A SAILING PUZZLE

A puzzle... A river runs straight from West to East at 10 knots. A 10 mile race is held: the boats sail downstream, from West to East. The first heat is held in the morning, when there is no wind. The second heat is held in the afternoon, when there is a 10 knot wind from the West. In which heat are the faster times recorded?

Answer...

The faster heat is the one with no wind. When the wind and the water both move W to E at 10 kt, the boats drift down the river at 10 kt, with their sails hanging limp. In the heat with no wind (as measured on the land), a drifting boat has a headwind of 10 kt. You can tack into that. Of course, you don't get something for nothing. In the heat with wind, the river does very little work on the boat. In the heat without wind, it exerts much greater force on the boat, in particular on the keel or centreboard. Much of that work goes into disturbing the air downwind of the boat's sails. Cary Budd

NEW LIFEJACKET RULES ENFORCEABLE ON NSW WATERS FROM 1ST NOVEMBER 2011

NSW Minister for Ports Duncan Gay has announced that NSW lifejacket legislation for recreational boaters would today move from the education to the compliance stage.

"Over the past 12 months NSW Maritime has taken an educative approach to help people understand the new lifejacket requirements," said Mr Gay. From today, the focus will change from education to compliance. Boaters found not to be complying with lifejacket regulations may be issued with fines."

Mr Gay said the lifejacket legislation was created in a bid to improve the culture of safe and responsible boating across the State. "Sadly we have had some tragic accidents this year and in each case where people have lost their lives, lifejackets were not worn," he said. "There is no doubt that lifejackets dramatically increase your chance of survival in a boating accident. There need to be enough lifejackets on board for every passenger, and these need to be worn at the appropriate times. A lifejacket can't save your life unless you're wearing it."

The new rules for wearing lifejackets include:

- ★ By children less than 12 years of age when:
- ☆ in a vessel less than 4.8 metres;
- ☆ when in an open area of a vessel less than 8 metres in length that is underway;
- ★ By all boaters in a vessel less than 4.8 metres in the following heightened risk:
- ☆ at night;

- $\not \approx$ on open (ocean) waters;
- $\stackrel{_{}}{lpha}$ on alpine waters and;
- $\ensuremath{\thickapprox}$ when boating alone
- ★ At times of "Skipper Judgement and Direction in "heightened risk situations such as when the weather worsens or the boat breaks down
- \bigstar When water-skiing or wakeboarding;
- ★ When operating a canoe or kayak on:
- ☆ enclosed waters, when more than 100 metres from shore; and
- ☆ open (ocean) waters.

These changes followed extensive community consultation by NSW Maritime, with more than eight six per cent of respondents supporting the majority of the proposed changes. For more information on boating safety, go to: www.maritime.nsw.gov.au

MANLY JUNIORS

MYC Juniors is up and racing at the club.

Every Saturday afternoon we take out 13-16 kids to give them time on the water to have fun and progress their sailing skills and experience. The kids range from 8 to 13 years old. Amazingly, we are already at-capacity (16 kids registered) and we are building a waiting list and considering ways to expand - options include week-day afternoon and/or Sunday morning

We have recruited a regular coach - Duncan - who hails from the UK. Duncan has deep experience in Sailing Instruction and is building a strong rapport with the Juniors group. Already after 4 weeks we can see vast improvement in the kids confidence and skill levels.

We have put the 6 new Optimists to great use - the kids are appreciating their size and user-friendliness - they are really proving to be a fantastic Learn-to-sail and Development class for the age of the kids we have involved. We have learned that the Optis are not so good at handling skipper and crew - single-handed is the way to go. The PJs are still going strong with the heavier and more

experienced sailors enjoying their speed and responsiveness.

We have been mixing things up week-to-week. One week we split the group into intermediate and beginner, another week we had only 3 boats on the water for intensive instruction. Then another week we had them all together going around a course of 3 markers. Whatever makes sense for the kids' development.

Support boats have been a challenge to-date. To maintain standard ratios (5 dinghies to 1 support boat) we have had to beg and borrow a 2nd support boat week-to-week. We thank our providers - Sailability and Northside Sailing School for lending their support boats to us. We look forward to the club coming together to fund a more permanent 2nd support

I would like to pay a special thankyou to the parents who provide so much of their time and energy to supporting the Juniors Programme. Their help in feeding our coach, helping in the support boat and hauling dinghies in and out of the club house is much appreciated.

Finally, the kids have really

enjoyed all the sessions so far and our primary KPI - smiles on kids faces at the end of the day - is bearing up well.

Our other primary KPI - kids returning week-to-week - is doing pretty well also.

MYC Juniors provides coaching to develop kids from beginners to racing ability and runs on Saturday afternoons of school Term 4 and Term 1. It is run by a sailing instructor and parent volunteers.

SUMMER'S ALMOST HERE! SOME EASY TIPS TO PROTECT YOUR EYES FROM HARMFUL UV RAYS

- 4. Avoid over-the-counter eye drops to whiten the eyes. With prolonged use these can cause the eyes to become even more red.
- 5. Have your eyes tested regularly. The earlier UV related conditions such as pterygia or macular degeneration are detected the better the chance for effective treatment. This will not only help to maintain good eye health but also good vision and keep you up-to-date on the latest in protection from UV radiation.

Thirty yachts squared off for the second race in the MYC Summer Series on Sunday 23rd.
The crews were greeted by just a touch of cloud cover over a warm, bright day, which then progressed to even warmer, sunnier and clearer, over the course of the afternoon.

Sadly, the wind didn't improve in line with the sun, and remained fairly patchy throughout the day.

However, all yachts reported that they were visited by the wind at least once over the course of the day.
