AUDIT COMPLIANCE CHECKING DAY

31st August 2013

On Saturday morning 31st August from 9am to 12noon the annual boat inspections will be carried out at the jetty of Manly Yacht Club and Davis Marina.

- Category 7 inspections only will be undertaken at MYC
- Category 4 and other Category 7 inspections will occur at Davis Marina.

Times for inspections will not be reserved but boats will be accommodated on the basis of "first in first checked".

The recommended procedure to be followed for the audit would be along these lines:-

- 1. Download two (2) copies of the particular category audit form for your boat from the MYC website.
- Read the form and "Blue Book" regs. for each item thoroughly to ensure you understand all the requirements.
- Complete the 2 forms and initial each item's square (no ticks) for each regulation item as you check each off.
- 4. On completion deliver the audit forms to the MYC office at least one week before the inspection day
- Turn up with your boat on the morning of Saturday
 31st August with gear neatly laid out for easy checking.

The owner/skipper should be on board during the audit and for Category 3 and 4 some knowledgeable crew members should be on board to assist. Have fire extinguishers taken out of brackets, first aid kits open so that expiry dates can be checked, PFDs laid out (inflatables with annual certificates where necessary), flares' expiry date visible, charts laid out and where required storm sails on deck ready to hoist.

A notable change to the first aid kits for all Categories will be the requirement to carry saline solution and low absorbency non-adherent dressings. Travel/seasickness tablets will be required for Category 4.

In addition to the Audit form a **Safety Declaration** form will need to be read and understood then signed by the owner/skipper at the same time as the audit form. This **Safety Declaration** needs to be signed by **all boats** participating in Manly Yacht Club races.

Please remember that the auditor's job is purely to help the owner by checking and confirming that the boat has the correct safety equipment and that it is correctly maintained and stowed. The safety of the boat is the "sole and inescapable responsibility of the owner"- Rule 1.02



AFTER THE AUDIT DAY ...

If only the skipper/representative of the boat was in attendance for the audit inspection it is then up to that person to make sure that the rest of the crew from the boat, and that includes new crew as they join or pass



Most particularly all the crew must know where each piece of equipment is stored and how and for what it is used. This might mean a session on the boat with all the crew present to pass on the information

Remember if you're the skipper you're responsible!

There is no order of importance for the safety items as any of them might be required at any time but common usage things such as the first aid kit, how the VHF works and availability of emergency numbers, mooring points on the deck, where the boat hook is kept, gas turn off points etc. should be shown and demonstrated to every crew member on board. Done regularly is very good practice.

Of course every one should be familiar with a "Man Overboard" drill, once again regularly practised and carried out with each new crew member to come aboard.

The sailing season is over! Long live the new sailing season!!!!

The online entry system is now open (via http://myc.org.au) and we already have several entries in the Club Champs and Summer Series. Please enter early (aka NOW!) as avoiding the last minute rush is a big help for race directors.

I'm sure boat owners are already preparing for inspection day, **Saturday**, **31**st **August**, and hopefully will get some of the parts they need cheaply from the Flotsam and Jetsam day on **Saturday**, **17**th **September**, at the club.

Crew members should also be preparing for the season by helping out their skippers with maintenance and by making sure they renew their membership - remember you have to keep your YA status current to be covered by insurance. If you've not yet received the new season's handbook, then you are probably not financial and need to contact the office.

In our busy calendar, there are several events that attract boats from other clubs to sail with us: MJ States on Saturday, 23rd November; Mini Regatta on Sunday, 9th February; Nigel Holman Race for Rum on Sunday, 2nd March; and the Women's Challenge on 22nd and 23rd March. It would be great if all members could spruik these events to any sailors from other clubs they know - place the seeds in their minds early so there will be no excuses later on.

On the subject of sailing away from home, I would really encourage all MYC boats and members to consider some away events. Many members are currently away at Airlie and Hammo, but there are plenty of other options to consider in your sailing calendar. Top of list would have to be the Sydney Harbour Regatta 8th and 9th March, which is free for MYC boats to enter and is a great event for all standards of racing with a fun social side back on the beach at Middle Harbour. You should also consider Sail Port Stephens (April) or even Antigua Race Week (April)! It would be fantastic if MYC could send a team (or two) to the Australia Women's keelboat Regatta in Melbourne (June)! So start planning ahead!

RACE MANAGEMENT

With a new season of racing about to start in a couple of weeks, it is time to put together our race management teams. The on-water race management team consists of 5 people, an experienced race officer and assistant on Carlyle, a power boat licensed driver and assistant on Robbie R and a duty officer who mans the radio and phone in the office.

This year the plan is to ensure every MYC boat that enters a series contributes to race management of the club. Skippers will be asked to name 2 people from their boat to do race management duty. Boats that cannot race due to race management duty will be awarded average points, as listed in the MYC Handbook.

Clever skippers will get together with their crew and select dates that will have minimal disruption to their racing schedule. If you know the boat will not be racing for some reason (skipper away, slipping), then why not volunteer the crew to help out.

Alternatively, if you are racing in only one series, why not volunteer for the series you are not sailing in.

Remember that there are non-sailing roles, both on Friday night and Sunday, so you may have a non-sailing family member who would like to help out when you are sailing.

No experience required, but we do ask those using the club boats complete the online powerboat course, which takes about 10 minutes.

Check out the calendar, be creative and get 2 people from your boat on the roster, ASAP. The alternative will be that your boat may have to give up sailing to fulfil your race management duties.

Email <u>dutyroster@myc.org.au</u> with your preferred dates. First in have best choice of dates, so start planning your race strategy now.

YACHTING AUSTRALIA

Yachting Australia and the State Associations have agreed that Yachting Australia will not issue physical cards as a matter of course to Silver and Gold card holders. For this coming season, the Silver and Gold Cards will only be available on an opt in basis for Clubs. We have decided that for the 2013-14 season we would like our members to continue to receive a card. You will therefore receive a card and letter from Yachting Australia in the month after we update the Yachting Australia database, myClub.

All club members, irrespective of whether their club has indicated that they would like them to receive a card for this coming year or not, can access a printable PDF online via mySailor. This includes your Sailor Identification Number, your club name (and other clubs of which you are a member) and any Yachting Australia qualifications you hold (in which case you will receive a Gold Card).

The online card also evidences that a sailor is entitled to race in compliance with the Racing Rules of Sailing (Rule 46 Person in Charge and Rule 56 Crew).

The benefits cardholders receive remain unchanged, including Personal Accident Insurance and access to offers from Yachting Australia Loyalty Partners. You do not need a physical card to access these benefits, but you do need to have up to date information on mySailor.

To ensure a smooth transition to the online card system, all club members are asked to update their details on mySailor, in particular a current email address. A current email address will allow you to retrieve your password if forgotten. If you don't have a current email address in the system and need to retrieve your password you will need to contact the club directly to enter it for you. Your letter from Yachting Australia will tell you what is currently on your mySailor account and how you can update it.

It's important to note that by having a Sailor Identification Number an individual is not a member of Yachting Australia. Your club is a member of, and pays an affiliation fee to, the State Association which in turn is a member of and pays a fee to Yachting Australia, allowing both organisations to continue to support clubs across the country in numerous ways.

The cost savings made by not mailing a physical card will be invested in developing and promoting sailing. In particular it will enable a significant investment to move the Sailing Information and Management Systems (myCentre, myClass, myClub, myWebsite and mySailor) to a new provider and platform, Sporting Pulse Ltd, a major provider of information technology solutions to many Australian sports.

It will also enable continued development and funding of the Discover Sailing Program, (<u>www.discoversailing.org.au</u>) which aims to increase participation in sailing and club membership.

Your Club Committee believes these are the right decisions and support the initiatives by the State Association and Yachting Australia.

NATIONAL VOLUNTEER AWARDS

On the 16 January 2004 the Manly Daily headlined an article with the words "AWARD FOR FREEDOM". The National Australia Bank had named MYC as the NSW Winner of the National Volunteer Awards in the Sport and Recreation category.

The article went on to say "The prestigious title, for which more than 2200 deserving groups were in the running, was given for the club's tireless effort to bring sailing to all interested members in its community."

In 1999 the club teamed up with Sailability, an organisation set up specifically to bring the joys of sailing to people with disabilities.



They sail in Access dinghies and for some that was the first thing they were able to do on their own.

Club volunteers rebuilt sections of the wharf, built a pontoon, a ramp, installed a small crane and provided boat storage. Such was the enthusiasm of the volunteers that one of them succeeded in setting himself on fire with an angle grinder.

Sailability built an accessible toilet, provided new doors for the boat storage area and persuaded Council to provide a ramped public pathway which links the upper and lower levels of the club. Prior to the pathway being built it was a long trek in a wheel chair to get from one to the other.

WHAT'S IN A NAME

San Toy or the Emperor's Own (A Chinese Musical Comedy) first performed in 1899, ran for 768 performances at Daly's Theatre in London. San Toy is the daughter of a Mandarin, raised to be a boy to avoid the consequences of a law drafting young ladies into a female regiment serving the Emperor.

A lady with musical interests purchased land at Wagstaff Point which is on the southern shores of Brisbane Water just past Half Tide Rocks. She named a cottage over the water front "SanToy".

In the 1930s Graham Radford's grandmother purchased the land and eventually it became San Toy Estate. When Graham was a teenager in the 1960s his grandmother would say to him and other family members "one day all this will be yours".

The property remained in the family until 2002, when Graham's parents sold San Toy. This has enabled Graham to build the Radford 12m Cat Rig yacht, and in recognition, he called the yacht "San Toy", sometimes referred to as the "Giant Wind Surfer".





TOILET





STATUS

'Manly Yacht Club's status as a non profit community club came under scrutiny this week in Manly Council'. So reported the Manly Daily on 13 Sept 2002.

This was due to the fact that certain commercial enterprises i.e. sailing school and dive boats, operated from the club and the club was not paying a commercial rent to Council.

However, Mayor Jean Hay and Cr David Barr sprang to the defence of the club stressing its importance as a family institution without a liquor licence or pokies and a home for Sailability.



CAPTAIN BLIGH

A trophy of the Manly Graduate group which was awarded each season was the Captain Bligh trophy. This trophy, which was made and presented to the club by Geoff Neville, consists of a polished wooden case containing a replica 'Cat o'eight tails.'

Criteria meriting the award of this trophy were set out on the inside of its lid. Basically it stated that whoever committed the most dastardly deed was presented with the trophy. A resume of the recipient's misdeeds both true and false was read out at Presentation Night.

Greig Ebeling earned an award one year 'for marooning his sister on the Bombora buoy'.

NALIANDRAH - Article from Manly Daily dated 3 August 2000

'If keenness earned prizes, Manly Yacht Club's Peter Cameron would have an overflowing trophy cabinet. Peter regularly makes the 600 km round trip from Ulladulla on the south coast, where he runs a guesthouse at Mollymook Beach, to race with MYC. His dedication paid off when he won the fourth race in the Peppers Anchorage Winter Cup.

After starting first in the countdown handicap event, Peter steered his California Sunset class yacht Naliandrah around the 5.1 mile course in one hour 28 mins, admittedly not a blistering pace, but fast enough to hold off the 21 yachts in his wake.

Built of jarrah timber in Perth in the 1950's to a design dating back to the 1930's Naliandrah needs a stiff breeze to get going, and Sunday's 15 knot southerly was tailor made for the old girl to claim line honours.

Doug Ebeling scored first in the Super League in his Passage 33 (Lautrec) with Rough Cut and Eos filling the minor placings.'

Unfortunately Naliandrah lost her mast at her mooring in Manly Cove in a fierce southerly gale which blew all through the night. The self furling jib unwound itself and thrashed around until eventually a shackle pin worked loose in the rigging and the beautiful wooden mast split and came crashing down.

Lautrec and Eos no longer race in the Super League having been out gunned by bigger, faster, newer yachts.

SYDNEY BOAT SHOW 1966

MYC put on a BOAT DISPLAY as part of the Plywood Association of Australia Exhibit.

On display were Manly Juniors, Manly Graduates and Fourteen Footers.

The Display also publicised the recently formed yacht division at MYC and mentioned the Bluebird, Primat and Daydream as the most popular yachts.

All of them were of timber construction featuring plywood.

SUNFISH

Keith Smith in his 'Recollections of Manly Yacht Club' recalls: - 'One Saturday morning in the 1967/68 season there was an unexpected and at first wrongly identified hazard in North Harbour in the form of a number of sunfish, the tall dorsal fins which gave the appearance of large sharks.

of brown jelly fish (a source of food for sunfish). Other than their size of up to a tonne they appeared not to be a serious hazard and racing proceeded as usual.

The race was uneventful until Leigh Minehanin MG115 'Aptitude' moving very quickly under shy spinnaker pressure hit one of the monsters.

The impact drove the centreboard about 3 inches into the boat's keel, much to the alarm of the crew. Fortunately 'Aptitude' was stoutly built, and did not have a self draining cockpit, allowing the damage to be ignored and MG115 to continue racing'.

THE 5.5 METRE ASSOCIATION

On 28 January 2008, six dedicated volunteers (Maz, Graham, Peter, Russ, Ken and Tannis) ran a very successful regatta for the 5.5 Metre Class.

This is an ancient Olympic Class and the relatively rare examples are scattered from Sydney to Brisbane. Eight 5.5s turned up for the Regatta, a good result. From Manly Yacht Club Pam placed 3rd and Antares placed 5th.

Tannis McDonald, secretary of the 5.5 Metre Association, thanked MYC for providing a professionally organise day of racing.


