

#### REMINDER OF RACE COMMITTEE

As we've finally started back into racing, I'd like to remind everyone that as a volunteer club, our race committee consists of 'volunteers'. Unfortunately, we don't have a large pool of non-racing volunteers, so each yacht entered into a series can rely on the fact that they will be assigned to a race committee on at least one occasion.

This year, we are pulling race committees from the same series they race in. Yachts have been assigned randomly and you can find this on the Roster (insert website link). There are a few key items I'd like to bring to your attention.

- Someone from your yacht must be able to perform the Race Officer duties. This doesn't have to be the owner or skipper, but they should ensure that the person they put forward has taken the Race Officer course. If there is enough interest, I am sure a RO training session can be arranged before we get too far into the season.
- Race committee doesn't necessarily have to be from your crew. If you have friends or family that would like to participate under direction, feel free to ask them along. If anyone would like to drive the Robbie R, they must have a valid boat license and pass the online Robbie R test.
- If you don't like your scheduled date feel free to swap. You
  can even swap with someone from another series if they are
  agreeable. However, you need to contact another skipper or
  owner, this is not the responsibility of the Duty Roster
  Coordinator.
- If you don't have a large crew to fill the spots required, you need to ask around for volunteers to assist you. The Duty Roster Coordinator can only suggest a limited number of people for race committee.

I've never had a race be abandoned due to missing race committee, so thanks for your support in prior years and be sure to check the Roster for the upcoming season!

#### MYC newsletter article - by Ian Smith 2 November 2021

The selection of my new J99 Yacht was the end of a very long journey and the beginning of a new journey.

To give some perspective, let's start at the beginning.

The Journey started as a 12-year-old watching a children's TV show of a boy and his family travelling the South Sea Islands on a large ketch. I vividly recall the young boy at the bow in shorts, white t-shirt and bare feet watching the waves created from the bow slicing through the undulating swell, clear skies and tropical storm clouds on the horizon and I thought, what a great adventure and is that something I want to do-and I said to myself: "Yes I do".

The next boating experience was on a "Putt-putt boat" on the Hastings River at Port Macquarie with my father and his friend who owned a small "stinky" runabout. I asked my father quietly if I could steer the boat and he suggested that to the skipper. The skipper asked my father how he knew I wanted to steer the boat and I just smiled. The skipper then asked me would I like to steer the boat and I replied: "Yes I do".

I started sailing with the Port Macquarie Sea Scouts and shortly after we moved to Sydney. For one reason or another I didn't get into sailing in my high school years but as a teenager I was asked once by Richard Lacey, a current member of the laser fleet, if I'd like to go racing on a 16-foot skiff at the Manly Skiff Club, as they were looking for an additional crew member. I thought – that's adventurous. I said: "Yes I do".

Years later I was introduced to moth sailing at the Seaforth Moth Sailing Club, and I asked myself - do I want to sail a single-handed "slab" dinghy, and I thought - that sounds difficult. I said: "Yes I do".

This is where I first met Barry Miflin, the current manager of the Manly Yacht Club and whom I've sailed with on his yacht *Cheap Thrills* for the last twenty years. I bought my first scow Moth and taught myself how to sail, as in those days there were no coaches or google searching "how to" topics. Being a kinaesthetic learner, it was a case of trial and many errors and remembering to put the bungs in before leaving the shed ramp!! And of course, a moth was a single-handed boat. I progressed to a skiff moth where I learned the joy of sailing high into the wind and picking the multitude of wind shifts in Bantry Bay.

I trained as a chartered accountant and went on secondment to the London office of Peat Marwick Mitchell (now KPMG) and in doing so a colleague of mine, Ed Psaltis, asked me if I'd like to take a side trip with him to Porto Cervo in Sardinia and stay at his father, Bill Psaltis' Italian villa. No thought required, I said: "YES I DO."

Unbeknownst to me Bill Psaltis was a famous Commodore of the CYCA, instrumental in initiating Australia's first Admirals Cup challenge and competed in the notorious Fastnet race of 1979. Ed became famous as the winner of the dramatic 1998 Sydney to Hobart race.

When I arrived in Porto Cervo, Sardinia I was asked by Bill if I would like to be a crew member with Ed on the New Zealand team competing in the inaugural 12 Metre World Championship. They had secured *ENTERPRISE*, originally built as a defender for the America's Cup in 1977. This was 1984 and a year after Australia had won the Americas Cup. Nonchalantly, I said: "Yes I do."

In 1986 Bob Oatley delivered his first *Wild Oats* yacht to Malta enroute to Porto Cervo to complete in that year's Sardinia Cup. He asked if I'd like to come to Malta and help him deliver his state-of-the-art Farr 43' yacht to Porto Cervo.

Unbeknownst to me, the hull was laden with only the finest range of Rosemount chardonnay!! Of course, I said: "Yes I do". And, yes, we did check if the product was as labelled!!

When I got to Porto Cervo, I was asked would I like to be part of the crew of the yacht 'Fantasque' which formed part of the Australian team of three yachts competing for the Sardinia Cup in that year. And you guessed it, I said: "Yes I do".

I had now represented two countries in sailing (fortunately, the haka was not a pre-requisite), was mixing with sailing

elite and yet, only a few years prior, I was learning the secret art of sealing plugs and the mystery of bungs!

Further along the journey was concentrating on building my career, family, and various offshore sailing expeditions including Sydney to Hobart, Coffs Harbour, Mooloolaba, Arlie Beach etc.

In all this time I wanted to own my own yacht, but not any yacht.

It had to have racing pedigree, upwind pointing ability, sophisticated hull shape, powerful rig and below deck ascetically pleasing with facilities for cruising with my wife. It also had to be capable of being sailed solo, given my wife is a landlubber.

Now or never was the time, given the shortening "runway" of life ahead and, in perfect timing, I was able to reduce my work commitments. I simply asked myself, do I want to be living in my dream now. And I thought: 'Yes I do" and immediately the inspiration came: "where do I sign?".



The yacht is named *Jupiter*, inspired by the 'J' in J99 and from the positive aspects associated with the planet's meaning going back to before Roman times.

#### JUPITER:

The supreme deity of the ancient Romans: the god of the heavens and of the weather.

Jupiter was built over 3 months in France by J Composites, delivery a further 2.5 months and two weeks commissioning at the boat yard at RPAYC.









I thought it fitting to ask my sailing mate, Barry Miflin, if he would like to help me deliver *Jupiter*, my new J99 yacht, from Pittwater to North Harbour, Manly. No surprise, without any hesitation and in a blink of an eyelid he said: "Yes I do".

We had a fabulous trip from Pittwater in a 12kt easterly. We gybed at the opening to Port

Jackson onto a 15kt nor'easter. Simply perfect!

I started this next stage "J99 Journey" without tools or even a toolbox! Spreadsheets and financial acronyms have been my tools of trade and de rigueur. All I had was a blank canvas and a white board without texta markers. It's like learning to sail again but this time with bungs in!! I had to shift my mindset from all care "fly-in crew" to responsible yacht owner with the flick of a switch.

I'm expecting it'll take 12 months to get up to speed and be comfortable taming the stallion. I'm sure there will be lots of horse-whispering required...

After the lead up and pressure of delivery, sprinkled with COVID-19 restrictions, I asked myself, "do I need this all-consuming, technically difficult challenge in my life" and my immediate response, within the blink of an eyelid, was: "Yes I do".

It was nice to see everyone getting ready for racing ...



## CRUX

: a vital, basic, decisive, or pivotal point;

: something that torments by its puzzling nature; a perplexing difficulty;

: a cross (the Southern Cross Constellation is featured on both the Brazilian and Australian flags).





**HEADLINE:** Crux has entered the inaugural Rolex Sydney to Hobart Two-Handed Division! Owner and skipper of Crux, Carlos Aydos, writes about his passion for sailing.

I've been trying to get more involved in two-handed offshore racing for a while. Not because I dislike my crew, but because Crux is not a spacious race boat. Instead, Crux's space is taken up by cruising furniture and having 5 to 6 people on it on a multi-day race is very tight.

As I have found out, two-handed racing is much harder than it sounds. Two-handed offshore racing is really single-handed racing, one sleeps, one sails and so on. The sailing part is hard enough, but even harder is finding a co-skipper that is available, has the resources and is

confident to sail the boat by themselves, and most importantly, is crazy enough to want to do it.





Paul Immerglück was *Crux's* first co-skipper. Anne and Paul Immerglück had being Crux regular crew for a few years. Paul and I sailed a twohanded division offshore season, mostly day races. We had a great time aboard Crux. Unfortunately, during our last race, Paul suffered an injury to his shoulder and had to take a break from sailing to recover.

Tomas Kliman was Crux's second co-skipper. I met Tomas when we ended up on the same watch on Enigma's 2017 RS2H. Tomas was the watch captain and I was rail meat/trimmer. I knew Tomas was a great yachtsman as he would take on any tasks around the deck when needed. Tomas and I had our sights on the Bluewater Point Score (BWPS) and were

planning to enter the Southport race. CYCA has a requirement that any two-handed crew must pre-qualify by experiencing a two-handed 100nm passage together on the nominated boat before participating on any BWPS race. We went out on such a passage early June.

We left Friday night and returned Saturday around noon. It was blowing above 28 knots from the south most of the night, gusting 35 sometimes, freezing cold too. We decided to go on a reach out and reach back as quickly as possible. We were using "Mary", Crux's auto tiller and taking 3-hour watches. At 3am and 50nm offshore, we turned back to Sydney. At this stage, the house battery was low, and it was time to recharge. The engine ran for a couple of minutes and died, never to start again during that passage. Water had made its way into the diesel tank; my fault for not closing the deck filler cap properly. The wind was still going strong and we were on a bumpy ride with significant heel. I



eased the mainsail and left Mary to take care of the sailing while I went down below to see what was going on. The swell was really messy and keeping my head down in the engine bay made me sick and I started throwing up. Tomas noticed that we now had lots of water in the bilge. Between the throwing up episodes, I found out that before departure, I had closed the bow hatch and had not clear the kicker line which did not allow the hatch to seal properly (my fault again!). Ok, we figured that one and pumped the water out. Crux has lithium batteries, which means when the voltage drops below a certain threshold, the protection circuit shuts off the battery completely. That is exactly what happened next. We were down below in total darkness when Mary obviously "froze". The boat rounded up, "self-tacked" and kind-of hove to. I managed to redirect the engine battery to the rest of the boat, so we had the instruments back, however we needed to use power sparingly which meant Mary would now take a break for the rest of the trip. From 6am onwards the wind started to drop and at 11am we were struggling to enter Pittwater with 5 knots of breeze. At around Scotland Island we managed to get a tow to the RPAYC.

This was Tomas' first ride on Crux, and I thought to myself, probably the last one too! Incredibly, he was still keen on the Southport race. Unfortunately, Southport race was abandoned due to COVID-19. Then a second BWPS race was abandoned and the racing calendar was completely turned on its head. At this stage, everyone's' life was changing due to NSW lockdown and Tomas had other things to focus on rather than a totally unpredictable racing calendar.

## **C**RUX



Going back a while, Peter Grayson turned up at my Roads and Maritime Office in 2013. Says he is in the graduate program and was interested is a placement in our section. I had a chat with him and noticed he was no ordinary graduate and welcomed him. I soon found out that we both had 2 passions: being software development geeks and sailing. Coincidentally, we found both (and his father Bryan) had been on a North Harbour mooring waiting list for circa 10 years. Indeed, our mooring licences were assigned to us only a few weeks apart. From memory, we joined MYC in that same year. (Editor's fact-check Carlos - Dec 2015; Peter - Feb 2016). A few

years later, Peter introduced me to Jason Bond. That event led Bryan, Peter and I to go on our first Hobart together on *Enigma*. Since then, given his amazing all round skills, Peter has been getting invites to sail offshore in very competitive boats: humble little *Crux* probably had little chance to have him aboard. One day he told me he would put his hand up for the Sydney to Hobart two-handed.

#### Great!

A few months ago, we agreed to enter *Crux* in the inaugural Two-Handed Division of the Rolex Sydney Hobart 2021 race. Only a month ago, I managed to get *Crux* through its Cat 1 safety audit. Recently we have also completed our qualifying passage. We are now officially ready to take on the big race. One cannot overstate the work involved to get a boat to the starting line of these races.





The weekend before last, we had our first BWPS race and *Crux* finished 1<sup>st</sup> on PHS and 4<sup>th</sup> on both ORCi and IRC in the two-handed divisions of the Flinders Islet race. It was a relatively easy and uneventful race with winds 10-20 knots from the North. We arrived back at sunrise at 5:30am after parking outside the heads for 30 minutes or so. This coming weekend 13<sup>th</sup> Oct, we race to Bird Island and in 4 weeks to Cabbage Tree. From then on, we will keep our fingers crossed that Tasmania will let us in.

(Editor's postscript - it's blowing dogs off chains, offshore as I follow Crux's live streaming of the Bird Island Race - sail safe Crux!)


