PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We're halfway through the year already – and with winter sailing well underway, I wanted to update you on what's been happening behind the scenes and share some **incredible news** about where MYC is heading next.

Exciting News - MYC Selected for Australian Sailing's "Sail Our Way" Program!

We're proud to announce that **Manly Yacht Club has been selected as one of just five clubs in NSW** to join *Australian Sailing's new three-year* "Sail Our Way" program. This is a big deal – and a recognition of the strength and potential of our club.

This program allows Australian Sailing to partner directly with selected clubs to support coach development, strengthen club programs, and ultimately improve participation and retention across the board.

The key focus? Equitable opportunities for women, girls, and youth.

Our club has incredible women and girls, so it's probably surprising that only 29% of MYC's members are female, below the state average of other clubs.

What we'll gain:

- Greater engagement and retention of members, especially our juniors
- Enhanced programs at green, intermediate, and advanced levels
- Development pathways for female and youth coaches
- Stronger connections between sailors, coaches, clubs and programs
- Improved club culture and sailing outcomes

This opportunity will help MYC achieve a brighter, more inclusive, and exciting future.

Club Highlights & Thank Yous

- **Presentation Night** was a fantastic success, with 62 adults plus all the kids. A huge thank you to **Jan, Cath, Thomas and all the presenters** for making the night so memorable.
- A personal thank you to the Sailing Committee for presenting me with a special award on the night. Between being your President and Twilight Race Director, I've dedicated more time and energy to the club this past year than ever before – and I'm incredibly proud of what we've achieved together.

This has truly been our biggest year yet:

- Record membership
- Most ever junior sailors
- Most Twilight and Winter Series entries
- Largest ever fleets in the Helly Hansen Women's Challenge
- MYC sailors heading to the ILCA World Masters
- Being chosen to host the J24 Youth Regatta, ILCA Metro Championships, and Australian
 O'pen Skiff Championships

COMMODORE'S REPORT

Another sailing season is over, but that is not the end of sailing for the year with one last Winter race to do.

We have had some excellent successes this last season. The Combined Clubs Sunday Series is up and running with boats from both MYC and MHYC competing together. Our Club Championship and what was known at the Mini Regatta are incorporated into this series.

IT'S BEEN A BIG YEAR!

- The Friday twilight fleet has had the largest number of entries ever (42).
- The Winter series also has the largest number of entries ever (32).
- The Good Friday offshore race also had the largest fleet ever with 14 boats competing this year. Boats from several other clubs joined us. The party/dinner hosted at RMYC in Pittwater was a great success.

WHAT'S NEXT?

In the coming season we will have all of the above but in addition MYC will be hosting and running the O'pen Skiffs Nationals with 70-80 expected to compete and we will also have the ILCA (Laser's) Metros with about a 100 Lasers expected to sail with us.

The Youth program designed to get Juniors into keelboat racing is progressing well. MYC recently hosted the J24 Youth Challenge with 6 J24's racing and 30 teenagers and young people crewing and skippering keelboats.

MYC is an all-volunteer run club. It takes a minimum of 5 people to run each race. The fact that we have successfully managed to run so many series and races with just volunteers says a lot about the culture of Manly Yacht Club that we can do this so successfully. As someone joked at the recent presentation night, "maybe we should ask for everyone who didn't volunteer to put their hand up". We didn't actually ask the question, but I suspect we wouldn't have had any hands go up anyway. It is a delight to be in a club working and sailing with such a membership.

We have had the benefit of some new resources in the club this year which have helped the club run so much better. The Tender service is up and running providing a convenient way for members/crew to get to and from their boats. The new Committee boat *Ready, Get Set!!!* has lived up to all expectations. And we have new MYC marks. They are bigger and at least you can see them now, especially when they are laid in The Sound.

MYC SAFETY BRIEFING TUESDAY, 19TH AUGUST 2025 THIS IS COMPULSORY FOR ALL SKIPPERS

You can attend in person at MYC or watch the video later. Either way you will have to sign a declaration afterwards. It is a reminder on Col Regs and RRS obligations and local rules of Sydney Harbour to do with ferries and big ships. This year we will also be covering some changes to the MYC general regulations of sailing which can affect every skipper. It's not a bad idea for crew to attend too. For context, every club in the harbour runs these sessions, not just MYC.



WILL YOU BE READY FOR SATURDAY 16 AUGUST?













EQUIPMENT AUDIT DAYSaturday, 16 August, 9am-1pm

The day where all yachts competing in any MYC (or any other clubs' event) get their yachts checked to ensure they meet appropriate Category requirements as defined in the Australian Sailing Special regulations.

For MYC to race inshore you will need a current Category 7 certificate, and to race in the MYC offshore events you will need a Category 4 certificate.

Our Chief Auditor (Kimbyl) will be sending all skippers an email on the MYC requirements on the day soon. The main thing that the auditors want, is that you be well prepared on the day of the audit. Don't make it a "last-minute" thing or you will be wasting the volunteer auditors time.

The possibilities of another abandonment were on the cards. Again, there was a flurry of discussions in the race office about wind predictions. With a max of 6 knots, and an average of 4, it could have led to a 'no-go' drifter before or even during the race.

But the decision to pick a course that could be shortened off the club was a goodie. Straight up and straight back was a good call. Even though a couple of times during our work down the harbour, many of the fleet were on the verge of being becalmed.

It was a windward start and getting beamy from the east as we approached the Nielsen Park mark. As the breeze shifted, there was a flurry of last-minute spinnakers being raised off Vaucluse. Fortunately, there were no run-ins with the CYC winter fleet, so this end of the harbour was ours to play in.

On the way back, the predicted sick nor'easter zephyred in, so by Sow & Pigs it was on the nose again. Some yachts forgot to study the Sailing Instructions regarding a shortened course (*PAM* was one of them), even though our volunteer RO's reminded the fleet twice during the race via channel 72.

As per the Twilights, this style of off-the-club triangle starts and finishes really takes the heat off our volunteer army not having to launch support boats. But the same issue raises its contentious head with this style of finish. Yachts finish too far to the west of the projected finish line, therefore not within the finish line! I may consider planting a volunteer on the corner of the Manly Pavilion building with a beer, binoculars and a radio to report those out of bound finishers.

The moral to that story is: finish with the beach right in front of you and you won't get dinged 5 or 10 minutes. Also, in case of any finish time inaccuracies, take your own time and note the boat finishing near or next to you.

All in all, it was a great turnout with a fun prize giving back at the club. We were thrilled to have *Margot*, a beautiful 5.5 from Vaucluse join us and to also see Gemma, from our sponsor Coral Expeditions, on the water.

Now it's onto Race 3 on Sunday 15 June 2025. Clarity Cruz Wines and Brown Brothers' Dessert Wines will be part of prize giving again, plus 2 x \$100.00 vouchers from our sponsor Kieser Physiotherapy will be pulled out of the barrel.

Of course, none of this could happen without our volunteers. Behind the scenes there are probably 10 to 15 people each race that take on a task that lightens the load for race organizers. You know who you are, and we are grateful for your help.








WORKING BEES

There were many jobs on the Manly Yacht Club working bee list ... and quite a few got scrubbed off!



- The 18 Foot Skiff Championships


I could go on until I filled this page.

WINE MERCHANTS

For the next race Sea Breeze is predicting what could be a really nice 10 to 12 for Sunday, albeit a westerly of sorts. It's a tad early to get too excited about a good consistent little breeze though. It does give us the option of sending you all up the other end of the harbour and using more than 2 AS marks during the race.

So, remember to stay out of the Start Area until it's within your 5 min starting time, take your own finishing time (just in case), read the sailing instructions, get the fridge cold, count your lucky stars and remember how fortunate we all are.



Race 5 ... rinse and repeat! So, we are at the back end of the series with one race to go ... Race 1 abandoned for both divisions; shortened course for Race 2, 3 and 4 and abandoned for division 1 in race 5.



To say that the wind was less than optimal would be an understatement. With inverted battens at every tack or jibe, San Toy struggled through the fleet chasing division 2 leader Dave West on Ace. From a distance, Ça Va looked to be anchored off Cannae Point, waiting for the rest of the fleet to catch up and eventually got moving as what little breeze there was, was brought down to them. The slop in The Sound was enough for the crew on Cheap Thrills but Barry persisted until the end, being only one of six boats to complete the division 2 course out of the 12 division 2 boats on the water. This brought him up the leader board into second place, only half a point behind Magician V, knocking Stock Car off into third place.

The division 1 fleet persisted, but eventually the retirement call could be heard from a number of boats. Not for San Toy! Just short of Nielson Point AS another

attempt to "pop" the battens resulted in a decision to drop the sail; manually "pop" and then re-hoist on the other side. As the crew began to hoist, the announcement over the VHF to abandon division 1 was heard. San Toy claims a moral victory for being first to Nielson ... almost.

With 2 abandoned races for division 1, it looks like Jan on Esprit will hold the lead, but Pam and Absolut might still have a tussle into 3rd place while Kia Kaha needs a blinder to topple Esprit.


ELI DEMENY OAM HONOURED

Bruce bolted to the framework and pumped out some of the water, leaving the rest of the pumping and replacement of the timber decking to Peter McDonald. Thanks to all – what a team effort!

Have you ever wondered how the Sailability boats get their names? They are: Clea, Alan Wood, Dolly Wallis, Ralph Newman, Woody, Alex Martin, Vin, Black Swan and Eli D.

HERE IS THE STORY ABOUT ALAN WOOD.

Just a short story about myself, as I am ageing rapidly, and need to get this on paper before it goes out of my memory!

Towards the end of 1995, momentous decisions were being made by a group whose idea it was that everybody should be able to sail, no matter their physical or mental health. They wanted sailing to be possible as a sport for anyone, whatever their physical or intellectual status. So, that clever sailor/inventor Chris Mitchell put on his thinking cap and created me, a Hansa 2.3, which everyone can sail, no matter their physical or intellectual condition.

At my simplest, I am just a simple solo sailed craft with a joystick for direction; the wind for energy, and a rudder for finding direction. I can also be fitted with a double motor, that can pilot me in any direction or point the sail at any point so that sailing is possible.

I was named Alan Wood after one of the principals of the Sailability Branch that had sprung up on Sydney Harbour. Kirribilli was my original home, but this proved too difficult to accommodate the sailors who wanted to sail me, so I was moved initially to Pittwater, then later to Manly, up to Toronto for a couple of years, then back to Manly again.



My first sailor that I knew about was a Hungarian Gentleman called Zoltan, who had been learning to parachute in Canada when he had an unfortunate accident that left him a paraplegic. This meant that he had paralysis from the neck down, with no control from neck to feet. Chris fitted 2 small battery charged motors, one to change the direction of the rudder, the other to manage the sail. Each time that I sailed, my batteries were recharged to ensure that I could come back to the starting point. The switch was worked by moving it with a chin switch.

After being stored at Manly, I quickly found a different sailor, as Zoltan had returned to Hungary and was sailing a 2.3 on Lake Balaton. Judith took me over at Manly with a great deal of help from Allan Jones and David Webb, who kept the batteries and motor in prime condition.

Judith sailed me at Manly for many years, also using the original chin switch, until her other interests took over after a few years.

Then Philip, a young man coping with Muscular Dystrophy took over and quickly became an expert sailor with his use of the 2 motors, kept in good condition by David.

David also changed the chin switch to a hand switch with a sensitive direction finder. This worked well for several years, until Phil's family moved to the Central Coast, so I was moved up to Toronto so that Phil could sail closer to home.

Philip decided to migrate to Denmark, as he spoke Danish, and conditions for people like him are more comfortable there than in Australia.

Once this change was made, Judith took over again, with her original chin switch. All this time, for over 20 years, I was kept in remarkably excellent condition by David, so this has been an excellent partnership. As Judith grows older, however, the sailing has now eased off, and I am missing my sessions sailing on Manly Cove.

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

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


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
