## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

## **An Open Letter to Members**

There have been a number of situations over the last three years which have caused me to think deeply on the subject of volunteering and the balance between volunteer labour and paid positions. Our efforts to find a person to take on the position of paid club manager have made consideration of this question more important than ever.

I have been involved in volunteer organisations for over 30 years and they have a dynamic of their own quite different from that of commercial organisations.

Fundamentally organisations such as Manly Yacht Club cannot survive without the members volunteering their time for the many and varied functions from serving on the board to helping run races to painting the railings on the deck. In fact no club on the harbour up to and including the CYC could survive without a huge force of unpaid workers.

That said, in my experience, for most such organisations the bulk of the volunteer load is carried by a small proportion of the membership. Some members, often for compelling reasons of family or work, enjoy the benefits of the club but do not contribute to the level of others. And then there are the few members whose efforts are so extraordinary as to have them stand apart from others for their level of volunteering.

The conundrum is that as a club like Manly Yacht Club grows, it inevitably reaches a size where with the best of volunteering there is simply too much work and the club has to consider taking on paid help. The only alternative is to decide to limit the growth and the range of activities of our club

Inevitably those who do volunteer may ask the question 'why should I volunteer my time when this person is being paid for theirs'.

I believe all organisations must either grow or fade ... there can not be a position of stasis which is sustainable.

Manly Yacht Club has reached the point (and in fact long since passed it) where we can survive on volunteer labour alone, either because the skill sets do not exist in the club or because members can not allot the time necessary on a purely volunteer basis.

The board has been considering the situation of paid labour for over 3 years and the question has been aired and discussed at the board and by members over that time. Several committees have taken a great deal of time to consider all the issues and to look at the alternatives. Realistically there is no alternative to the current model of largely volunteer labour with some paid positions.

Fortunately the club is in a financial position to afford this method of operation.

By the time you read this the board will most likely have appointed our first paid club manager (a part time role), an appointment process which has been both considered and transparent.

It is my hope that members will see this appointment as a positive step in the evolution of our club and not a challenge to our proud boast of being a club run primarily by the members for the members.

The strength of any club is in its membership, and to my mind that makes Manly Yacht Club a uniquely strong organisation.

## **COMMODORE'S REPORT**

There has been some great sailing by club members over the break as the year clicked from 2012 to 2013.

Kaotic started the year on a high with an emphatic victory in the J24 Nationals at Sandringham Vic. Arthur Crothers had Ben Lamb on the helm and they got 5 bullets from 10 starts in often difficult conditions to take the title by a good margin.

Prior to that, two club boats competed in the Sydney to Hobart and *Local Hero*, with Grish as skipper, got 3rd in division and first small boat, while Copernicus got 4th in division.

Ten Sixty also competed in the Coffs Harbour race and came not last! So congratulations

The racing is also great in all our MYC series and poised for a good second half of the season. Aida leads the twilight series with a solid run of steadily improving results, but a single DNC covers the top 14 boats and with 6 races and 2 drops to go, it is wide open. The Summer Series is coming to the wire with only 1 race to go and 3 boats virtually tied in first place of div 2 and 2 boats effectively tied for first in div 1, so Czech Mate, Esprit, Melody, Runaway Taxi and San Toy are all looking for a good result in the final race. With 3 races to go in the Club Champs, it is also very tight at the top of both divisions and it will tighten more as drops are applied.

So it all bodes well for some great racing in the months to come, if only the weather would cooperate and give us some good sailing conditions. But it is great to see that even in the torrential rain we managed to get a reasonable fleet out for the 7th summer series race.

We have some even more sailing opportunities coming up.

On the 3rd of March, we will be holding the Nigel Holman Race for Rum. This is a fund raising event to support the purchase of much needed support boat and an invitational to other clubs to come sail with MYC in commemoration of Nigel Holman. The rally uses a one design fleet of Beneteau First 45's and while the racing is secondary to the other delights of Croatia, it makes a huge difference when everyone has the same toy to play with. Just ask Maz, Greg or one of the crew from MYC who were there last year, if you want a first-hand account. (See story Leanne & Jan).

We have a second one design event in Northern Dalmatia this year in August and in September we will again run our rally along the Lycian coast of Turkey.

If you are considering an overseas sailing holiday it is important that one person on the yacht is the holder of an ICC certificate or equivalent. The ICC (International Certificate of Competence) can be obtained upon assessment at an RYA accredited sailing school and it is universally accepted throughout the word.





#### MYC WINS CROATIA ONE DESIGN RALLY 2012

In her final days of duty, Commodore Maz, gathered a motley crew around her and decided to take on Europe, entering into the Croatian one design Yacht Rally. She was determined to go out in glory. Graham, Jan, Greg W, Leanne and Greg Z gathered at attention on our Beneteau 45, "Carmenta", boat number 3. We excitedly looked over her with a fine tooth comb, looking for any advantages we could gain in a one design race.



Naught could be found (no sail changes, no spinnaker), although the Gregs and Graham would make numerous "improvements" over the course of the rally, re-purposing all sorts of unused sheets and halyards to eke out an advantage, not to mention an epic evening of repairing and re-running the main leech line (talk about keen).

The crews met in Split (factoid: the town is built within the walls of Emperor Diocletian's palace), the starting point of the rally. Our competition consisted of crews from Sydney Yacht Squadron, Sydney Amateurs, Pittwater, Lake Macquarie, Victoria and last but not least, a crew comprising our hosts Maggie and Trevor and our Mr Fixit, Tomo. From Split we went to the marina in Kastela to board and provision our yachts - much alcohol was bought and stowed as even our race-ready crew realized there were limits to what could be sacrificed for performance! The first day we had a shake down cruise to the town of Milna on the island of Brac, where everything is made from the local white stone (factoid: the stone from which Venice is built comes from Brac), and backed our yacht up to the picturesque town quay where we dined at the local restaurant only meters from the boat. At 4am it became all too apparent that we were also only meters from the local church bells ...

From then on we cruised and raced on alternate days moving down the coast, in and out of the idyllic islands. **The first race**, St Klement to Vis, we concentrated fiercely and won! We were a bit upset when we were given a red horned helmet to wear on the next race, as punishment for winning by too big a margin! Extra punishment was also meted out by way of handicaps: boats were required to line up at the start according to finishing positions of the previous race, with the winning boat taking up position to windward next to the committee boat — a position with which we were to become extremely familiar!

For Race 2 we sailed from Vis To Hvar (factoid: voted one of the top 10 of most beautiful islands in Europe) in glorious down wind conditions and you guessed it, we won, but this time gave away the hat!

Races 3 and 4 were from Vela Luka to Lastovo and we had a little disagreement about the length of the finish line and we politely let a pretender take the glory (and the hat). Race 5 from Lastovo to Korcula was a bit of a battle for clean air and after some bold manoeuvre we managed a 2nd place. In Race 6 from Korcula to Miljet we became becalmed with the fleet spread out over a wide area. Graham here was magic, picking a tiny wind shift in the distance and getting us moving again. At the presentation (yes, we won) someone suggested that we had just been lucky and Graham put them straight. In Race 7 from Sobra to Kobas tacked too much trying to get around a peninsular, ran out of wind and placed 3rd. Overall, the official results recorded us as 4 bullets from 7 starts.



At this time of year the Adriatic Sea was like sailing on a lake, barely a ripple and about 10kts of breeze, sailing downwind in hot, sunny weather most of the time. The waters are crystal clear and a mesmerizing turquoise blue. On cruise days we could jump straight into the water for a delightfully cooling swim or snorkel amongst the many



Each night we would pull up at a town quay in exquisite old towns, eat at the local restaurants and walk through walled cities that have stood for centuries. We sometimes sailed into tranquil little coves on islands where the restaurants were at the water's edge, equipped with moorings or dock lines from shore, and ready to tempt us with all the local delicacies.

Upon sailing the boat into the marina at Dubrovnik at the rally's end, we felt that apart from taking home a trophy for our sailing accomplishments, we'd gained some memorable experiences (and a few kilos too), amongst great company.



# SYDNEY TO HOBART RACE REPORT By Greg Wilkins on Copernicus

My first Hobart started with a man overboard drill just after the 4 minute signal. The "man" overboard in this case was my HD video camera that had fallen off the boom during pre-start manoeuvres. The crew of Copernicus – Greg Z, Jim N, Alex S, Felicity N, Ken T, Michael D, Duncan M and myself, executed a near perfect MOB recovery, except for the last bit... i.e. the recovery. 2 minutes! Time to forget about the camera and concentrate on starting. Luckily the MOB manoeuvres had left us in the middle of the line that was suffering from some significant mid line sag. With the confidence of the transits we'd taken before, we were able to power up and hit the line at full speed in clear air! Definitely starters prize material.



Unfortunately one of the boats starting a boat length behind us was Brindabella and she soon ran over the top of us and slowed us up a touch. We cursed her all the way to Hobart thinking that she'd started on the wrong line, but she was entered in PHS and was correctly the big fish in the little boat pond. Asymmetric kite up and we were screaming towards the first mark (often screaming EASE EASE EASE!!!), dodge S&Ps, text book drop and we were fifth boat around the mark!

Pity that few of the many supporters out there that day actually saw us and I've received a few photos of the 4th boat around



Out of the heads and onto the wind with 2m seas and trying to get some east before we could turn south. Not exactly our best point of sail and we lost a bit of our good start as one after another boat ran over us. It was at this point that I made my first Hobart newbie mistake! I waved at the helicopter!!!!! So you didn't see Copernicus on the front page of the news because I wasn't sitting on the rail calmly accepting my fate and not getting excited by the moment.



It stayed pretty lumpy that night, but was really nice sailing by mid morning. Sunshine, flat seas and cracked off from a work a little bit. But all was not so good on the good ship: Typhoid-Nixon had come onboard already sick;our fearless leader had picked up an eye infection and Felicity had an almighty migraine that made a veteran of 18 Hobarts appear sea sick in a 30cm swell!

But the weather didn't give us much respite as in one three hour watch we flew the #2 medium, drifter, the #2 light, the asymmetric kite, the 5oz masthead kite and finally the 9oz masthead kite, only for the next watch to switch down to the storm kite. But we didn't mind, because now we were blasting south in >20kn and Copernicus really likes the heavy



Jim almost gave Alex a hospital pass by giving him the helm just as we caught a wave and we surfed to 16kn boat speed which we held for at least 45s. The breeze continued to build to high 20s and we continued to make good miles, with only one nasty knock down that took a bit to get the boat downwind again.

Eventually, as we passed Gabo Is, it was time to take the storm kite down as the westerly change was on us. Unfortunately just as the drop was almost done, a wave caught the storm kite and it was off the back of the boat and it set half in and half out of the water! Ken was caught in the sheet and was dragged into the lifelines which snapped, bent a stanchion and eventually snapped the spectra spinnaker sheet.

Ken let out an entirely undignified scream, collected a few bruises, but was otherwise unharmed?!?!?! We decided that this was evidence that Ken is actually an android and thus we let him have a few watches off to recharge his batteries!

Meanwhile Greg Z's eye infection had gotten worse and both eyes were puffed up and closed, so we called for medical advice on the next HF sched and had to play Chinese whispers with Chutzpah, the race committee and a doctor on the phone, who eventually gave us instructions for some medication that helped. Luckily by this time, Felicity had started to improve and was back on watch, so we were only 2.5 crew down at that point. As a Bass Strait newbie, it was amazing to see how quickly the  $25\mbox{kn}$ westerly built big seas in the shallow water and it was also incredible how many watches it took to cross the straight! Watch followed watch and we were still only part way across - I started to finally realise that it is a long race! My lasting memory is looking at the setting sun through a large almost breaking wave and seeing the silhouette of a sun

Our plan had been to fly the kite as far west as we could in the NEer down the Victorian coast, so that when the SWer hit we could crack off a little as we crossed the straight but not fall off too far to the West and thus get a bit of respite from the seas in the lee of Flinders Island. That part of the plan worked perfectly and by the afternoon of the 29th we were in flat seas, sunshine and asymmetric kite (and laundry) up and congratulating ourselves about how far west we were. And then the forecast SEer hit (like a freight train!) but from the SSE! And now being so far west was not so great as we were a bit pinned on the coast and the Freycinet peninsula was truly in our way. We spent the rest of that evening climbing our way out of the hole we'd put ourselves in and bleeding miles as we did so.



Then the current after Freycinet was strong in the wrong direction, so we could have gone out to sea for less set or hugged the coast to stay out of it. In the end we did something in between. , which was not exactly optimal. The boats that really hugged the coast (like never more than 100m away from it), gained many miles on us.

Finally as the morning of the 30th broke, the breeze clocked a bit more east and we were able to crack off a little and still point at Tasman Island. Soon the photographic planes were circling and this time I resisted the urge to wave and adopted a serious I'vebeen-sitting-on-the-rail-for-4-days posture! Soon after rounding Tasman, we were able to put the asymmetric up and were making 10kn towards the finish. Alex did some ETA calculations and worked out that if we kept it up we could grab 3rd in the division off Wild Rose! So NOW we started to really race!! The kite worked for us all the way until we could see the finish, where we met a 180 wind change with a bit of nothing in between. Our 3rd place had become 4th in ORCi division 3. If only Alex had told us it was a race earlier!

# NEW MANDATORY QUALIFICATION FOR RECREATIONAL BOATERS USING VHF MARINE RADIO CHANNELS

The Australian Communications and Media Authority (the ACMA) today released the *Review of VHF marine radio operator qualification arrangements—recreational (non-commercial) vessels*, the final outcomes paper of its review of VHF marine radio operator qualifications for recreational boaters.

The outcomes of the review are the result of extensive dialogue between marine safety stakeholders, individual boaters and the ACMA, and are based on the ACMA's spectrum management responsibilities. The ACMA will coordinate the development and implementation of the Australian Waters Qualification (AWQ), which will become the new mandatory qualification for recreational boaters using VHF marine radio channels within Australian territorial waters. It is anticipated the AWQ arrangement will begin during 2013–14.

## **KAOTIC WINS THE 2013 MUSTO J24 NATIONALS**

The crew of Kaotic encountered a wide variety of wind and sea conditions at the J24 Nationals held at Sandringham Yacht Club in early January.

With 5 wins, a 2<sup>nd</sup> and two 3<sup>rd</sup> placings to count after drops, Kaotic had the series wrapped up after nine races were sailed in the ten race series to take out the J24 Nationals.

The fleet of twenty four comprised three boats from NSW, eighteen from Victoria and three from South Australia. NSW boats also took out the minor placings with Sean Kirkjian (winner of 4 National Championships) helming Sailpac into second place by a margin of 8.5 points behind Kaotic and Steve Girdis (winner of 2 National Championships) sailing Convicts Revenge in third spot by a further margin of 4.5 points.

#### Kaotic's results for the first days

racing in moderate and shifty conditions were a 15<sup>th</sup>, a 3<sup>rd</sup> and a 2<sup>nd</sup>. After receiving a delayed radio recall in the first race while on the beat to windward we had to set a spinnaker in order to return to the starting line and set out a very long way behind the fleet in 24<sup>th</sup> position but worked hard to improve and finished in 15<sup>th</sup> position (our drop for the series).

On the second day the first race was abandoned when the wind died (much to our relief as we were in the middle of the fleet on the wrong side of the course) and we were sent back to the club.

With the wind returning, two races were sailed in the afternoon with 20+ knots giving great sailing and spectacular rides in a building southerly wind and sea. We achieved two solid wins in the heavy breeze but had a spectacular broach after we relaxed after crossing the finishing line in the first race. A predicted change arrived about 30 minutes after we got back to the marina and sent an impressive roll cloud and 40+ knots over the top as we packed up our gear – great timing by the race committee.

On the third day with winds still blowing hard the race committee held us onshore till they got a window for three races in moderating breezes and great sailing conditions in big seas, making great surfing downhill. Kaotic achieved a further two wins and a third.

On day four in 10-12 knots we changed up to our genoa and with excellent input from the crew managed to head up the correct side of the course and pick some good wind shifts for our first win in lighter conditions. While we had performed exceptionally well in heavy breezes this win was our most satisfying win of the series and cemented our position as National Champion with one race still to be sailed.

While Kaotic has won a number of NSW State Championships and won the 2012 Victorian State Titles this was our first National Championship.



We have been planning our campaign after being beaten into 2<sup>nd</sup> place by one point in the 2012 National Championship held at the CYCSA in Adelaide.

The secret to our success was good preparation (getting fit and losing 15 kilos between the five person crew to meet the 400 kilo weight restriction), good boat preparation (arriving early and getting on the water two days before the Nationals to record our rig and sail tuning which was written on the front of the cockpit enabling us to effect changes quickly), getting out on the course early each day (arriving at the club early, checking the rig and equipment, making any minor repairs then being the first boat to leave the dock) and excellent crewing throughout the series.

The Principal Race Officer Graham Watt and his team of volunteers from Sandringham Yacht Club did a great job showing the fleet the high quality race management that has become his trademark. This has been acknowledged by Yachting Australia in Graham's recent elevation to International Race Officer.
