
This shop will appear on our new website which we are currently finalising a brief of our requirements. Any members with Shopify experience to help set it up would be greatly appreciated.

Twilights are fast approaching. Get your entries in and come along. We would like to see as many as possible both on the water and back on the deck afterwards.


We have two yachts heading off in the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race this year. Copernicus and Enigma are in full preparation mode.



The handicaps for this series are independent of the Twilight Series handicaps and are based on the performance of the boat and female helm.

- The boat you are helming MUST be an entrant in the Twilight Series.
- The helm in the Twilight Female Helm Series need not be the helm of the Twilight Series ... but can be.
- Yachts may only compete in the Twilight Female Helm Series using the nominated helm(s). Written notice of change may be considered - see Twilight NOR 2.3.



...AND THEN THE DAY ARRIVED 28 SEP 2019



The Khaleesi Story

After our first sail I think I was jumping up and down, but as not everyone knows we were buying a new boat, I will rewind and give some context... I say not everyone, but actually it was more like no one as it was a surprise!

The idea to upgrade was seeded when Carlos upsized, and Michael was thinking about it. Then with Michael and Stephen upgrading it tipped the scales. Michael originally pointed out 1D35s, but it took us a while to decide it was for us. We knew all about Mumm36s, they are like *Whiplash* but bigger and faster. However, the 1D35 kept drawing us back, maybe because it was a Bull 9000 on steroids.

The 1D35 was built in America and was designed as a trailer-sailer. No, I'm not kidding. It also has a lift hook for dry sailing. Thankfully the large towing regulations in America meant the boat was not really constrained in design. Only 48 were built as the class spinnaker was tiny and it could not compete in the market with Farr40s and Mumm30s. I believe there are only 3 in OZ, 2 in Lake Macquarie and 1 was in WA Busselton (Originally in Sydney). All non-class 1D35's now have mast head asymmetrical spinnakers and bow sprits to release the true power and potential the boats lacked in class racing.

Now many of us probably know the first tasks involved in buying a boat. **The task involves many steps!** Careful consideration has to be undertaken, anger and even pain maybe involved. The tasks each have to be delicately managed and orchestrated, with improvising and on the fly tactics. Careful

purchases and nights have to be planned and opportunities jumped on and we know it is a marathon and not a sprint. But... through each stage, from eye rolling; to foot down; to looks of disapprovals; eventually to "let's just look", the wife was on board $\stackrel{\triangle}{=}$.

Bryan and myself had our eye on 2 1D35s for sale for a while, but an email on a Wednesday from WA indicating a guy from Hawaii was getting shipping costs, had us on a plane Thursday night.

Photos often show things better than they are, but this time it was another story. This boat was amazing for a 20-year-old race machine. Originally named *Hippy Chick* when imported; changed to *Twist-n-Shout* by the last owner; changed to *Khaleesi* by us. *Khaleesi* is from Game of Thrones and means Queen; it was a condition the Wife set that she gets to name the boat.

I'll skip the issues and logistics of buying a boat 2 and half hours south of Perth and skip to the shipping bit. The lift crane was down for 5 weeks at Busselton for maintenance and the next lift was 200km away. Unwilling to wait that long, I made an option B... hire a 50ton crane!





The trip over was uneventful and the boat was very clean, a real compliment to BoatCo Australia.

Immediate touch ups and rigging where done at White Bay 6 Marina and she was slipped on Friday the 6th.

Saturday was a mad rush to get the old name off, wire the mast, remove every trace of the old name, perform the renaming ceremonies, rename her and get the Cat 7 audit (Thank you Stephen).

Why the rush? I wanted to do something different.

We only had 1 Sunday we could race before I went on holidays and up to now, the crew did not know we were buying a new boat or even actively looking.

I had worked the crew up a little saying we had big changes to *Whiplash*. Sunday morning the crew where led to the work berth at Davis expecting to see *Whiplash*. Needless to say, it was a good surprise and *Khaleesi* defiantly looked like she meant business. Given the many double takes by others and looking oddly confused with us at the helm, I'd say we pulled the surprise off.

Sunday 10am we set out for our first sail, Bryan and I had a total experience of 1 hour each in 8 knots of breeze. With the main up and reefed and at a reach we headed out of the bay.

The 25 knot-westerly finally got me to relax and for the first time truly relax and enjoy *Khaleesi*. Months of organising and logistics doesn't leave much time to think about sailing. I truly get it when they say the Hobart is easy; it's getting to the start line that is the most challenging part.

Realising we were halfway across the heads already, I managed to find the instrument with speed, and I was grinning heavily, 12+ knots. We tacked back and raised the jib and did some practice tacks and gybes before we went back to pick up the remaining crew. Stephen met us at the wharf and asked how she was, my response was non-verbal jumping up and down in excitement.

Now we all play a bit of psychological warfare between *Corum/Bullet, Mondo,* and *Esprit* and sure enough Michael calls me. (In his defence he was just excited for us and knew the boat had arrived, but that doesn't make good stories and well, would have backfired anyway).

The phone call was something like this:

M: Hey, has the new boat arrived?

P: Yep, just sailed her and loving it!

M: ...wait, what? You out in this? (Referring to 25+ gusty westerly).

P: Yep!

M: $Ok^{\textcircled{1}}$... Well you better get the spinnaker up \bigcirc .

P: Yep we are, next run out.

M: ...I'm kidding, I'm kidding Peter!!!

P: Oh, well I'm not, drive her like you stole her, c'ya .

Khaleesi will enter the Club Championships and Twilights to begin with. We will also chase *Corum* and *Mondo* in some offshore events.

In response to *Corum* in the previous newsletter... *Corum* should provide us with some competitive competition along with *Mondo*. *Khaleesi* does not currently have mast head symmetrical kites like *Corum*, and *Mondo* (Sydney 38) is a larger more all-rounder boat, so it should be interesting. All of us now need to pressure Greg to upgrade *Esprit*, ha ha!





So, it was all of the Volunteers, upstairs in the comfortable hall, having sessions on **volunteering in general**, led by Warwick, when he talked about ...


- ✓ the volunteers we already have.
- √ the new ones that come in on a regular basis,
- √ the importance of submitting their names for the roster,
- ✓ then turning up on the right days,
- ✓ the rights and responsibilities of the volunteers,
- the Working with Children checks, which are compulsory for all of our volunteers.
- ✓ and the responsibilities of Sailability Manly to our volunteers.

This was a very inspiring talk, and greatly appreciated by all.

Risk Management, led by Ken, was next, again, a very interesting discussion, and of great interest to our volunteering group.

Eli followed with a couple of the **training videos** that are available on the web, encouraging the new volunteers to take over some of the roles that are outlined. Also, showing that our procedures are easy to follow, and ensure safety for both our sailors, and the volunteers who take them out sailing.

A short morning tea break followed, then the large group was broken into 4 smaller groups. The first of these, compiled of people who want more practice in Support Boat Management took off in Charlies Chariot for the sheltered area near Reef Beach for some drills, with John in charge.

The remainder was divided into 3 groups.

One for **Pontoon Management Training**. David was in charge of this one, which concentrated on skills needed on the Pontoon: Hoisting, inserting keels and rudders, launching boats safely, and retrieving. A very busy session, thanks David.

The second was for work on the deck, including **Radio Management, the chef, the registrar, the Sailing Coordinator**, and putting away at the end of the day. This was a popular choice as it included a game, was sheltered from the strong winds, and had lots of variety in it. Thank you so much, Warwick.

The third was **instruction in rigging**, which was extremely difficult and tiring in the strong breeze which at times reached 43 knots. Thank you, Denis for persevering, and showing the volunteers what to do in very difficult circumstances.

These three groups rotated, so that everyone had instruction in all three of these activities.

In the meantime, Britta, Helen and Wilma were upstairs preparing a most delicious hot lunch for the very weary new and experienced volunteers as they returned upstairs.

A most exciting interlude happened in the middle of the day, when three of the students from UTS in Sydney arrived to take part in some interviews with some of our volunteers and Judith. This is for the project they have taken on for their final assessments on Sailability NSW. Judith was involved because she is one of our very experienced sailors who uses a servo 2.3 whenever the weather is suitable on a Saturday.

Now we are all set for the weather to settle down, so that we can run 5 sailing days each month for the rest of Spring, Summer and Autumn.

On scratch it was yardstick Phil who prevailed in front of Ian and Mike, who seems to be making the top three his habitat.



LESSONS LEARNT

Time to respond

- Enigma was topping 16.4 knots under spinnaker.
- An emergency drop took 15 minutes, covering 2-3 nautical miles.
- Returning to the yacht took further time under motor in trying conditions.
- The yacht was visible at all times, but a person in the water would not have been.

Communication

- The Cat crew had a small handheld radio with limited transmission.
- Good radio communication was established between Enigma and Marine Rescue.

Recover options

- All crew were accounted for with no injuries.
- As agreed with the cat skipper, the cat's crew were left onboard the upturned cat.
- It would have been riskier to either approach too close due to trailing lines and sails, or to try to transfer via long lines.
- An interesting question on recovery of yacht.
- How would you carry this out on a vessel you cannot turn back upright, and has a fully deployed kite acting as a sea drogue?
- Risky to send a swimmer down to fire kite.
- The water is too deep to drop an anchor.
- The decision was made to abandon the vessel and concentrate on the people.

How to find yacht?

- There was no tracker or beacon on the upturned vessel. It would be a good idea to have some form of tracker on the bottom of a Cat that cannot right itself.
- Left to drift, this was a hazard to shipping.

At 1pm a 12Metre Cat racing in the Cronulla Offshore Race under spinnaker hit a large wave and cartwheeled. Luckily nobody was hurt.

Enigma pulled out of the race and rendered assistance.



The Westpac chopper responded quickly and dropped a swimmer VID-20190923-WA0002.mp4



A small Marine Rescue boat arrived after two hours



A large Police launch arrived twenty minutes later (i.e. 2.5 hrs post flip), and *Enigma* stood down.

A decision was made to abandon the race and return and return to Sydney.

The yacht was recovered 2 weeks later towards Montague Island and towed to Bermagui Harbour.
