SPEED AND SILENCE.

I remember the first time I saw a Bladerider Moth sailing. I was having lunch at Middle Harbour yacht club when Rohan Veal slid into view. In a light and fickle breeze, he casually hiked high above the water in a way physics shouldn't allow. Gybing back and forth in front of us, he held my

attention like a long tennis rally. Finally, he caught some pressure and accelerated off to the limit my neck would turn. With fork frozen halfway to my mouth lunch was forgotten game set and match to Bladerider.

The foiling Moth is an amazing phenomenon. Such is the demand for these lightweight flyers, (250 built so far) visiting McConaghy's yard in China where the Bladeriders are constructed, I witnessed these heading out one door at the rate of six a week, whilst the larger but equally interesting Green Team Volvo 70 was heading out the other door...

There are two Bladerider foiling Moths. The X8 and the FX. The X8 has been in production since 2007 and is the lighter of the two. Constructed with pre-preg carbon hull, molded carbon wing frame, pre-preg carbon centreboard, rudder, rudder box and foils, and a carbon mast, boom and tiller. The hull shape is a flat bottom with square chines, and its principle volume is in the stern to assist take off. The X8 is

aimed at the high performance end of the Moth faithful, with a hull weight close to 10 kg, and a fully rigged weight all up of around 30 kg's; this is the black Moth most people would have seen.

The FX is its new all white cousin, with the same hull shape and 3.355m length as the X8, (the maximum length stipulated by the International Moth Class) but construction is vacuum-infused, fiberglass foam sandwich hull, with an aluminum wing track, giving it a fully rigged weight with foils of 40kg. Bladerider have launched the FX as a one-design youth boat and for newcomers who want to get into some high-speed sailing.

It's easy to see where a Moth is being rigged in a boat park-you just look where the crowd is gathered. Everything about this boat draws the eye. The hull has a width of only 30 cm at the waterline, (just look at a ruler and check how head-shakingly narrow that is), but when the wings are fitted - front wings are into tubes forward of the bulkhead and rear wings connected by U bolts, this brings the beam up to 2.25 M, so you stop looking at the hull, and stare at the T - foils.

They are big. The main foil is just under a meter long, 117m wide and has a movable flap on the trailing edge. The rudder foil is 830 mm long, 101 mm wide and is all solid - no adjustable flap. A quick glance and you know there has been a lot of thought put into these; Bladerider have evolved the shape so the downward curve in the center of the foil gives greater lift, and the upward curve in the tips reduces tip vortex.

The foils obviously create lift, but they have to work from the 6 - 7 knots of breeze needed to get the boat flying, to the 20 - 25 knots of breeze the good guys sail in, plus all the combinations of conditions in between; light, medium or strong breeze, with large, medium or no waves.

One analogy that comes to mind is that it's like trying to ride a penny farthing bicycle on bumpy off road terrain. There is a lot going on up high near you, but it's what is happening right at the bottom that counts. If it goes wrong it goes horribly wrong...

The centreboard foil works in conjunction with the bow wand. This is the tapered fiberglass rod hanging down from the bow of the boat, which via stainless steel levers and pushrods, is connected to the flap on the aft section of the centreboard foil. The wand hangs down "feeling" the height of the boat above the water, and via the levers and rods, adjusts the centreboard foil flap to maintain the boats height above the water.

The connecting rods distance from bow wand to main foil are set when you rig the boat, but can be adjusted on the water by winding on the ball joint socket head adjuster in the cockpit (see photo).

Bladerider have spent a lot of time working on this system, particularly inside the centreboard. Poking out the top of the board is a small stainless steel knob, like the towing hitch on your car. This is the bell crank, which when pushed aft, works to force the push rod, living inside the length of the centreboard, down. A small viewing chamber is cut out of the top of the centreboard to check these connections are working ok, so what happens is; the boat flies high out of the water - the bottom of the bow wand glides forward - pushrods work adjusting the centerboard foil flap angle - which alters the boats height and brings the boat down. Simple.

The rudder foil is also adjustable, controlled by twisting the tiller extension, which moves the top of the rudder assembly back or forward - changing the foils angle of attack at the base of the rudder.

As I said all this is simple. Simple yes, easy no - far from it. When you sail a Bladerider you have to think about controlling your boat in four dimensions - pitch, heel, heading and altitude.

Pitch. The pitch of the boat (greatly influenced by your body weight fore and aft) controls the angle of attack on the foils, and the drag the foils are subjected to. It also has an effect on the boats lee or weather helm, as the centre of effort can be easily moved fore and aft around the center of lateral resistance on the foils.

Heel. The boat must be sailed flat or heeled to windward. If it is heeled to leeward, the foils will push the boat over and the boat will tip over by itself regardless of your efforts to balance it.

Heading. When learning to sail the Bladerider, the best advice is to get into a reaching position, with body weight positioned in the middle of the wing frame - upwind and downwind take a bit of practice.

And finally the magic word: Altitude.

Once a Bladerider is clear of the water you experience something rare and slightly unnatural when sailing at speed: silence. The boat will go completely quiet, no noise at all, and will accelerate immediately to at least 11 knots depending on the wind speed. What happens next depends on the combination of foil angle and wand coordination, plus your weight position and you have to be quick, the Bladerider Moth is so light and fast you must be pro-active, not re-active, there just isn't time.

Please take the time to thank our race committees who supported our racing habit during the year, in particular Pam Davis, our PRO, for pulling together the club members to form such great race committees.



Sailability awards

Every year we look forward to the presentation of awards recognising the outstanding achievements and dedication of our members in the "Volunteer" "Most improved sailor" and "Sailor of the year" categories.

Volunteer of the year is Vlad Skrescz, who in spite of his own disability, makes a big difference to the sailing experiences of our clients. For 4 years Vlad has been one of our most reliable and willing helpers, turning up most Saturdays and Wednesdays. Vlad is particularly skilled operating the hoist, developing a technique for efficiently transferring those with special needs from their wheelchairs to the dinghies safely and with dignity. Vlad is also a great asset as observer on the safety boat.

Most improved Sailor is Alan Bimson who, on his first outing with us last October, announced that he was hooked! Since then he's had coaching from Bill Spence, and takes every opportunity to get out on the water. In April Alan skippered an Access 303 in the Port Stephens Cup, managing to navigate the course four times in trying conditions. He's also keen to get more involved behind the scenes, which we welcome.

Sailor of the year is Greg Hyde who has been selected to train for a spot in the 2.4 m class to represent Australia in the 2012 Paralympic games in London.

As a former world champion windsurfer (he was an Olympian in 1984) and Australian 16th skiff champion, Greg has taken on the daunting challenge of representing his country yet again and winning gold.

Greg has not let the illness that restricts movement in his right side, has affected his short term memory and resulted in speech difficulties curb his natural affinity with water sports. He's an inspiration to many others coming to terms with their disabilities.

Windsurfing Australia is providing a brand new boat that will be kept at Crystal Bay thanks to RPA, and Gill have donated clothing, but most of all he needs a team of sailing savvy helpers to donate a morning a week to get him out on the water.


Hands are needed to assist in rigging, launching, sailing, mark laying and many other roles. Being a member of "Greg's Navy" will be very rewarding for all concerned.

SOME Y.A. UPDATES to ABSORB.

The YA has posted information regarding some important changes made and to be put in place for the coming season. Here are some of the regulations rienforced or changed of which we must be aware when sailing, either racing or not racing.

All vessels, sailing or other, must keep to the starbord side of a narrow channel, not impede other vessels and not cross in certain circumstances. This would include the east and west channels of the harbour from about the Junction Bell to a line drawn approximately from Bradleys Head to Shark Point at Neilson Park. These are busy shipping lanes and for many of the MYC races these areas are involved. Care when sailing in this area is important as is the necessity to be aware of ferries carrying an Orange Diamond. If your vessel is unable to keep out of the way and at a safe distance from such ferry you should signal the fact that your vessel is unable to comply.

If you are unfortunately involved in an accident when on the water it needs to be reported if there is a fatality or personal injury or damage exceeds \$5000.

Yachts equiped with gas must conform to reg. 3.17.4 which includes a sign and for newer fittings a gas detection system. Cat 3ers should be clear about regulation 4.03.1.

A new addition to all first aid kits will be a CPR mask or 6 face shields. Hopefully at least one of the crew on board will know how to use this if necessary, so maybe it's time to consider completing a first aid course. Details for enrolling in all types of courses will be published in the new MYC handbook.

Check out the NSW YA website at www.nsw.yachting.org.au click onto Racing, then Audits and check out the requirements for the next four seasons; there's quite a few changes this year and you don't want to be wasting time or not passed on the day the audits are carried out.

The MYC audit forms will be posted out with your new handbook and will include one or two additional items approved by the Sailing Committee.


