



9.00 a.m. saw Helen and Eli setting up for the Volunteer Expo at Dee Why RSL. There were over 40 Community Groups that use volunteers show casing their activities, and encouraging people to become a volunteer in their work place. These included two Sailability groups, Manly and Pittwater, as well as St John, Easy Transport, Palliative Care, Northern Beaches Library, etc.

It became a Market Place for selling the idea of volunteering for all who attended. Tables were allocated to each group, and brochures, photos showing the range of activities, banners, balloons, lollies and more encouraged people to put their names on the lists.

The Expo was well attended, and we managed to have 10 people on our list that showed interest in being Sailability Volunteers for the future.



# **HISTORY - EOS THE YACHT - PART 4 & 5**

On Boxing Day 26 Dec 1994 we assembled early at Davis Marina where Bruce Davis had given us a complimentary berth. The plan was to take off early, check out the start line, the landmarks on either side, and doff our caps to the committee boat. It did not work like that. Approaching the committee boat under engine there was an almighty clattering beneath the cockpit sole. What had happened, although we did not know it at the time, was that a universal joint which connected the prop shaft to the gear box had come adrift and was swinging around banging on the inside of the hull. It sounded like a sinking catastrophe. We were half way to Hobart before I was able to bolt it all back together again.

Stop the motor, put up a bit of mainsail and try to avoid hitting any other yachts and on this occasion there were lots of other yachts, 372 in fact. It was a spinnaker start so we guessed where the line was, listened for the gun, broke out the kite when we heard it and took off. Surprisingly it was a good start but we had banded the kite and the top bands did not break at the start. At one point a large yacht blanketed the main, which thrashed about hitting Bruce on the head with the boom. It knocked him out and he fell dangling over the push pit. I held him by his belt until the others dragged him back and put him down below. He was left there muttering and swearing. We reached the turning mark near the front of the fleet.

A breaking wave would fill the cockpit and the subsequent knock down would tip it all out again. She took in surprisingly little water even although water came squirting in through the skylight and the vents, enough to soak all our gear. Living in a little world that is vertical one minute, and horizontal the next is incredibly tiring, even in a bunk. Liz was thrown out over the lee cloth and sustained a black eye. Later on in Hobart we learned from a yacht that had been relatively close to us that they recorded 70-knot gusts.

One thing that happens on a long voyage in a small boat is that toilet inhibitions all but disappear. Using the on-board toilet was just too hard when it is at an angle of 45 degrees so everyone used the bucket. It was jammed into the corner of the push pit where you could hold on if it was safe on deck. But I never got used to discussing the next sail change whilst sitting on the bucket and watching the wet toilet roll, roll out of reach.

Off the east coast of Tasmania we were utterly becalmed. We put up the table and for once we all sat around it for a meal... just a lookout on deck. It was during this calm as the main sail slopped back and forth that I noticed the gooseneck coming adrift.

It was attached to a bronze track, which was screwed to the wooden mast. The screws had been partially ripped out and the whole gooseneck was in danger of falling off. At this point Bruce Hitchman

The race gave us a wide variety of weather from flat calms to howling southerlies.

At one point there was a line squall the like of which I have never seen before or since. Nothing was cleated. All sheets were ready to let go instantly should the need arise. At one point the shackle on the main halyard broke and we lost the reefed main. A headsail halyard was used in reverse. "Eos" did not have wind instruments but we knew the wind was strong as we passed Bass Strait. Even with the storm sails set "Eos" was being flattened. We were doing six knots and that seemed far too fast when we slammed into a wave. What surprised me was the fact that the waves, which were as big as two storey houses, were so close together. There was no time to recover before the next one hit. In the lee of a big wave "Eos" would sit upright only to be knocked horizontal as she reach the crest.

called upon his experience as a lad on board a square-rigger, the "Pamir", and showed us how to 'fish' the mast. This involved lashing the track to the mast above and below the goose neck then inserting levers behind the lashings and then twisting them until they were drum tight. This worked well and the lashings were not removed until we were back in Sydney.

One anxious moment took place in a grey dawn at the change of watch. Bruce was coming off watch and I was going on. "I think we have sprung a plank" he said, "we've been pumping all night and there is still a lot of water in the bilge".

As I stepped into the cockpit I glanced forward along the interior. Right up in the bow I thought I saw a glimmer of light where light should not have been. It transpired that the forward hatch over the anchor well had not been properly secured. Each time "Eos" fell off a wave the hatch would open slightly and as she drove her bow into the next wave a jet of water would pour inside. Hatch secured, problem solved.

We thought we would make Hobart for the New Year's Eve party.

# **HISTORY - EOS THE YACHT - PART 4 & 5**

If the wind had remained steady we would have done it easily but it didn't. Sitting becalmed near Tasman Island we realised it was not to be. At daylight there were four old timber yachts heading up the Derwent line astern. They would fall into holes and just when the yacht behind was catching up they would take off again. The order did not change. "Eos" was third in line. Although the race officials failed to record our finish time and that of a New Zealand yacht we were eventually declared 14<sup>th</sup> in the Veterans' Division much to the relief of the CYC, which could not announce the results until all the yachts had been accounted for. "Eos" was the second smallest yacht in the race.

We crossed the finishing line on the morning of New Year's Day and rafted up in Constitution Dock. It was packed and we had to climb over other yachts to reach the shore. My wife was there to greet us and we lunched at a table and drank wine from a glass. An old college friend from Edinburgh took me to his home in Hobart and put a very unwashed me in a bath, I think more out of respect for his friends rather than concern about me. He handed me a generous whisky. I fell asleep in the bath and nearly drowned. The crew was granted hospitality by the brother of the best man at our wedding.

Liz Stubbs was pregnant. I was the only person who knew. Her mother did not know, neither did the father of her child. She only found out about two days before the race and decided to stay with it. She suffered from morning sickness but with rotating watches 'mornings' could occur at any time of day so the crew all thought she was just sea sick. She contacted me some time after the race during her second pregnancy and said she was just as sick on dry land as she had been on "Eos". Therefore, she has never been seasick.

The highest speed we attained was 11.2 knots and the best run was 2 1/2 hours at 9.2 knots. The latter was achieved on the voyage home. Bruce was on the helm and I was blissfully asleep down below.

"Eos" is remarkably quiet down below even at high-speed and rough seas. At the change of watch I peered out of the companionway and saw white water to the horizon. We were goose winged with the boom strapped in place with a preventer and the outer end permanently dragging through the water. That at least stopped us rounding up. The bow wave rose above both gunwales. "The race is over Bruce", I yelled above the wind. "I don't want to break any gear now". We reefed the main, set a No 2 headsail and proceeded almost as fast in a less frantic manner.

I must mention the camaraderie that develops amongst the crew

of a yacht especially on a long trip. Hardship is the glue that binds the crew together but the sunrise, the sunset and the shear exhilaration at reaching one's destination is the joy. One person deserves special mention in relation to "Eos" and that is Greg Paine. He has sailed on "Eos" ever since I bought her. He is a precise helmsman, especially to windward. He has taken part in all the working bees and handled some of the heavy maintenance tasks and even contributed to the costs. Without Greg I would have been struggling.

In the early days just after "Fos" was launched, Tom Flower campaigned his new yacht enthusiastically. The first of the heavy-duty Middle Harbour skite plates for "Fos", racing in Division 2, is dated 1956-1957 where she was 1<sup>st</sup> in the Pulbah Island Race, 3<sup>rd</sup> in the January Ocean race and 2<sup>nd</sup> in the CYC founders Cup. In the 1957-1958 season she won the Annual Point Score and the Vice Commodore's Trophy, came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the March Ocean Race and 2<sup>nd</sup> in the MHYC Carnival. The list goes on. I have skite plates up to 1971, but, unfortunately, I do not have skite plates for the two Sydney Hobart races she did with Tom Flower.



Since 1994 "Eos" has raced at Manly Yacht Club initially with a Cat 4 certificate, which meant she was doing the offshore races in daylight hours; and more recently with a Cat 7 for inshore racing. That does not reflect on "Eos" 's ability to sail offshore but rather my ability to keep up.

She was awarded 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary regatta at the Sydney Amateurs Sailing Club. She was 4<sup>th</sup> in the 1996 Great Veterans Race at the Cruising Yacht Club. She was 6<sup>th</sup> in the 2002 Great Veterans Race. She won the Classic Yachts PHS Class at the Audi Sydney Harbour regatta in 2009 and Penny (crew) and I got to drive an Audi sports car, unfortunately not well enough for the big prize. She was the Manly Yacht Club Champion in 2006.



"Eos", when I began sailing her at Manly Yacht Club, was one of the big yachts, and she sailed in Division 1, the big league, but as the yachts got bigger and faster, she was reclassified to Division 2. But, even now, given her favourite conditions, she can surprise some of the newer yachts.

"Eos" is now 61 years old, built to a design conceived in the 1930s and she is still full of sailing. I too was conceived in the 1930s but now I am no longer so full of sailing. My energy levels have dropped a bit and looking after "Eos" is becoming harder so "Eos" will be sold in the foreseeable future. I have owned her for 25 years. As a non-sailing Scottish migrant who arrived in Australia by boat in 1969, I have exceeded my wildest dreams on the water with "Eos".




