A number of boats also have mismatching sail numbers. MYC will not penalise you for this as we all try alternate sails and have a wardrobe of older hand me down sails, but please inform the Race Committee of your alternate numbers or cover them to show they are not in use.

Please submit your entries for the MYC Offshore race to Pittwater on 2ND **APRIL ASAP**. This race is a huge amount of fun, and the party at RMYC is well worth the race (or drive up).



Fair winds & clear sky for Race 3 of Sydney Harbour Women's Keelboat Series

It was a spectacular day on Sydney Harbour for Race 3 of the Sydney Harbour Women's Keelboat Series (SHWKS) run by CYCA. A crisp 10-15 knot sou-sou-easterly breeze combined with a beautiful clear sky and warm 25-degree temperature made perfect sailing conditions for the 16-strong fleet.

Celebrating its inaugural season in 2020-21, SHWKS is a collaboration between the Cruising Yacht Club of Australia (CYCA), Manly Yacht Club (MYC) and Middle Harbour Yacht Club (MHYC). Races 1 and 4 are conducted by MYC, Race 2 by MHYC and Sunday's Race 3 by CYCA.

After starting off Point Piper 1300hrs Sunday 28 February, most of the fleet quickly raised their spinnakers, making for a wonderful sight as they raced downwind. The racecourse sent the fleet around Sydney Harbour with everyone home within 2 hours.

Only a small number of MYC boats ventured down the harbour for the competition with Janette Syme doing best out of the three J24's participating in the mixed Division 2 fleet on *Okavango Delta* taking 3rd place in the female helm result.

After dominating the racecourse all day and claiming line honours, Liz Charles and her team on the Azuree 46 *Kayimai* (MHYC) held on to win Female Skipper (spinnaker) Division 1. Female Skipper (spinnaker) Division 2 was claimed by Alex Murray and team aboard the Melges 24 *Accru* (RANSA).

All of the Full-Female Crew teams on the day opted to race with their spinnakers. Katy McDonald and her team aboard the Beneteau Oceanis 51.1 *Wilde Rush* (CYCA) were too good to beat taking first place.

SHWKS will conclude Sunday 28 March with Race 4, the MYC Women's Challenge.






