

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What a way to start the year at Manly Yacht Club!

In January we had the absolute privilege of hosting the **2026 National Open Skiff Championships**, and I can say without hesitation: this was a regatta to be proud of. To every competitor — thank you for bringing your energy, talent and sportsmanship to our waters. Watching these boats launch each day, seeing the confidence, skill and pure joy on display, was a powerful reminder that the future of sailing is in very good hands.

This event also came at a particularly special time for our Club. In

2026, Manly Yacht Club celebrates **75 years of sailing in Manly Cove**. Seventy-five years of races, friendships, wins, losses, lessons learned, and memories made. One of the great joys of being President is meeting members who say, often quite casually, "I learnt to sail at Manly". That pride says everything about what this Club has stood for — and continues to stand for.

A championship of this scale simply doesn't happen without an extraordinary volunteer effort. I want to sincerely thank our Race Directors, **Bevan McKavanagh** and **Michael Gallagher**; Junior Sailing Director **Bruce Davis**; Race Officer **Steve Tucker**; the Race Organising Committee, **Gavin Reed** and **Johanna Bergqvist**; photographer **Marg Fraser-Martin**; and the 30-plus volunteers who supported race management, safety, catering, administration, and logistics. And to the parents — your time, commitment and endless support are the backbone of junior sailing. We are in awe of you.

At our recent **Board Meeting**, the Board reflected on a very strong operational period. Highlights included the successful delivery of the Open Skiff Nationals, our highest membership, increasing forward venue bookings for 2026 and 2027, and progress on wharf repairs, which will be completed this winter.

Strategically, the **MYC 5-Year Strategy** is complete and will be voted on at the next board meeting. Revenue initiatives remain on track, while participation growth remains a focus area. Policy development continues across risk management, Club-owned ILCA usage, and volunteer recognition.

From an operations perspective, we are seeing encouraging momentum in venue hire from school and corporate bookings. We are slightly ahead of budget; key financial reporting enhancements have been agreed; and work is underway to draft the budget for the next financial year.

None of this happens without the dedication of our volunteers, staff, committees and Board — thank you all. I am really proud of where Manly Yacht Club stands today; excited about what's ahead; and grateful to everyone who continues to make this Club such a special place.

COMMODORE'S REPORT

UPCOMING CHANGES TO MYC SAFETY DECLARATION

In December 2024 there was a terrible accident on Sydney Harbour in a twilight race (not a MYC Twilight race) where a competitor was killed. Subsequence to that, Australian Sailing (AS) held an inquiry.

One of the issues highlighted in the report was the trouble emergency services had in identifying the actual location of the accident. Not easy to say where you are when there is no address or nearest cross street when you are in the middle of the harbour. A Latitude and Longitude would be accurate but not all boats in a twilight race would have the equipment or the skillset on board to derive this information so that it can be passed on.



But there is a very useful app called Emergency+ app which can be downloaded from both Google and Apple stores.

Whilst it does show Lat and Long, it also shows something called "What 3 Words" which is system which can identify any location on earth to within 3 metres. For example "Currently I am at ///famous.verge.reach". That's easier to say than a Lat and Long especially in a stressful situation. By providing a "What 3 Words" location to Emergency Services they will know EXACTLY where you are and so respond quickly.

I suggest everyone download and install this App, but it will become a mandatory requirement for all skippers to have this App installed on their phones and declare so on the form.

In division, *Mondo* finished first across the line in just over 2 hours but





"What do we do now?"

What a race! First 36 hours were a grind to windward with heavy wind and waves against current creating waves with no backs on them. A sizable chunk of the fleet retired due to the harsh conditions. We felt "zero gravity" moments from our bunks for hours. These "zero gravity" moments followed with a hard landing and a terrifying hull and rig noise. At some stage, the launching and hard landings became so extreme we eased the sails to slow down. Yes, it's a race, but there is no point in not getting there.

Once we got to Gabo on the early morning of the 28th, the wind softened to about 15 knots and stayed in that range for the next 48 hours. With a slight

wind rotation to the SE, up goes the code-0 and we are heading straight down the rhumb line to Tasman Island. Wind slowly rotated through the day and by evening we had the S2 (spinnaker) up. 48 hours of sunny days and starry nights across Bass Strait and North Tassie without a single drop of water in the cockpit. What a change! A lot of well-deserved sleeps and nice meals were had in this part.

At this stage, we were coming in and out of contention for an overall win, but we knew the next southerly change would catch us between Maria and Tasman Island. The change would take place quickly, but we would have to sail to windward again for 3 or 4 hours before rounding Tasman Is. That would slow us down significantly.

Could the forecast be wrong by a couple of hours to our benefit? Update after update, the forecast looked solid and we realised that although we had been in first place with a lead of over 2 hours, that would evaporate very quickly once we reached Tasman Island. We put our heads down and did our best as we always try to.

In the early hours of the 30th, wind started to pick up and gusting above 25 and we downgraded to an S3. Then a most surprising encounter ... We were on port tack sailing dead square downwind and another fully crewed and much larger boat only running with their mainsail was on starboard tack and closing in. It was gusting 27-28 at this stage. After not spotting any boats for 2 days you don't quite believe in the situation that speeds and courses are such that it really was going to come down to a collision if nothing was done about it. I spoke with the other boat over VHF and they asserted their right of way. At this stage, there was only a minute or so of time for us to do anything about it. After getting off the radio, I turned to Pete and said, "*What do we do now?*". We eased the spinnaker and crossed their stern. After correcting our course, the spinnaker reset and blew into pieces. Turning disaster into comedy, the sentence "*What do we do now?*" became an ongoing internal joke to this day.

How do we keep our speed up now? The S2 would have too much sail area at this stage. The other option we had aboard was the A3. To keep sailing deep, we poled out the A3 and kept going. Around lunch the wind dropped a little and up went the S2 again. The last couple of shifts were broken by sail changes and decision making and sleep was disturbed a few times specially for Pete.

When we passed Maria Island, the wind temporarily died and turned South as expected. We set the J3 and started sailing to windward again. I went to sleep at this stage. Wind got softer: "*Carlos wake up!*" and we set the J2. A while later, I was up in the cockpit and Peter just went to sleep. The wind swiftly picked up to 25 knots and we set the J4 and tucked in 2 reefs. That is also the moment we heard Richard's chopper and he took this incredible shot.

Soon after, it started gusting 35-38 and the waves became very steep and short spaced. I recall twice *Crux* dove into a breaking wave and during those brief moments, the only thing sticking out of the water was the mast and a few stanchions. We tacked around Tasman Is and kept going on a long tack to Cape Raoul. Peter got up at this stage and I could not wait to get some sleep and warm myself up. Those were the wettest 3 hours of sailing of my entire life. I woke up at the Iron Pot and Peter went down for a sleep. We set the S2 at this stage and had a smooth straight-line sail to the finish. 7 sail changes in those last 24 hours were intense. I woke up Peter 5 minutes before the finish line as he was completely out. We crossed at 23:49 on the 30th in 6th place overall.

The messages of encouragement and congratulations we received before, during and after the race from you, our friends and family made the whole experience very special. I can't quite put this into words, but it seems that just before the race I get into a type of full concentration trance. My head is thinking about all the things that need to be in place for us to get to the start line. Then it continues during the race. It seems it only wears off several days after one arrives. These are the moments we receive these messages and although I haven't replied to them on the spot, each one was important to keep us going! Thank you!

Thanks to Pete's family Danielle Grayson, Rachael and Maddie who let me have him for all this time! Finally, Thank you Peter Grayson, the great co-skipper!

As I write, Peter Grayson, Danielle Grayson, Andrew Ayliffe, Kim Dowdney are sailing *Crux* back to Sydney on a very wet ride! What a team!

We were leading at some stages of the race and I did feel the weight of that and a temporary disappointment. At times, it felt like someone was dangling a carrot in front of us. But after a while, when reality sinks in and you have time to process what just happened, I am so proud of getting to the finish line, let alone arrive in 6th place overall, beaten by sailors whose prowess and experience I can only admire.

The Hobart finish line and Constitution Dock atmosphere is one of the most welcoming places ever. However, arriving at night when most had already left was a first for me. Luckily, Silvia was there on that cold and



DODGED A BULLET

After a recent sail, we packed up PAM, covers went on and we waited for the tender to take us in. Nothing out of the ordinary, so all was good.

As usual while waiting for our ride, I ran my gaze up and down the rig. Something wasn't right, as her port lower looked slightly out of place. Where the wire enters the mast, the T-ball end fitting was on a slightly different angle from the starboard lower. Alarm bells started to ring, so I notified my fellow crew mates who agreed something was amiss.

Later that week, I went up in the Bosun's Chair and to my dismay, I discovered her internal T-ball backing plate had failed. The continuity of the lower had been seriously compromised; big time! The stainless-steel backing plate had work-hardened to the point where it cracked horizontally in half (see photo), just above where the T-ball enters the mast. Later inspections found both backing plates had failed.



So, we ordered 2 new lower T-ball backing plates and while we were at it, had 2 new lowers (D-1's as they are called) and turnbuckles made up. Lowers take some incredible loads. It was a lot of uncomfortable hours in a Bosun's Chair, but I think we dodged a bullet.

Note to self: once in a while grab a few handy crew members and get dragged up your rig and have a slow and meticulous inspection of your rig. Also have a rigger check it at least once a season.

Advice if you ever go up your own mast: use 2 halyards just in case. Never attach your halyard to the chair with any of the hardware on its end (i.e.: shackles or snap shackles). Instead, tie both to the chair with a bowline.
