


President's report

Racing rules recap

Rule 17 - Above your proper course???

In the WS-2 race there was a polite dispute between two yachts regarding an overlap and proper course. In other clubs that may well have ended up in the protest room, but at MYC it was discussed at the BBQ instead. As we've been "denied" a protest to learn more about the rules, I thought that I'd instead turn to the ISAF CASE BOOK - INTERPRETATIONS OF THE RACING RULES OF SAILING to see how the rules could have been interpreted. This book is a great resource as it has real protests complete with diagrams, interpretations and rulings (google it!).

The situation was common enough, an overtaking boat to leeward wanted to sail higher than the windward boat and there was a resulting hailed discussion about proper course and opportunity to keep clear. The right of way rule at play here is

Rule 11 "when boats are on the same tack and overlapped, a windward boat shall keep clear of a leeward boat". However this right given to the leeward boat is constrained by general limitations:

Rule 14 "A boat shall avoid contact with another boat if reasonably possible"

Rule 15 "When a boat acquires right of way, she shall initially give the other boat room to keep clear ..."

Rule 17 "If a boat clear astern becomes overlapped within two of her hull lengths to leeward of a boat on the same tack, she shall not sail above her proper course ..."

An important aspect of these limitations are that the obligation to give the windward boat room to keep clear is only an initial obligation and not ongoing. So in the absence of an immediate collision, the interpretation of these rules really comes down to what is a proper course

"a course a boat would sail to finish as soon as possible in the absence of the other boats..."

In case 14, two boats became overlapped on a run along the shore against the tide. The overtaking leeward boat (L) believed that the fastest course to the next mark was to go inshore out of the tide, while windward boat (W) though it better to stay out for better wind. L hailed the windward boat to come up, but W replied that L had no rights to luff. The discussion continue for some time during which L continued to slowly come up until there was contact and a protest. The protest (on appeal) found that L was sailing her proper course under rule 17 and that as the leeward boat had right of way under rule 11. Further that she had given W ample opportunity to keep clear under rule 15. Due to the contact, L had broken 14, but as the right of way boat she is exempt from penalty in rule 14 since no damage or injury resulted. The finding was that W broke rule 11 by not keeping clear and rule 14 by not avoiding a collision, so W was disqualified.

The summary of case 14 states:

"When, owing to a difference of opinion about a leeward boat's proper course, two boats on the same tack

converge, the windward boat must keep clear. Two boats on the same leg sailing near one another may have different proper courses."

This case highlights that a boats proper course is subjective and that two boats may have different proper courses due to different designs, sails or strategies. In other comments I have found on similar cases, it was observed that if there is a disagreement on the water about what is a proper course, then the windward boat cannot dispute this on the water. They must keep clear and their only recourse is to protest and try to establish after the race that the leeward boat was sailing above her proper course (and being first to the next mark is not sufficient proof). Note also that the right of way boat can actually slowly nudge a give way boat while asserting her rights and avoid penalty!

So in the case at hand, I think the cases suggest that the windward boat, once overlapped, should have immediately started taking action to keep clear. Under the interpretations (case 24) of rule 15 she is entitled to do so in a seamanlike way, so that probably means that she did not need to luff up and blow her spinnaker back through her spreaders. However she should have taken some action, even if that meant dropping the spinnaker, then coming up and protesting. Since windward did not sail up, the leeward boat could have protested and could even have gently touched windward boat.

But these interpretations are indicative only and we'll never know how the actual circumstances would have played out in a protest hearing. I look forward to the occasional (friendly) protest to learn more about the rules.

VICE COMMODORE'S REPORT

New Sailing Calendar

The summer season of sailing is coming and this year there are a few changes to the MYC sailing calendar. The race schedule has been built around a 3 week cycle, so that one week there will be a Summer Series race, then a Club Champ race the following week and then either an offshore or other special race on the third week of the cycle. The Summer Series is a handicap start series and is an excellent intro to Sunday racing for boats from the twilights. The Club Championship is a scratch start series with courses that are designed to be more wind aligned.

There are now 2 marathon races, scheduled for months that should have wind (Sep 4 & Jan 8). While the marathons are part of the Summer Series, any boat entering another MYC series is given a free casual entry to these great races. There are now also centerboard regattas to be held on the Marathon days. The schedule for Mini regattas have been moved to be earlier in the season (Sep 25 & Jan 22) so are fun days to get your racing crew on top of their form.

You can see the calendar in the handbook or online at http://myc.org.au/calendar.shtml. The online calendar is a google calendar and can be synced to a smart phone or configured to send email/sms reminders for each event. Please help the race directors by getting your entries in early!

Try Twilight Racing Day

To help out new boats coming to the club, a Try Twilight Racing Day has been scheduled for the Friday evening before twilights start (Oct 14). We will provide an experienced mentor for each boat that wants an introduction. The mentors will take the yachts through a simulated race sequence: getting a start time, identifying the triangles, entering the zone (within 5 minutes), starting, basic racing rules, rounding a mark, finishing and most importantly of all, how to eat a BBQ after a race. If you

Try Crewing Day

In addition to Yachting NSW's Try Sailing Day, we have been invited to participate in their Try Crewing Day. Unlike Try Sailing Day, which is very much an open day for all comers, Try Crewing Day is only open to adults who have booked a week in advance to try crewing for a race. It is anticipated that skippers will need to take out only 1 or 2 groups on the day. It is scheduled for Sunday 11 September, the day after the Lion Island race, so many boats will not be racing that weekend and the event represents a good opportunity for boats to meet potential crew. AMS Measurement


This year the club will be running informal Australian Measurement System (AMS) race series in parallel for all scratch start races (Club Champs, Offshore and Marathons), so boats entered in those races can be given results under both PHS and AMS. AMS is an affordable alternative to IRC and racing under a measurement rule adds an extra element to your racing as boats have a fixed yardstick to sail against and must consider outright speed as well as consistency. Ten members attended an AMS training day and we have scheduled a measurement day for Sunday August 28, the week before safety inspections.

To have your boat measured under AMS costs \$55 per year. The first year the boat needs to be measured in detail, which will take around 2 hours, but for subsequent years only changes need to be remeasured (new sails etc.). For an accurate AMS certificate, boats need to be weighed, but for this year we are using estimated or series weights. This avoids the need to completely strip

your boat down to basic equipment, however removing equipment is still recommended as your boat will measure better (shorter) if it is higher out of the water.

If you are interested in racing under AMS, please keep August 28 free and we will be contacting boats to create a measurement schedule for the day.

What you need to know about... SAIL NUMBERS

Sail Numbers provide a means of identifying a yacht that is racing or in trouble. It is a requirement of ISAF to display an approved Sail Number when racing. MYC requests that all yachts racing in MYC events display an approved Sail Number which has been issued to the yacht's current owner.

For several decades, Yachting New South Wales has issued and maintained a register of sail numbers for keelboats. Yachting NSW members are able to purchase an Exclusive Licence to use a unique Sail Number. The Sail Number is issued only to Yachting NSW Financial Members upon payment of the licence fee and acceptance of the Licence Agreement.

Sail numbers, with a prefix MYC, are also issued, and a register maintained, at Manly Yacht Club. Similar conditions apply i.e. exclusive use of a unique Sail Number.

Ownership of the Sail Number always remains with Yachting NSW, or Manly Yacht Club if prefixed with MYC. The Licensee does not acquire ownership or any other intellectual property rights by virtue of the Licence Agreement.

The Licensee is able to use the Sail Number for as long as the Licensee remains a Financial Member of Yachting NSW, has paid the appropriate fee and continues to abide by this agreement.

The MYC member is able to use the Sail Number prefixed with MYC for as long as the member remains a financial member of Manly Yacht

A Licence for a Sail Number (and therefore the Sail Number) may be transferred only after the Licensee advises Yachting NSW of his wish to terminate the Licence and the proposed Licensee is able to meet the conditions required for the issuing of a Licence and the appropriate fee has been paid.

For MYC prefixed Sail Numbers, the Sail Number is not transferable unless to the same financial MYC member for the new yessel.

Should the Licensee sell their vessel, the Licensee must notify Yachting NSW in writing immediately, stating as to whether they wish to retain the Sail Number for a new vessel, or if it is to be transferred to the new owner.

Vessels with MYC prefix on the Sail Number must notify Manly Yacht Club when selling their vessel.

If the Licensee or MYC club member, wishes to retain the Sail Number, the Licensee, or MYC member, MUST remove the Sail Numbers from the vessel prior to the sale.

If the Licensee does not wish to retain the Sail Number, they must also include in the notification of Sale, the name and contact details of the new owner.

For safety reasons it is important to keep Sail Number registers, whether at YNSW or MYC, up to date. Note that International Class Sail Numbers are maintained by Yachting Australia.

Welcome to the new sailing season - well not quite ... first race is the 4th of September when we start the season with the Summer Series and a marathon to boot! So, I expect we are all doing final checks on what's in the First Aid Kit what's in date and what's not ... flares and fire extinguishers all good to go ... PFDs checked etc. so that all boats will be ready for inspection day on Saturday 3rd September. The Sailing Committee has a great sailing program planned for this season but it won't be a success without your participation.

And talk about participation ... what a fabulous turn out for the Winter Series. Thirty three boats raced with the club in the 5 race series and there was plenty of camaraderie back on the deck afterwards, great sponsor, great organisation, free BBQ, all contributing to the success of the series. Just a little time spent getting equipment and safety gear into shape, making sure things like flares, fire extinguishers etc. and first aid kits are all "in date" saves valuable time for everyone not just owners but especially the auditors who give up their time to carry out the audits and can't afford to waste time checking gear that doesn't conform.

If you have any queries concerning the validity of any equipment or to clarify any of the rules please don't hasitate to contact one of the auditors before the 3rd September and discuss any uncertainty so that there is no problem when the inspection is carried out. (Auditors contacts are on page 7 of the new 2011-2012 MYC Handbook.) Page 36 of the Handbook will give everyone an idea of what is required.

A few changes have been made to the requirements in the last 12 months so owners should familiarise themselves with these changes by checking the YA website (www.yachting.org.au) - Sports Services - Amendments to 2009 Special Regulations. (Page 8 of the June 2011 Newsletter is worth consulting.)

Audit forms should have been received by now along with an additional copy of the MYC Handbook. Please read these forms carefully before filling them in. When completed, both forms, need to be returned to the Club three days before the inspection day nominating which venue you will be taking your boat for inspection. Starting at 9.00 am and closing by 12.30 pm all categories to Davis Marina and only Category 7 to the MYC jetty.

To present your boat for inspection with all the required equipment neatly laid out makes life easy for everyone and once again saves time. Your auditor will appreciate your efforts and will be your new best friend.



$E=m(y)c^2$

Winter racing at MYC means contending with the fickle whims of Mother Nature and random twists of fate, which lend a certain spice to a Sunday afternoon.

MYC WS2 was no exception as the zephyrs took us from Manly to the first mark, the Sow and Pigs, a challenge in itself to round, with light air, an ebbing tide and the cream of the CYC fleet heading down the Harbour, across our path. 'Lady Canasta' went early and sneaked through the traffic only to be swept against the South cardinal mark. Somehow we found a gap well past the Pigs only to be confronted by the awesome sight of the bulk tanker 'TH Sonata' bearing down on us. She was steaming out the Western Channel, with attendant tugs and pilot boat blasting a warning, as we were about to cross her path.

What an absurd vision of relativity. A 107,510 tonne, 243.8 metre long ship, travelling with considerable momentum, matched against a 0.5 tonne, 6.8 metre boat, which was almost becalmed.

Did I mention Relativity? Albert Einstein had a theory on this subject, which he expressed mathematically as: E=mc2. It's basically the relation between the energy (E), the mass (m) and the speed of light (c) squared, which is a constant (most of the time), but it can be affected by interference, such as strong magnetic fields from Black Holes, or a wayward yacht (y) sailing in WS2. Now fast forward to the excellent MYC AGM trivia and one of the questions: 'What does the E stand for in Einstein's Theory of Relativity'? I rather stubbornly answered, 'The speed of light in a vacuum', despite the protestations of the mathematician on the team! Too obvious. Was it the wine or perhaps Einstein's obsession with light, which dazzled me? I ask myself (y)? Colin Cameron.
