

COMMODORE'S REPORT

The pre Christmas sailing season has flown by and has given us a real mixed bag of conditions from glassed out to near cancellations, sunshine and heat to near winter conditions, races abandoned with not enough wind and races abandoned with too much wind. We've had two dismastings but luckily no injuries of note!

Between the extremes, the racing has been great with healthy fleets in most divisions and going into the New Year it's all to play for. So what better way than to see out the year with a sail in the Christmas race on the 23rd of December, which is just a fun race day in which points are awarded for the best decorated boat and/or crew.

Shake off those Bah Humbug feelings and get yourself and your boat decorated for the 23rd and enter NOW!

And while you are doing your entry for the Christmas race (online of course via http://www.myc.org), you may as well do your entry in the extra events that we have coming up in the new year: the Helly Hansen Women's Challenge, the Pittwater YHA Mini Regatta and the Nigel Holman race for rum (Bundy, of course).

I can't stress enough how much easier it makes the organisation of an event if we have entries in early, so we know numbers, can set handicaps, get organise caterers etc. So if you can't volunteer to be a race director, at least make their job easier by doing your entries now. I know you all but a few of you read this electronically now, so you are sitting in front of the computer now, so no excuses not to enter right now! For the Nigel Holman event, we will be charging more for late entries and may consider that for all series next year.





The format of the Nigel Holman Race for Rum (3rd March) has been finalized and there is a NOR available on the website. To give everybody a change of winning the Vat100 Centenary rum (valued at over \$2000), the event will be both an inshore and an offshore race. All entrants go into the barrel and place getters go into the barrel more, for a chance to win the rum in a draw. Raffle tickets can also be purchased at \$50 for an extra chance and all the proceeds of the event will be going towards a new support boat, for the whole club, to be named after Nigel. Bundy is sponsoring the event with an extra case of rum for prizes plus discounted rum for the bar. Also MicrOpay, Cuckoo's Nests original sponsor, is contributing \$500 towards the new support boat. Entrants in the MYC offshore series are automatically entered into the NHR4R offshore race, and as there has only been 1 offshore race so far, it is not too late to enter that series and do the passage races to Cronulla and Pittwater as well!

Early in the New Year is the Pittwater YHA Mini Regatta - 9th and 10th of February. This is a great weekend of windward leeward racing for our 10m and under boats and is a great way to test both your boat handing and close combat tactics. Also, Helly Hansen Women's Challenge (24 March) entries are starting to come in, so it's definitely time girls to get yourselves sorted. If you want to helm but don't have a boat, we can do some match making. For the all girl crew boats, there are always spots needing to be filled, so please put the word out to all female sailors vou know.

Note also that MHYC will have a women's division in their non points score race on the 2nd of March, so that's another date to put in your calendar for training.

Planning your sailing for the new year would not be complete without mentioning regattas from other clubs:Australia Day Regatta (26 January), Vaucluse Regatta (23rd February), Sydney Harbour Regatta (9th-10th March), Port Stephens Regatta (15-21 April). Skippers can't complain about unreliable crew unless they have their sailing programs well laid out in advance. WOMEN ON WATER

November saw MYC members participating in Regattas run by RPEYC and the RSYS ... practicing for the Helly Hansen MYC Women's Challenge perhaps?

RPEYC - NSW J24 CHAMPIONSHIPS

Friday - the day before the regatta — boats arrive at RANSA from various points on Sydney Harbour, Victoria and one from South Australia. There is a mixture of crews, skippers, boats owned begged borrowed and stolen — pieced together. And crew all keen — boats sleek, shiny and cleaned. They were all ferried around to moorings outside RPEYC.

RPEYC has a magnificent aspect of the harbour at Point Piper. Essentially an historic building, oozing character, it was comfortable and welcoming. We all sat waiting for the wind on Saturday morning, perched on the veranda, or reading books in the lounge or feet up on the lawn(as you do at regattas!) After a couple of weeks of sea breeze, southerly busters and generally plentiful wind, there was nothing, and grey clouds! (Think it must have been the Mexican influence).


None-the-less off we all went at first puff and bobbed around within a couple of start line shifts until a reasonable Easterly settled in. 5-10knots. So the first day only managed 2 races but hotly contested in the light airs. Dave Suda (Sandringham YC) in Pacemaker secured a win as did Sean Kirkjan (RPEYC) in Sailpac. The racing was set around mid harbour - across the channel windward/leeward, Sean Wallis (Perth) sailing Kaotic was first to the windward mark in race 1 only to hit it - lost 4 places doing penalty turns. Creditable sailing from Ace (MHYC), Vortex(MHYC), Kicking Bottom (Sandringham YC) and El Fidelo (SA CYC), Code Violation (Sandringham YC) and By the Lee (Sandringham YC)to fill the places. Sunday started with a 10 knot sea breeze NE - sun shining- the harbour littered with the usual power boats, ferries, speed bumps etc. Definite western shore lift and turning tide run out – affecting all boats up and down stream especially races 5 and 6. The wind lifted to 15-20 knots NE, perfect sea breeze and great sailing. Downwind legs generally favoured the shoreline and boats mostly headed for the starboard gate. Ferries had a habit of splitting the fleet with many boats gaining or loosing a place because of a ferry or two. All in all, the series was predominantly clearly contested which is great to see. So after 6 races I think we could all feel our arms, shoulders and hands and wore a generous amount of sea spray and wind burn. But for the most part everyone was smiling.

Congratulations to Dave Suda and the Pacemaker crew who deservedly won the NSW title again. To Sean Kirkjan and crew a fabulous 2nd and Sean Wallis and crew in Kaotic (Arthur Crothers) rolled in third. Handicap winner was Jagged Edge (Leon Ratner REPYC), 2nd By The Lee (Brenden Lee Sandringham YC) and 3rd Whisper (Janette Syme with fab all girl crew MYC).

Many thanks to NSW committee especially Sean Kirkjan for organizing a great regatta – see you next year same time same place!



The Manly Yacht Club juniors have almost finished the spring half of the season - the racing has been completed and we have one cruisy day left on the 2012 calendar.

Our plan for the season has been to run 10 races, 5 before Christmas and 5 in the New Year. On the non-racing days we run either practice sessions or "cruise" days where we do an excursion to Little Manly, Quarantine, or, perhaps further a field.

From the 10 races, we score 3 series:

- A 5 race handicap "spring series"
- A 5 race handicap "autumn series"
- A 10 race club championship

(For each of the 4 boat classes: Manly Juniors, Pittwater Juniors, Optimists and Flying 11).

The last few weeks have seen us pack in the races in order to complete the 5 before Christmas. The kids have risen to the challenge of racing well - those who participated last season have refined their skills, but many have had to learn rules, rights of way, and start sequences for the first time. The climax was race 5 on the 8th of December, when we had 21 children racing on 17 boats. A Nor'easter gusting to 17kts made for challenging conditions, plenty to test tacking skills, spinnaker handling, not to mention all out perseverance. Despite this, 13 of the 17 starters completed the race.

The PJ class is thriving - these boats seems very well suited to the ages and skills of our juniors. We had 8 PJs on the water on the 8th - 6 club boats, and 2 belonging to members.

Congratulations to the winners in each class of the Spring Point Score Series: Jack Cooper and Kilean Neal (F11), Hugo Taranto and Noa Grasse (MJ), Lucas Decomps (Opti), and Liam Poole (PJ).

See the current standings for the Club Championship Series which is halfway through.

In addition to the regular Saturday club sailing, we have junior members attending regattas elsewhere:

- Round 1 of MJ State titles at Pt Kembla: 2765 (Firefly)
- Round 2 of MJ State titles at Middle Harbour: 2765 (Firefly), 2706 (Children Overboard), 2747 (The Mars)

The children learn a huge amount by sailing in these big regattas. There's more to come over summer - we expect to compete in the MJ Nationals, Round 3 of the MJ State titles, and a PJ regatta at Bayview.

Thanks go to the kids for staying enthusiastic (whatever the weather), the parents for making everything happen, and of course to the club for its support of the juniors program.

There were no visible houses other than those on the outskirts of Bourke. The absence of people and no signs of development of any kind made a profound contrast to city life.

The weather for the entire trip was great, warm sunny days and clear cool nights with the stars unbelievably bright.

The Barwon becomes the Darling where the Bogan joins it but the Bogan was dry.

Last Month two of MYC's oldest members forsook their ancient wooden yachts and took to the river, the Barwon and the Darling to be exact. They were Jeff Lea and Brian Wilson. Jeff and his next door neighbour Bill were to travel in a Canadian type canoe carrying the bulk of the supplies and I went in my wooden Kayak.

The journey began at Brewarrina where I sat by the river, next to the Aboriginal fish traps, looking after the kit and chatting to the local aboriginal kids while Jeff and Bill did the car shuffle to Bourke, our destination. One young lad asked me where I came from, "Sydney" I said. "Oh!" said the boy "I though you were Scottish".

So the kayak and the canoe were launched and loaded up and we set off with the canoe zig-zagging down the river as the crew tried to synchronise their paddling. There was at this time a perceptible current which was of great assistance. We did 15k that afternoon before stopping to set up camp.

That was when we became acquainted with the mud... deep thick clinging mud which made going ashore and unloading the boats



a nightmare. It sucked your shoes off. It got over every thing and clung to your legs up to the knee. An evening pastime was picking the dried mud out of the hairs on your legs.

The river (the Barwon at this stage) was fairly low and dropping which left this fringe of soft mud at the foot of the bank. Further up the mud had dried out and there was more secure footing. The bank itself was steep and about 10m high. We camped at the top with each of us sleeping in individual small tents.



The river was full of fallen trees. Some lay where they fell. Others had been washed down stream and had run aground in the middle. Sometimes a standing tree would catch the floating debris which would pile up into a huge cairn over 10m high. At times it was quite tricky manoeuvring our way through but we never had to portage.

Once the camp had been set up and tomorrow's water boiled in a huge billy we could relax with a whisky. We had a limited

amount of whisky and red wine which was carefully rationed. Without knowing it I had become dehydrated over the first 2 days and with one whisky and later a cup of red I was totally drunk and had trouble getting into my sleeping bag. Remedy, drink more of the boiled river and keep re-hydrating.

Jeff emerged as the master camper. For dinner the first night we had roast beef done in a camp oven with gravy, green peas and potatoes baked in the embers. The next night we had beef stew. He baked loaves of bread and fruit cakes.

It took a couple of days to get used to sleeping on a Therma-rest on bumpy ground but the effort of paddling plus the effort of getting in and out of the boats and up the bank meant you were pretty tired by 8pm and slept well. Jeff could sleep on a bed of nails within seconds at any time of day. Getting up in the morning took a bit of effort overcoming the stiffness to stand up.

The water birds on the river were tantastic. Every bend in the river revealed another flock of birds including pelicans, eagles, kites, cormorants, ducks, jabirus, ibis and numerous other long legged wading birds.

Startled by the boats they would take off en mass and the water would be churned into foam. It was like a David Attenborough documentary.

Wild life on the banks included dozens of feral goats, feral pigs and two foxes. The native species were in short supply - about four kangaroos, eight emus, one goanna and one snake which swam across the river under our bows. There were few cattle and sheep and even fewer people; two blokes in tinnies and about four young fellows on quad bikes with pig dogs on the far side of the river.

It took us nine days to complete the journey. That includes two half days at each end. An earlier expedition had stated that the distance travelled was about 300k but we reckoned it was nearer 200k by the time we finished. So we had actually allowed more time so we got home earlier than expected much to the disappointment of Jeff's wife and mine. Both were anticipating a longer period of peace and quiet.

Once in Bourke the vehicle shuffle took place again and we spent that night in the pub. We spent the next night in Wellington and the following day in the snow. Yes SNOW. After beautiful weather on the river we were trapped in a freak snow storm for about six hours in the Blue Mountains.

We finished the trip in remarkably good condition for a bunch of oldies. The canoe paddlers got sore bums and I got a sore back which disappeared as soon as I stopped paddling. It was well worth doing and I thank Jeff Lea for his company, his cooking and his initiative in organising the trip.




PEPPER TREE TWILIGHT SERIES REPORT



No 16 of 2012 Sydney Harbour – Bradleys Head Removal of Traffic Separation Scheme

Notice is hereby given that, on or about 1st November 2012 the traffic separation scheme off Bradleys Head will be discontinued.

Masters and persons in charge of vessels are reminded that all vessels 30m or over in length are required to participate in the Sydney Ports Vessel Traffic Service

Further, Port Procedures require that:

All participating vessels navigating in the vicinity of the safe water mark buoy bearing 143°(T), 350 metres from Bradleys Head Lighthouse, shall pass to the north of the buoy when proceeding westward, and shall pass to the south of the buoy when proceeding eastward.

Masters who require to pass the buoy on the "wrong" side for safety reasons, must seek clearance from Sydney Ports VTS well before the requested manoeuvre.
