Series winner Muir Watson. All skippers and their crews sailed consistently well throughout the season.

Fun facts about our twilight season – 33 Series entrants raced in 22 twilights 901 meals were consumed:

- 645 meat meals

- 46 free meals to race committees

Over the season there were 431 boats on the racecourse.

WHARF UPDATE

I am pleased to report that we have concluded our negotiation with Northern Beaches Council regarding our lease renewal and have moved to the final stage of getting the lease agreement drafted by their lawyers. We have secured a 10-year lease with a 10-year option. Our lease fees have increased but remain subsidised as the Club continues to fund the upkeep of the Club and its facilities. The finalisation of the lease will allow us to progress with a DA to carry out necessary wharf repairs and upgrades.

SATURDAY, 20TH MAY 6pm for a 6:30 start.



"TEAM OKA" AT THE MELBOURNE J24 STATE CHAMPS







At the end of last month, the MYC junior J24 team, "Team Oka" (Will, Macie, Charlie, Ellis and Ollie) flew down to Melbourne to compete in the Victorian State Champs. It was a really good regatta, and the team sailed extremely well.

The first day there were 5 races held, in moderate breeze, gradually rising, which wasn't ideal for our lightweight crew, but we kept with the fleet and finished all races in good placing. The second day there was almost no wind- perfect conditions for us. This light breeze carried us to a fourth place in the first race of the day ($1^{\rm st}$ PHS), a great result for us, and a far contrast from finishing 10 minutes behind the fleet at the NSW States last November.



Overall, we were really pleased with our results - 10^{th} overall and 6^{th} PHS, and our massive improvement since we first started sailing together last year.





A huge thanks to Adam Keyes-Tilley and the Victorian Association for their generosity in providing us with free accommodation, entry and a boat, and a huge thanks to Stephen Teudt who has been coaching us weekly for the past few months.



The fog rolled in thick from both the North and south ends of the harbour during the day with sunny patches in between. Course 9 was set in an ENE-NE-ENE breeze not above 10kts during race time. A very frustrating race with *San Toy* and *Sirius* calling it quits at the Cannae mark with no hope of getting back down to Taylor's AS and home before the shut off time.

The last boat to finish, *Ten Sixty*, squeaked in with 2 and a bit minutes to spare at 16:57:19. First over line in division 1 was *Norton White Corum* and 1^{st} on handicap. Well done!

All boats in division 2 completed the course with *Kaotic* first across the line and *Ratty Tooey* winner on handicap.



There were 147 boats sailing in three fleets. There were sailors from all Australian mainland states and territories, with the most travelled competitor, GGM Helio Araujo, from Rio de Janeiro Yacht Club. Garth, Iain, Ian, Mike and Phil represented MYC at the event, renting a house which was a 10-minute walk from the rigging area.

Weather for the event varied from character building to excellent and from NF to SW.

The first day's racing was tough with ENE winds 22 gusting to 29 knots. The waves were challenging; building over the 11Km fetch from the headland of Port Stephens to Soldiers Point. There were a large number of sailors who didn't make it around the course and even more who were glad that they didn't try. Iain managed to run into a turtle snapping his rudder clean off, though from all reports, the turtle was fine.

Day 2 saw ideal conditions from ENE. The run-out tide proved a challenge with several OCSs and Black Flags.

On Day 3 the breeze went around to the SW, so the waves were down and presented excellent sailing conditions especially for sailors skilled in picking the shifts which were numerous.

Day 4 saw a steadier 16 knot southerly and very good sailing conditions.

The full final results are <u>Here</u>. Certainly, a mixed bag for the Manly sailors, who, notwithstanding the exhaustion, felt after the day's sailing still managed to have a lot of fun back at the house.

Sydney to Auckland Ocean Race 2023 *The Race of a Lifetime*


