 1999 an Agreement was signed between the two clubs spelling out the responsibilities of each one. The Skiff Club would be responsible for stage 1 and MYC would be responsible for stage 2. The cashed up Skiff Club went ahead and completed Stage1 including the new entrance hall to MYC. Manly Mayor, Jean Hay, unveiled a plaque to commemorate and new entrance on Sunday 7 Nov 1998. The new works by the Skiff Club were a vast improvement over the previous Digger's building and the narrow concrete launching ramp on the beach.

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



