COMMODORE'S REPORT


Keep positive. Keep busy.

My lockdown project has been a complete rebuild of Enigma's engine. The timing belt snapped, and the inch-thick camshaft shattered into six pieces. Quite an achievement. What has your project been? Send us a photo of your sanity project.

Necessity is the mother of invention. One of the best initiatives over the Covid period has been that the Sydney Yacht Club Commodores meet virtually once a month to discuss how each club is fairing and to come up with a collective approach. Australian Sailing also participate, and recently we invited the major Victorian and Queensland clubs to join our gathering. These meetings have been superb - it is a forum for yacht clubs to share challenges and seek advice from peers. MYC has a voice at the table; our concerns are heard, and our proposals acted upon.

At our last meeting we discussed:

- Extending Category Audits until December. MYC Sailing Committee were considering October, but we will align with other clubs.
- The new keel inspection rule relates to category 1-3 and can be done by "someone with five years relevant experience" as opposed to a surveyor.
- The proposed upgrade to Manly Wharf 3. MYC was invited to participate in the consultation. Two floating or hydraulic platforms are being considered. I have endorsed the floating one and stressed the need to cater for fibreglass boats -



especially for use in emergencies.

Keep well everyone and I hope it's not too long before restrictions are lifted, and we can enjoy our sport of sailing and the camaraderie of our wonderful club.



VENUE HIRE MANAGER - PART TIME RETAINER + COMMISSION

Manly Yacht Club is a community based not for profit sailing club that hires out its upstairs facilities to support the Club's operations.

The peak season for a "bare" hire of venue is Saturday afternoons and evenings over summer with Friday evenings available during winter.

The venue is popular for special occasions such as weddings, engagements, and birthday parties.

During the week, the venue is perfect for corporate events such as offsite meetings, presentations, and team bonding.

Covid-19 has seen a dramatic decrease in bookings for the next 12 months, but we expect to see a full recovery by the end of 2022.





ROLE RESPONSIBILITIES

- Deliver growth by developing service offerings & increasing bookings
- Perform marketing engagement including via digital platforms, website maintenance, industry events and biannual showcase events.
- Manage presales activity by responding to booking enquiries, conducting viewings and follow-ups with potential hirers.


MYC CLUB RACE OFFICER COURSE THEORY

MEET THE BOAT AND CREW OF:



LUDICROUS MODE

A new entrant to the fleet, Ludicrous Mode is a Hick 31 co-owned by Bevan, Mark, Stu and Scott.

Our story starts late in the last twilight season, with all four owners racing for the first time together on Itsawury. Due to some navigational

misfortune, instead of rounding the mark at Chowder Bay south we rounded at Chowder Bay north and sailed straight into a dead zone, before drifting into the

rocks! As you'd expect in such a calamitous situation the engine also failed to start, and within a couple of minutes Itsawury was parked firmly on land. Others in the fleet kindly offered assistance but we eventually managed to sail ourselves off the rocks, with minimal damage and a few oyster cuts as souvenirs.

Our post-race analysis came to the conclusion that it was all the boat's fault, and we needed a new one. The search began for an Adams 10 or similar, and a few weeks later, we settled on the Hick 31 Ludicrous Mode (named after the incredible acceleration possible in a Tesla with "Ludicrous Mode" enabled ...

...which in turn originated from the spaceship setting "Ludicrous Speed" in the movie Spaceballs.

After the fiery crucible of Chowder Bay, an esprit de corps had formed amongst the crew, and we were determined to do well in the Winter Series.

The key takeaway was not to sail the Division Two course when you're in Division One!

In Race 2 we bounced back strongly with new Musto uniforms and freshly printed course maps... and managed to win on adjusted time. So, there's hope for us yet!



Remember how we all hated uploading our documents for each and every series, or for a casual entry?

Jan would like us to know about the new document management library associated with each boat in SailSys that will make compliance **SO** much easier.

There are two ways to add a file to your Boat's profile to save it in your file library and have it readily accessible if/when a club asks you to submit it. Note that it also means that you can call it up on any device at any time to show it on demand!

The two methods are:

- Upload via your Boat profile in advance, or
- Save it to your Boat's profile/library when you first submit it to a club.

Either way, you will be asked to:

- give the file a name we suggest something logical that enables you to find it quickly and know what year it relates to - i.e. Insurance 2020
- If applicable, provide an expiration date; this is not mandatory but is worth doing if your document has one.

For our newer members (and those who don't know)...

MYC Twilight Racing is conducted in the twilight hours of the Daylight Savings period between the October long weekend and the Easter break -22 Fridays!

That's a **LOT** of Fridays!

Naturally this leads to withdrawal as the winter nights approach. So, it was only natural that the

TWILIGHT TRAGICS

were formed.

This hardy group of sailors meets on non-sailing Fridays (that's 30 of them! - Fridays that is!) for a catch up at some pre-determined venue.

They are always looking for new members - so make yourself known!





For those of you old enough to remember this burgee. For those of you who have been at MYC long enough to remember "Torquil". Inspired by a clean out that surfaced this burgee plus the club's introduction of a short-handed division in the Spring and Summer Series, I made contact with Peter McCorquodale ("Torquil") who was one of the driving forces of the Short-Handed Sailing Association of Australia. What follows is a short history of the association which in 2019, still had some 560 members. More info can be found at http://ssaa.com.au.

Like many other sailing and sporting organisations, the SSAA is struggling to retain interest and relevance. The numbers of members, and of participants, have greatly declined since the heydays of the 1980s and 1990s.

The challenge of single-handed sailing first caught the imagination of a group of sailors during the late 1970's – a time when shorthanded racing was not offered in Australia, and so the idea of forming an Association was born.

The first BOC around the world race in 1982-83 was an inspirational catalyst, so Don McIntyre and others founded the SSAA in 1983.

In these early years shorthanded racing was considered "cavalier" by mainstream yacht clubs and, accordingly, the SSAA created its own rules and safety regulations, which were more stringent at that time than those for fully crewed racing.

Then came the 1998 Hobart race. Club insurance became very expensive, YA made their Equipment Regulations stronger, and the SSAA membership at the time agreed to affiliate with YANSW. So, we affiliated, but other than the cost of insurance coming down, nothing much really changed.

In recent years shorthanded sailing has gained dramatically in popularity and acceptance internationally. Here in Australia, the SSAA is no longer a 'fringe' element outside the mainstream yachting community.

"When short-handing, you win when you achieve your goals"

The objectives of the SSAA are:

- To promote and develop shorthanded sailing in the wider yachting community.
- To foster friendship, partnerships and alliances within families and between like-minded individuals.
- To advance the seamanship of members and other interested parties
- To advance best practices in 'safety and survival at sea'
- To encourage the exchange of information on seamanship, safety issues, yacht equipment and boat handling experiences and techniques.
- To provide opportunity for the wider use of sailing craft, mono or multi-hull, that can be sailed with one or two crew.
- To develop self-reliance and resourcefulness, useful in all of life's encounter
- To promote and develop the sport at a regional level throughout Australia.

Sir Robin Knox-Johnson, the first man to win a solo, non-stop around the world yacht race, is Patron of the S.S.A.A.

Other prominent members past and present include:

- David Adams winner, class 2, BOC race 1994-95
- Alby Burgin, Kanga Birtles and Tony Mowbray significant and extensive achievements in shorthanded sailing.
- Kay Cottee first woman to sail solo non-stop around the world
- Vinny Lauwers first paraplegic to complete solo non-stop circumnavigation.
- Don McIntyre SSAA founding member, renowned sailor and adventurer.
- Jon Sanders for his triple (eleventh!... Ed) circumnavigation, solo, non-stop

HAT DOES SAILING LOOK LIKE FOR THIS SEASON?

In the last edition of the newsletter the club was hopeful of a reasonable start, with series dates laid out so crews could be assembled. Since that time, further lockdowns have been introduced and contingency plans have been made. What can go on-line, will go on-line; what can be postponed, will, but **when** we sail is not in our hands. All we can do now is dream of what series we'd like to race and imagine how well we will do. For the lasers... aspirations after the Olympics, for juniors too, but for the yachts ... choices, choices, choices. So, let's start with brief descriptions of what could be...

SPRING AND SUMMER SERIES

This season kicks off with the Spring Series giving skippers and crews the experience to transition from casual twilight sailing to staggered daylight starts from the committee boat, on a longer course.

For the more experienced or adventurous boats, nominate your intention to fly a spinnaker. For those with limited friends - try the short-handed division.

After Christmas the Summer Series follows the same format.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

This is the premiere series at Manly Yacht Club. Scratch starts from the committee boat make for exciting action. See if you can sail to you handicap and become the Club Champion. Or race for the coveted Bob Greene Trophy or the Davis Cup by being fastest around the course in your division.

Nominate a spinnaker, or not - your handicap will be adjusted accordingly.

Nominate the helm. No swapping without informing the Handicapper. This is serious stuff!

MINI REGATTA

5 short/sharp races on the same day in North Harbour for yachts under 11m. Great fun and a great way to hone your skills.

TWILIGHT SERIES

We wait till after the October Long Weekend, when daylight savings starts, before we can participate in this fun series; easily one of the best ways to relax at the end of the week. This series incorporates the Twilight Female Helm Series - a series of 5 races at the beginning of each month of the twilights.

After-racing meal, drinks and presentation add to the conviviality of the evening.

MARATHON SERIES

This series of three races allows the fleet to explore the western reaches of Sydney Harbour. Depending on tide, weather and division, all 7, or just some of the islands will raced around. This is a timed start, handicap race and if you feel comfortable doing the Spring and Summer Series, you'll be ok with this series too - slightly longer, but fun.

OFFSHORE SERIES

This series is for those wanting to test their skills "outside". Three races are offered in the series; two of these going to our favourite destination - Pittwater. Always scheduled on a long weekend so that you can spend time exploring Pittwater and the Hawkesbury afterwards. Berthing and dining facilities are arranged at the destination club.

One restriction is that every user must undergo a training course and by implication we will only have a handful of trained operators.

Further the controls will need to be locked away when not in use.

The good news is that *Robbie R* is again stored securely out of the water, a must, given that it is made from aluminum.

President Lisa is very excited and although she may be the oldest kid going, she plans to be the first to buy a ticket. Money raised will go towards the Juniors program.





What is a SROS? Small Rig Open Skiff

In 2019 a small group of members formed a consortium to help our Junior Program grow by purchasing 9 Small Rig Open Skiffs (SROS) - formerly known as BICs - which they loaned to the club.

These SROS have been an integral part of our junior program giving hundreds of kids each year the ability to improve their sailing ability and have been critical to solving the gap between our beginner Optis and the Full Rig Open Skiff.

The total project cost for the new **SROS** boats was **\$26,500**.

Our plan was to apply for grants to be able to purchase these boats from the consortium to give our next generation of sailors the opportunity to participate in a fun outdoors family orientated sport in the beautiful sailing waters surrounding Manly.

But in the last two years we have been unsuccessful. So, we have set up a fundraising campaign via the Australian Sports Foundation so that all donations are tax deductible.


