The 30th anniversary of the Helly Hansen Women's Challenge, marked a spectacular conclusion to the 2024/25 Sydney Harbour Women's Keelboat Series (SHWKS), with a record-breaking 41 entrants.

Hosted by the Manly Yacht Club (MYC), the Women's Challenge is a weekend dedicated to promoting women in sailing. The event kicked off on Saturday with an action-packed day of dinghy racing, featuring seven Hansa 303s competing in the morning under a moderate south-easterly breeze. Graham and Maz Radford, aboard their beloved committee vessel *Ready Get Set*, ran three exciting races. Catherine Thornton-Rofe and Gigi Merryfull secured first place on *Black Swan*, followed by Sophie Lintvelt and Ros Chow on *Woody* in second, with Jessie Lawson and Alyse Saxby taking third on *Vin*.

In the afternoon, Race Officer Graham Radford with the assistance of Andrew Tattersall and Jane Nixon on *Ready Get Set*, and Colin Cameron with Peter McDonald on *Robbie R* continued the excitement with two races for the nine O'pen Skiffs and three races for ten ILCAs (Lasers), including four women from Vaucluse who sailed across the harbour on Friday evening to compete. Maya Hodzic claimed first place in the O'pen Skiffs, followed by Emma Tallis in second and Felicity Cameron in third. In the 4.7 Laser (ILCA4) class, Danielle Chapman took the top spot, with Anna-Lei Petit in second and Georgina Rodowicz from Vaucluse finishing third. In the Laser Radial (ILCA6) category, Sammy Byron secured first place, followed by Catherine Thornton-Rofe in second and Veronique Morgan-Smith in third.

Sunday saw the fifth and final race of the SHWKS, a series hosted monthly by various yacht clubs, including MHYC, CYCA, RSYS, RANSA, and MYC. The 10-knot east-south-easterly breeze provided ideal conditions, particularly for teams that don't regularly sail together.

MYC President Lisa Callaghan shone on the day, winning Division 1 Overall and the All-Female category aboard her co-owned Sydney 38, *Mondo*. Teresa Ukrainetz claimed second place overall and first in the Female Helm category on the Summit King 40 *Jambo* and second overall. Celina Rumblelow skippered the Mumm 36 *Georgia Express* to third overall and second place All female. *Sirius* (Catherine Wood) claimed second spot in the Female Helm category with *Absolute* (Veronique Morgan Smith) third.

Callaghan was thrilled with the victory, stating, "I think the highlight of the race was getting out in front from the very beginning. We maintained the lead the whole way with consistent processes. It's the 30th year MYC has been hosting this challenge, and we're so proud to be pioneers in promoting women's racing."

MYC's Lyn Humphreys played a crucial role in rallying the J24 class, with six boats hitting the water. She took first place aboard *Ace*, finishing just four seconds ahead of Catherine Thornton-Rofe and her all-female team on *Kaotic*, with Macie Bourke placing third on *Okavango Delta*.

In Division 2, Natasha Miller's J/70 *Jabiru* triumphed Overall and in the All-Female category, followed by Marike Koppenol's Swanson Dart *Melody* in second and Sophie Nelson on *Lively* in third. In the Female Helm category, Lena Rusche skippered the Fareast 28R *Cool Runnings* to first place, with Deb Kelly on *Impulse* in second and Angelica Salmon on *Sakura* in third.

For the overall SHWKS series on PHS in Division 2, *Melody* secured first place, *Jabiru* took second, and Sophie Nelson's Bavaria Match 35 *Lively* came in third. In Division 1, Bridget Canham and her mixed crew aboard the Payne 38 *It Happens* claimed the top spot, while Celina Rumbelow's all-women crew on the Farr Mumm 36 *Georgia Express* took second. Dinah Eagle's Beneteau Oceanis 51.1 *Wilde Rush* rounded out the podium in third.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT (sorry Lisa, bumped you off the front page...Ed)

Hi everyone,

I just wanted to take a moment to say how incredibly proud I am of our community and what we achieved at the Saltwater Veterans pre-ANZAC Day service and social sail. It was one of those days that reminds you what makes MYC so special.

With 140 people on the water, 17 yachts, 4 support boats, and a fantastic vibe from start to finish, it was more than just an event—it was a moment of connection, remembrance, and shared spirit.

A huge thank you to the owners and crews of **Waterhound**, **Mondo, Solace, Ratty, Joss, San Toy, Esprit, Kryptonite** and **Manly Sailing's Force 24** fleet, for jumping in and making it all happen.



A particularly special shout-out goes to **Stephen Teudt**, who flew a trumpet player down from Queensland just for the occasion. The **Last Post** was played with such beauty and feeling that I'm not ashamed to say there were a few tears on deck. It was truly moving.

CLUB LIFE & WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING

Our **Twilight season** has wrapped up, and what a season it was!

We had record entries, growing youth participation, and new connections made every week. The **First Tack** program is off and racing, and we're already seeing those sailors stepping into crew roles. It's exactly the kind of growth we love to see.

Congratulations to Anthony Poole and crew on *Waterhound* for winning the Twilight Series!!!

Behind the scenes, the board's been working hard to get on top of club governance and infrastructure. Some highlights:

- The **Endowment Fund** and **Constitution update** were both approved. These will be circulated prior to the AGM.
- We've finalised a **hold-off mooring policy**, and this will be added to the handbook.
- We submitted the **grant for the wharf repairs** under the Infrastructure Grant and hope to receive it later this year. Then, we will commence replacing a number of pylons under the wharf.
- Transport for NSW has yet to announce the successful **tender for the Scout Hall**. The delay has been caused by the decision to make the Scouts demolish the existing structure first. We expect this requires a DA, so there is really no timeline in sight, but remain optimistic of being the successful applicant.
- Our one-year goals are mostly on track. We've Strengthened Community Integration and increased the number of boats and members at the club. However, we are falling short on Enhancing Volunteer Engagement. We still have a number of volunteer roles vacant, which are currently being taken on by existing board members, so please

put your hand up if you want to help.



TWL20 Winners



The final night of the twilights saw a fabulous turn out of 31 boats. The shortest course was selected by the capable *San Toy* race committee. Unfortunately, only 15 boats made it back home in the dying breeze - *Pompadi* sneaking in with a second to spare before the 20:15 cut-off time. The remaining 16 boats were accounted for, so all of Maz's chickens made it back to the roost, and she could relax!

Mondo steamed in for the win and fastest time, with *Waterhound* some 5 minutes later followed by *Ludicrous Mode* another 2 and a half minutes behind.

Five boats were within 5 seconds of their start times - great effort: *Phantom Menace* on 1 second takes the prize.

After a tight battle for the series win *Waterhound* took the prize with *Sirius* and *Pompadi* in second and third respectively.

Back at the club, the deck was humming, and the food kept coming - thank goodness for emergency supplies! And thank goodness for super team Riley, Henry and Karrie in the galley, Brea in the bar and tender drivers Stephen and Shaun and their difficult task of finding the crews in the dark.



In 2004 the centreboard and MJ fleet were invited to sail in the Women's' Challenge on the Sunday. Then in 2005, the Hansa class joined the Sunday racing. For some years the Hansas battled with the Ynglings on the Sundays to see who could field the biggest one design fleet. The Ynglings didn't make an

appearance this year but the O'pen Skiffs and the Laser fleet put up a good showing. Now it's up to the race director to decide who wins the coveted one-design trophy!



In 2004 the centreboard and MJ fleet were invited to sail in the Women's Challenge in the morning of the Sunday racing. Two MJs, 2 lasers, a tasar and 2 flying 11s made up the fleet. How different, 21 years later.

In 2011 the Hansa and centreboard fleets were given their own race day on the Saturday, making the Women's Challenge an all-weekend event.

Nine O'pen Skiffs and 10 lasers (now ILCA4 & ILCA 6) with 4 lasers sailing in from Vaucluse to enhance the fleet.

MANLY YACHT CLUB WOMEN'S CHALLENGE A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY



2025 marks the 75th Anniversary of Manly Yacht Club and the 30th Anniversary of the Manly Yacht Club Women's Challenge.

Conceived and designed by Ivana Gattegno, with the full endorsement of the MYC Board 30+years ago, this event was originally sponsored by Cristal D'Arques (1995), then Mikasa (2007), before Musto/Sturrocks (2009) came on board. In 2011, a new event sponsor emerged, and the event has been proudly known as the Helly Hansen Women's Challenge (HHWC), ever since.

In 2004 the centreboard fleet joined the Sunday racing. The following year Sailability Manly was included with their fleet of Hansa dinghies until eventually, in 2011 the centreboard fleets were given their own day, making this a full weekend event.

We are extremely grateful for the encouragement and support that has helped this event grow.

FROM A HISTORY ARTICLE - WOMEN IN MYC...

(written in 2009)

Over the years, women have become increasingly involved with Manly Yacht Club. In the early days of skiff sailing, there were no women sailors and the female role was one of "Ladies Auxiliaries", where the social planning and catering was performed by wives, mothers, and daughters of the skiff sailors. As with any club at the time, this was an essential part of the management of the club, but the women were missing out on the sheer delight of sailing.

During the late 60's and early 70's, families started to move into MYC, and wives and daughters began to learn skiff sailing in the MG's, the MJ's, and the catamarans. Of course, they still continued to do the catering for the "après sailing" activities, fund raising, etc. Some of the girl skippers in the MJ's started to make their presence felt in the State and National competitions.

Some of the wives became forward hands on the MG's with some funny consequences - quite a few "domestics" of course – David and Patsy Holmes had an important social engagement one Saturday afternoon for which Patsy had had a very special hairdo and wore a shower cap; although it was a very windy morning, David was never forgiven for the two capsizes which destroyed Patsy's coiffure.

The State Flying 11 Association used to conduct an annual Team's Race. In the late 1970's Manly put together a team of all female skippers (five boats) which was held on Pittwater. By means of some clever sailing, and appreciation of the subtleties of team racing, the girls won, and strangely the event has not been conducted since.

In today's MYC, many women are involved not only in sailing but also in the management of the club, for instance our Commodore, Maz Theaker. Pam Davis (skipper, race management, board member), Ivana McAlpine, (skipper, race management, Women's Challenge, board member), Christabel Casimir (Hon. Sec.), Margaret Lucas, Madam Shop and Newsletter Editor), Sorrell Lambie, Relle Mott, Helen Ebeling, Helen Scott, Jules Lawson, Eli Demeny (Sailability), Judy Richardson, Mary Peacock, (Race Starters/Finishers), Sue Rothquel, Jill Madden, Jennie Wilson, Judy Cole, Anne Cotton, Jackie Morgan (Board member and Sailability), early women – Vanessa Dudley, Elizabeth Datson, Suzy Ebeling, Jeanette Thomson.

We've come a long way ... but there is always more to do!



Thank you Bruce and Graham for securing the tender in treacherous conditions.










A "NOD" TO 75 YEARS

Reprint of history articles published in 2013

HISTORY OF PRESENT CLUBHOUSE (the old Baths Building) - PART 2

... continued from June 2013

MYC began to raise funds for Stage 2 and that is where the new President, Keith Woodward stepped in. He made applications for grant assistance to the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation and NSW Maritime with support from the Skiff Club and Manly Council. In March 2004 the Department of Sport and Recreation announced that MYC would receive a grant of \$23,000. NSW Maritime awarded a grant under the Waterways Asset Development and Management Program of \$44,000. Well done Keith Woodward!

In March the Hardstand Committee

comprising Keith Woodward, Bruce Davis, David Lewis and Brian Wilson agreed that the optimum hardstand, given our current funding, would be approximately 8m east to west and 16m north to south, leaving one bay between the hardstand and the Skiff Club.

This was much smaller deck than the one which had received approval in 1998 and the structures on the deck had been reduced from toilets and change rooms to a sailing office with the accessible toilet relocated within the building.

This was a departure from the approved plans and that meant an amended DA with permission required from Maritime to lodge it. Eventually MYC ceased to pursue an amended DA in the face of opposition from Maritime and the Skiff Club and chose to build the deck under the terms of the original DA 15/98 consent. What the Club could afford at this time would be Part 1 of the greater deck.

Ian Young was appointed consultant

engineer and his revised drawings for a Construction Certificate were dated October 2005. This was after prolonged dealings with NSW Maritime and The Department of Primary Industries which had to issue a Permit to Harm Marine Vegetation and Council.

Eventually the Construction Certificate was issued by Manly Council on 7 August 2007.

One of the conditions of consent required a bond of \$10,000 for the protection of seagrass during construction. Since the smaller deck did not extend as far as the seagrass an amendment to the conditions of consent was submitted to Council.

This was granted but a new condition was attached to the consent to the effect that 'No obstruction is to be erected between the rigging deck and the ramp'. This was aimed at the intended gates at either end of the deck and was in direct conflict with the original conditions of consent.

Security was seen as an issue at MYC and gates at either end of the deck were seen as a necessity.

So the Club had to lodge yet another DA for the gates with Manly Council which was refused. And there the matter rests.



When the MYC board decided to follow up the idea of moving from Stuarts Boatshed into the Old Baths Building the club members were by no means unanimous in supporting that decision. The 'off the beach sailors' objected, i.e. the dinghy, skiff and catamaran sailors. In 1977 I lodged a DA with Manly Council to convert the Old Baths Building into a yacht club and in 1978 that DA was approved. However opposition to the move remained. So I prepared the drawing to show how the club might look in the new premises complete with ramp, slipway (the old club had a slipway) and boat storage.

Notice the old Diggers swimming club building on the right hand side and the kitchen which was cantilevered out from what is now the office on the left. The yacht in the foreground belonged to the late Doug Ebeling and family. It was called Dans La Rouge. And the tall palm tree which grew in a small lawn area at the rear of the club was a favourite place for the homeless.

The opening ceremony for the completed deck, organised by Bruce Davis, took place on 29 March 2008 with Manly Mayor Jean Hay, Local Member Mike Baird and club President Brian Wilson making brief speeches.



Mike Baird cut the ribbon; however, the highlight of the event was a musical performance by the Manly Village Primary School Band. Jim Nixon's daughter Ella was a bands woman. The band played four numbers much to the delight of the audience.

Prior to the construction of the hardstand/rigging deck the Club volunteers had been busy creating a pontoon to provide access to the water for Sailability and the juniors.

The construction and installation of this pontoon was a major engineering achievement by the club.

Keith Woodward designed it and the galvanised steel frame was fabricated at Phil Vidler's factory in Brookvale. It measured 9m by 5m and it weighed 9 tonnes. It was dismantled and brought to the club jetty where all the other components had been assembled. It took several weekends and large working parties to build it.

The pontoon itself was built on rollers and the launch date was set in mid August 2001 to coincide with the king tide. The peak of the tide was at night so it was dark, nevertheless, a large group of club Members assembled to participate in and watch the launch. Bruce Davis arrived with the Rumpus. A long rope was attached to the Pontoon with the other end fixed to the Rumpus. Bruce gunned the engine and the Rumpus headed south and the pontoon slide gracefully off the jetty into the water. Loud Cheers!

The pontoon was officially opened 3 November 2001 by Mayor Jean Hay and Councillor David Barr but Kerri Porter from Sailability, who has cerebral palsy and has intellectual problems, was the star.

Eli Demeny stated "Sailing is one of the few sports that with the right equipment can be enjoyed by everyone, no matter what their physical handicap" and Maryanne Dalton speaking about Sailability and the Pontoon said "for Sailability this pontoon is a dream come true. The time saved using this new system will allow us to increase the number of sailors we can mobilise out onto the water each sailing day".

Davits and a winch were constructed on the deck so that Robbie R, the club's support boat, could be stored clear of the water and a small crane was installed on the pontoon to lift Sailability sailors in and out of their dinghies.

The upgrading of the Clubhouse is a continuing process.

The original flat at the north end of the building was gutted. The kitchen which was cantilevered out from the main building was demolished as was the toilet which was cantilevered out from the southern end of the building.

The Club office and the kitchen were installed in the flat.

The kitchen has been totally rebuilt again more recently.

A new balcony has been built from the observation deck to the kitchen.

The men's and women's toilets were completely rebuilt in their original locations.

A lightweight translucent roof was built over the observation deck and a BBQ located at the end near the kitchen.

Sailability put a completely new accessible toilet downstairs at deck level (DA consent issued 3 Feb. 2004) and showers were installed adjacent to it.

Boat storage has been rationalised.

The main clubroom had internal walls removed (it too had been used as a flat). It has had a bar installed, new tables and chairs purchased, carpets replaced, ceiling fixed, windows repaired and new blinds fitted, walls repainted, new lighting installed and a PA/music system.

The new entrance hall, courtesy of the Skiff Club, has made a huge difference to the access to the club and the functioning of the main hall.

Previously one had to enter the club from the water level and climb the internal stairs to reach the clubroom and observation deck. Now one can enter from the street and the entrance hall provides a reception area.




CELEBRATING 125 YEARS OF FEDERATION NAVY FLEET REVIEW
