decorate the hall without the risk of future water damage.



### OS<sub>5</sub>

This was to be the offshore race race that would decide the final pointscore; with 4 boats separate by only 3 points vying for the first prize; or left, as most sailing instructions instruct us to do but just keep going East, or close to East until one gets to the longitude of 151deg25' East and then come back as quickly as possible. Sounds simply enough, however, the one element that is never under anyone's control, the weather, threw an interesting curve in the direction of the race management committee which needed to make some tough decisions during the morning skippers meeting.

On the morning of the race the sun was shining, the sky was super clear and the swell appeared to be non-existent. However, due to a rather intense low off the southern coast of Tasmania the bureau of meteorology forecast called for 25-33knot SW/S winds and the bureau had issued a gale warning for the coastal waters of NSW. In order to comply with offshore sailing instructions and our offshore plan of race management we were required to cancel the race, since the warning was current for the area where the race was to be taking place. After a short discussion and consultation with the skippers the race committee decided to conduct the race in the Harbour using the long Marathon course, one of our inshore courses.

Twenty minutes before the start the wind picked up in North Harbour gusting to 20 knots form NW, and it appeared that the forecast might be correct after-all. The start was clean with EOS being one of the first across the line, with Carinya, Dances and Two Can closely behind and hoisting their spinnakers as they crossed the start line. The fleet sailed quickly towards Shark Island in reaching and often very shy reaching conditions with the wind shifting by upto 30 degrees at times. First around the first island (Shark) was Dances closely followed by San Toy and Cmist. Copernicus closed the gap to the leaders after a somewhat less than perfect spinnaker hoist just passed the Middle Head only to drop back by 200m after their even less than perfect drop before rounding the island.

By the time the fleet reached the Harbour Bridge the wind eased off substantially and the yachts had to navigate a number of rather calm areas around Goat and Cockatoo Islands. Cmist caught up with Dances with Waves by Spectacle Island and opened up a small lead over them. Dances then found a nice parking spot on the north side of Cockatoo Island and were caught by San Toy and Copernicus.

The west to east crossing under the bridge was a lot more frustrating for most, while San Toy managed to find a narrow breeze alley and quietly slipped away and started to close on Cmist who by that stage were at Kirribilli point.

Cmist ended up taking line honours from Dances with Waves, closely followed by Copernicus and San Toy. However, no sooner than these four crossed the line that the SW came in quite strong bringing in Out There at lightning speed and the rest of the fleet towards the finish line. Congratulations to Out There for a great results this year's pointscore.

And so we bid farewell to another highly competitive season of offshore racing; see you all in Sept 2008. **Greg Zenner**

But even Peter couldn't have saved the day, which had begun with a reasonable soueaster but descended into chaos before the first mark. With the pointscores in both divisions still up for grabs, the competition was destined to be intense, but not as intense as the storm cell approaching from the south that hit the fleet in the middle of the Heads. First came the rain, which was so heavy that boats which had been merely metres away suddenly disappeared into the gloom. Next came the wind, which blasted up into high twenties and scattered the fleet. Dee and Ivana on Melody fortuitously had turned for home before the wind struck and managed to navigate the tiny Dart back into North Harbour and then onto its mooring. (An early entrant for the Holman Trophy?) Finally, the squall passed and then came...nothing. For the seven boats that had decided to battle on (four in Div 1, three in Div 2) it was

a race of attrition. Greg Zyner's new Copernicus seemed to avoid all the holes and headed east to claw its way to the Rose Bay YA mark with Dances With Waves and Wild Life astern and Out There further back. Ian Dennewald on Ratty Tooey could already taste the Div 2 Club Championship. with closest rival Beausoleil having become a storm casualty, and was first to Rose Bay, with those sturdy Bass Strait veterans Carinya and Eos in cold pursuit (I had stripped down to my underwear under my oilskins to keep my clothes dry for the prize presentation and was frozen). The mother of all holes was found by all off Chowder Bay, with Copernicus once again slipping through but Ratty Tooey and Out There shifting back into reverse for quite some time. Finally the breeze came in for all seven to enjoy a nice run home from Shark Island, with DWW just pipping Copernicus on the line and Ratty clearing out to claim line honours in Div 2. On handicap, it was Wild Life and Eos taking home the bacon...I mean, the Danes coffee. As for the main prize draw, well, embarrassingly, Carinya's number came up but the starters deserved the booty, so Hector is now a fully fledged barista.



#### "The Rules of the Road"

**International Regulations** for avoiding collisions at sea.

Rule 12 - Sailing Vessels. (As applicable to this incident)

- (a) When two sailing vessels are approaching one another, so as to involve risk of collision, one of them shall keep out of the way of the other as follows ...
- (ii) When both have the wind on the same side, the vessel which is to windward shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is to leeward:

This sounds simple enough but, recently, while enjoying a leisurely sail on the harbour one sunny Wednesday afternoon, we had a "run in" with a racing yacht.

We were sailing to windward on starboard with the racing yacht also on starboard but to windward of us on a free leg of the course i.e. approaching us at about right angles to our own windward course.

They were aware of our presence and were clearly the give-way vessel according to "the rules of the road" shown above. They could have very easily kept clear and crossed our bow by lifting slightly to windward. However they made no effort to change course or comply with the rules and forced us to change course - at the last moment - by nearly 90deg, to avoid a collision.

They justified their actions during the incident by saying that they were racing! If there is one thing that is certain to get me going it is for a racing yacht to claim right of way, regardless of "the rules of the road", just because they are racing.

Please remember, we have no rights to call "racing" on a nonracing yacht...or any other vessel for that matter...the Col Regs apply.

Sometimes, we may notice a nonracing yacht or other vessel with right of way which may be able to, and does, give a racing yacht enough room to keep going. If this happens, proceed with caution, keep keeping clear, give them a wave and a "thank you"... but never demand or expect it!
