Rule 46 change

At present <u>rule 46</u> has a prescription that after three races all crew of any race shall also be a club member. From 1 January 2022 the Australian Sailing prescription to the rule will require that all crew are members of an affiliated club and registered with Australian Sailing- regardless of the number of races they have competed in.



To ensure our skippers remain compliant with this rule, Manly Yacht Club will be launching SailPASS in the new year which will remain free for the first three races. More details will be released in the new year.



Crew Lists

We also have more details on "Crew Lists" from SailSys in this newsletter. Some clubs like RSYS have opted to make crew lists an ongoing mandatory requirement for all racing. MYC has not implementing this requirement but if you are a MYC member who also races with other clubs then you should be aware of this change and what steps SailSys had to take to enable this system to be made more widely available.

A MESSAGE FROM SAILSYS



On the 22nd of last month, SailSys undertook a crucial and necessary step to maintain high levels of data integrity. This was to change how Crew lists fundamentally work so that *only* Crew could take responsibility for managing *their* personal information.

The process undertaken was to:

- 1. Place all past Crew lists data into a quarantined environment as "pending" accounts. This data could no longer be seen by Skippers nor by SailSys.
- 2. An email was sent to the owner of this "pending" account inviting them to crystallise this account.
- 3. If the recipient then created an account, they would retain the data that the Skipper initially entered, and notably, from the Skippers perspective, their Crew lists would remain intact, finally.
- 4. Any unclaimed "pending" accounts would be purged.

The outcome by the time this exercise is complete.

- 1. SailSys will have the explicit consent of everyone whose data is hosted on SailSys,
- 2. The Crew will know exactly what information is held by SailSys...because they 'own' it,
- 3. They can maintain/curate their own data, and
- 4. They can request its deletion at any time.

What it means for Skippers:


- 1. Moving forward, the only information required to add someone to a Crew list is name and email. Whether the maintenance of crew lists is required is a Club decision.
- 2. Skippers will no longer be the pinch point for Crew updating or deleting information.

We hope this clears up any uncertainty, but please, if you have any question don't hesitate to reach out to our support team. If moving forward there are series that require you to use Crew Lists, remember there is some help documentation to assist here https://sailsys.tawk.help/article/maintaining-crew-lists

Phil had a dream. It was about winning the first northern harbour interclub regatta, the Battle of the Sound. He bothered all of us with it for weeks. Would've been months if it wasn't for COVID. However, his enthusiasm must have seeped in - like osmosis through the hulls of our heads and hearts. He got some of us caring enough to turn up and sail for the club. And better still, others to fire up and get the job done. Our victory shouldn't have been so surprising, considering the class and improvement of some of our sailors. And besides, we only needed six of our heroes to do well.

Our first race point-scorers in the Radials were Evie (1st), Bevis (3rd) and Phil (5th) and in the Standards, Ian (1st), Iain (2nd) and Mike (13th). With the second race abandoned, this was more than enough to take the prized centreboard trophy, ahead of Vaucluse, Middle Harbour Amateurs and Northbridge Sailing Club.

Our win has been widely documented, but what was the battle actually like from the POV of a foot-soldier/sailor?



The forecast was 20 knots from the west (and increasing), so some expected (or prayed) for an abandonment of the regatta. It

was not to be and twelve of us plucky sailors had to go over the top. The first race was tough but bearable, until towards the end, when the cantankerous westerly really began to lose its temper - with gusts of well over 30 knots.

Before the start of the second race, the white horses were stampeding, and we had to lean hard even against flapping sails. (I can't get that crazy noise out of my head (?).)

Two-thirds of the way up the first beat I went over and found I couldn't pull my boat up, simply because of the windage on the hull. By the time I did the race was abandoned, The Sound littered with more hulls than sails – a true battlefield. I was relieved until I realised the absolute madness of going straight downwind in that breeze. So, I flapped down towards Middle Head until the distant MYC was on a perfect three-quarter reach angle. Then took off.



I don't think I've ever been so fast in a Laser and was back at the club in no time. Intel came through

that we were looking good for the win and after unrigging, headed over to MHASC courtesy of Ian's RIB - MYC flag aflutter.

MHASC were gracious and so was Field Marshall Phil as he accepted the inaugural Battle of the Sound centreboard trophy. Victory to MYC 4 – a dream ful-Phil-ed.

Manly Yacht Club hosted its 2nd annual Manly Cup, which incorporated the NSW State Titles in the first week of December. We had a large fleet of 57 boats across three fleets with a handful of sailors traveling from VIC. Early weather forecasting wasn't looking great with 25knots from the SE, a bit excessive for our needs, although direction wise, a SE is excellent for Manly, probably the most consistent and clear wind directions for sailors in this part of the harbour.

O'pen Skiff regattas split the fleet into Gold (Most experienced) Silver (Less experienced) and Green (least experienced, generally the youngest and often never having raced before). With 17 sailors in Gold, 34 in Silver and 7 in Green. A great mix with lots of new sailors even in the silver fleet, who have never attended a regatta.

Thankfully, conditions abated for Saturday which allowed for 3 races for the gold and silver fleet in the first sailing session at 11:00. SE 15-18knots with a few heavier gusts made for excellent racing in the Gold Fleet. Conditions were challenging for the silver fleet but most of them managed the three races.





The afternoon session was made up of the popular 4-up adventure race. This teams 4 sailors together on the one boat matching the top of the gold fleet with those from the Green Fleet, this encourages the better sailors to share their skills with the less experienced sailors and have them getting to know the other sailors.

The sailors love this race and it's great to see the kids coming together to work as a team to get their boat around the course. Anything goes in this race other than pirating, crashing, or taking apart the boat. A fun event for the kids and an even funnier spectacle for the parents watching from shore!

The draw from the barrel went to *Kia Kaha* - congratulations Andrew W and thank you Pittwater Eco-Adventure.







FAREWELL STEVE WILTON



Steve Wilton, a member of Manly Yacht Club since December 2004, sailor, surfer, father, friend and long-time resident of Manly passed away on 14 November 2021. He was just 63, taken far too early by Motor Neurone Disease (MND). He left his beautiful wife Caroline, his son Harry and daughters Bella and Sofia.

Steve cut his sailing teeth as a forrard-hand racing International 14s in the UK. When he came back to Sydney in his early twenties, he was naturally attracted to racing 14-foot skiffs at North Harbour Sailing Club. Steve bought his first skiff, painting it red and renaming it "Rekcuftac" [spell it in reverse]. He steered Rekcuftac in numerous clubs, state and national championship events and regattas up and down the NSW coast.

In the late 1980's he partnered with fellow 14 sailor, Michael Grout to buy *Beano* a Nantucket 31 which they campaigned with much enthusiasm and lots of rum in the CYCA Winter Series and other races for several years. *Beano* was sailed in twilights around the harbour from RANSA to MHYC. They won the RSYS Montego Bay trophy.

Steve with Michael then stepped up a notch buying *Public Nuisance*, a Dubois 30 half tonner. *Public Nuisance* could not be more aptly named for Steve. With a regular crew, they campaigned *Public Nuisance* in JOG and MHYC racing and coastal passage racing, as well as twilight and winter series events around the harbour. They won most of the passage races one year. They were always competitive, swapping spots and often honours with Ed Psaltis who then competed in the same divisions in his *Charmeleon* and then *Nu Zulu*. They then bought the Lyons 24 JOG boat, *Max* (formerly *Box Office*) and later the Mount Gay 31, *Maximum Nuisance* which were similarly campaigned with distinction and partied with vigour. Steve and Mike took turns helming.

After married life and family came into the picture, Steve bought a Bavarian 34. But he also raced regularly on Mitch Gordon's Sydney 38 *The Goat* and sailed many northern races with Roger Hickman, Bruce Foye and Lance Peckman on Farr 43 *Wild Oats*. Steve's last yacht was *Poet's Day*, a lovely Elan 40 which he raced in MYC Twilights. She was renamed *Valparaiso* and raced and cruised with even greater love.

Whilst Steve's yacht racing was always competitive, securing him many wins, his popular booze cruises were legendary, attracting some of Sydney's prettiest crews. The music and champagne always flowed freely and many a working week started with a hangover.

Steve had that character which brought out the spirit of life and fun inside all of us. We all have that quality, but Steve just had that quality in spades. He loved living at Manly, he loved his sailing, he loved his wife, his family and his friends. And he loved to party.

A memorial celebration function in Steve's honour was held at the Rooftop bar of the Steyne Hotel. The venue was packed to its COVID limits with family and friends. Manly Life Saving Club and sailing friends from many clubs, including MYC were represented. Many spoke fondly of Steve recounting many happy memories, including his sailing partner Michael Grout and Steve's brothers Niall and Jeremy.

Speaking at Steve's memorial, Prof. Dominic Rowe AM from Macquarie University, an expert in the study of MND told us, "you don't die from it, it kills you". Sadly, not much is known about the triggers for MND, some environmental, but amazing research is being done out at Macquarie University.

To further mark Steve's passing and to raise awareness of MND, a BBQ was set up at extreme low tide on 5 December 2021 on Sow and Pigs Reef attended by five of Steve's sailing mates who had a few beers and snags in his honour. We reefed after getting out of the heads. After a while, we started getting 25kn gusts. Every time we considered reducing headsail area, the wind would drop back to 16-17kts. At some stage after lunch, a 28kt gust hit and the head sail was ripped out of the foil.

The wind was strongest around 4pm with a 34kt gust around Norah Head. At this stage, the auto tiller attachment pin broke off and we hand steered the rest of the way. We rounded Bird Island at around 4:45 and passed Long Reef on the way back around 8:30pm. The wind dropped to 9-10kts at this stage.

After crossing finish line at around 11pm, we turned the engine on to motor back to the marina, but the engine overheated with smoke coming out. We turned the engine off and had to sail into the marina pontoon under main, zig zagging among the moorings. Peter was quick thinking to use the sheets as mooring lines and jumped on to the pontoon to secure *Crux*. Another of Peter's ideas was to use the 2hp outboard I had on the boot of my car to tow *Crux* back to the mooring with a dinghy. Any awake locals would have thought that was an amusing sight.





Without any warning except an ear-piercing BANG! the mast of Pensive toppled into the sea just south of Cannae Point in last week's final race, CC5.

To say the crew of four - Bruce, Pam, Chris and the author - were dumbstruck is an understatement. All we could do was sit there, mouths agape, as the tangle of aluminium, wire and sails hit the water in seconds after what appears to be a D1 rigging fitting failure, the mast crumpling at the first spreaders and also just below the deckhead.



Still stunned, we surveyed the mess and soon realised there wasn't much we could do as much of the debris was hanging deep in the water over the side. All the halyards were jammed so retrieving the sails impossible. The weight of shattered mast was being held by the halyards, lifelines and remaining rigging and it couldn't be budged. Cutting it all away wasn't an option, either.







Safely alongside at the Davis Marina work berth it was pleasing to see a throng of MYC members pitching in and helping with the clean-up, lifting the mast and removing the No 3 headsail and mainsail with very little damage. Remarkably most of the clean-up was finished by day's end. Hopefully the repair will be swift and Pensive will be back ASAP!




