This year we will group the membership cards by boat and distribute them to Skippers and the Lasers.







Manly Cup (5-6 December)



UNAUTHORISED USE OF DAVIT

You may have noticed that there is danger tape and some "do not enter" signs on the davit that hold *Robbie R*.

WHY?

We are in discussions with Worksafe NSW at present about the future of the davit and we want to minimise all risks; authorised users will help us achieve this aim.

There are only a small number of members who have been authorised to use the *Robbie R* davit.

- → No loading of Robbie R while in the raised position
 loading done at the pontoon
- → Once Robbie R has been lowered and the spreader bar raised to a safe height, the box will be locked to prevent unauthorised use.
- → If an authorised user isn't available, then the Robbie R should be moored securely to the inside pontoon berth until an authorised person is present. This may mean that the boat is in the water overnight.
- → Authorised users are the Manly Sailing, the Sunday Race Directors and the Boats & Equipment Director.


Mary is an auto-tiller that stayed in the cockpit while Paul and I ran forward for sail changes.



25TH ANNIVERSARY WOMEN'S CHALLENGE 2020

While this was going on, the wonderful organisational skills of Bruce saw several other groups rigging and setting up boats for other activities that were going on at MYC at the same time.



Out on the water, meanwhile, the race crew were setting up for the race, at the same time keeping a weather eye out. A triangle with loop course was set up, and the race start commenced at 10.20. Black Swan just galloped away at the start, and never looked back. Alex came in second a couple of minutes later, then Ralph Newman, Eli D, Vin and Woody in fairly quick succession.

The second race started at 11.10, and the results were totally different: This time *Black Swan* came in first, with *Eli D* close behind.

In the first race, the difference in time between 1st and 6th was just over 7 minutes. In the second race...a great improvement for all boats, the difference between 1st and 6th was only 4 minutes, keeping our Race Officers busy.

At the end of the racing, our tired and very happy crews pulled out the boats, de-rigged and sanitised, and placed all the gear back in the boat room.


Vivien's fine performance was rightfully rewarded in the Point Score results, earning him two bullets and he donned the cap accordingly.

After the wonderful switch went on faultlessly, the boats were brought up the ramp, de-rigged and put away with a minimum of fuss.

working behind the scene fixing things, organising and working on making things work better for the juniors. The storage area is now much easier to use, and the dinghy dollies actually work.









AND THE BOTANY BAY RACE 2-UP

The second race was a week later to Botany Bay. The forecast was again for very little wind, lots of rain and a severe thunderstorm warning was in place. There was a southerly change forecasted, but never more than 10 knots and was not due until that evening. The start was postponed by 1 hour due to lack of wind, but eventually we started with a light NE breeze and the sun was shining, yay!

We got out the heads, turned south and popped the kite. Ok this was looking good.





and saw that about half mile ahead one of the bigger boats heading in exactly the same direction, were now beating to windward and heeling 45 degrees. "PAUL COME BACK HERE NOW!".

Let's get the headsail up before we drop the kite, yes? No, there is no time we thought, let's do a letterbox drop, go, go, go. The southerly hit and the kite was pushing against the rig. From here onwards it

was damage control. Paul managed to release the tack and I released the kite halyard and within a second the kite was flying astern. We got the kite back on board, I ran down below and grabbed the #4 headsail.

At this stage, all turned very dark, visibility was down to a couple of hundred metres, the rain turned into a fine hail and we could hear lightning strikes nearby. Confidence was low and we had to focus on sailing. We were abeam Coogee at this stage and our sailing was back in the groove. We had some 20 knots with 25+ gusts, a reasonable head swell, but were making great progress south.

The kite run back was intense. We were heading N and had to jibe. Mary was helping, but a two-handed kite jibe at 25 knots was never going to be easy. It was messy, but we eventually got there. Now we were sailing straight back to South Head, but a nasty round up followed by a kite wrap around the forestay. Ok, managed to get out of that one as well.
