

Five MYC juniors, Lily, Kaia, Macie, Emma and Toby spent the first week of their school holidays at Belmont 16s for the 55th Combined High Schools Sailing Championship.

It was an early start Monday morning to make the 12:45 race briefing. A mixture of classes was competing including 16ft and 13ft skiffs, 29ers, different sized Hobies, VeeEsses, a Pelican, a Manly Graduate and strong Flying11 and Laser fleets but the regatta was dominated by O'pen Skiffs with 13 entered.

After the race brief, the afternoon was spent fishing off the wharf waiting for wind that would never come. Racing was abandoned at 14:15 and we headed to the swimming pool.

The next morning, we woke to a cloudy day but finally some wind. Because there are different classes of dinghies of all sizes with different numbers of sails, the races are a lot longer than we are used to. They aim for an hour race which is a long race for O'pen Skiff sailors who are used to 25-minute races. The course is a massive trapezoid with a 1km upwind leg before a reach to what seemed like a 1km downwind leg before another reach to the bottom mark for a decent sized upwind leg to the finish and some hotdog legs thrown in between. That's a lot of race with an extreme amount of both upwind and downwind sailing.

The good news at the 10:00 brief was that they weren't going to include a hotdog for the O'pen Skiff sailors. We hit the water for an 11:00 start for Race 1 in an 18kt SE breeze.



Race 1 was a good race and in the breeze, we were around the course in 35 minutes despite what felt like 5' waves. We were happy with our sail until we realised, we hadn't signed on. A hard lesson to learn. Not even throwing mum under the start boat and putting the blame squarely on her with the RO worked ,and a 9^{th} became an 18^{th} , a 25^{th} a 31^{st} .

Signed on for the Race 2, we took to the water with slightly less wind and a lot less chop which made for a nicer race, which was good because someone at the front of the fleet mistook the wing mark for the top mark and we all followed. A 1km upwind leg became a 3km leg. Another hard lesson learnt. Don't always follow the leaders and top sailors as they aren't always sailing a good race. Well done Emma! It doesn't matter why you tacked, you had the best race strategy of the whole fleet and congratulations for holding onto 2nd.

We finished the second day exhausted but happy we finally got to go sailing.

We woke up the third day to find the rain had caught up with us and, unfortunately, the wind was gone. We took to the water for the 11:00 start of Race 3 but after half an hour were sent back in for some Continued on next page ...

bad weather to blow over. We weren't in long enough for lunch before a 12:30 start for Race 3 was announced and we scrambled to get back on the water and out to the start boat.

The tricky conditions of the day continued with Race 3 starting in a 10knt NE breeze which faded during the race. The good news is that most of the O'pen Skiffs were through the race before the wind disappeared. We then had an hour wait for the rest of the fleet to finish. We watched boats stall metres from the finish line with one Hobie looking like it was going backwards.

A long wait for O'pen Skiffs means time for fun pirating each other's boats and turtle islands. The boys off the Pelican decided to join in sneaking a sail on some of the abandoned O'pen Skiffs while we tried to take the Pelican for a sail. When the race was finally finished the AP flag went up keeping us on the water for another half an hour before the rest of the day was called off.







To escape cabins full of wet gear the O'pen Skiff fleet opted to meet for a night out at the Belmont 16s for burgers and trivia. We might get to compete on the water, but the parents owned trivia. *Team Bictory* finished tied so had to go on a tie breaker round to come 3rd.

Well done!

Despite being delayed because of COVID and tricky because of the weather, another good MYC Junior season wrapped up on Saturday 30 April with a mini regatta.



A few sailors who we have met at regatta's over the season and who love sailing at Manly were invited to join us. To make a day of it, some of the Saturday fleet took the visitors on a tour of the beaches as they usually only see a triangle of marks in North Harbour. There wasn't much wind, so we took the two small RIBS and five O'pen Skiffs to share. We didn't make it far but had fun mucking around towing and pirating off Quarantine Beach. The little bit of breeze we did have ran out and a tow back to the deck was needed to make it back in time for the mini regatta.

The overwhelming request at RO Geoff's mini regatta brief was for the O Flag.

The fleet wanted to go sailing but the season had thrown its biggest curve ball yet, an afternoon with not a puff of breeze. The fleet needed everything Rule 42 of the Racing Rules of Sailing banned. Pumping, rocking, ooching, sculling, and excessive manoeuvring.

It was a slow sail out to *Carlyle* and by the first warning signal any puff of breeze there had been was gone. The first challenge was to get behind the start line for the start of the first race!



Then it was on to get to the top mark. Sailors stood up pumping, others tried fishtailing (but who is that fit), others hanging off the back of their dinghy kicking, and others decided they could swim and tow their dinghy faster. They call the O Flag the cheat flag, so it seemed acceptable when halfway to the top mark a couple of sailors sneakily tied their dinghy to the back of another and took a break while someone else swam towing them and their dinghy as well.







Geoff was ambitious and went for a second race. What he called "near zephyr conditions", apparently a "soft gentle breeze" (there must be a fan on *Carlyle*), was disputed by the fleet but his call for the top mark to be brought closer was welcomed.



SAILABILITY MANLY



OFFSHORE GOOD FRIDAY PITTWATER RACE - PARLE CUP





The Good Friday Pittwater Race started with a briefing at Davis Marina, where it was agreed that due to the lack of breeze, the committee boat *Carlyle* would head somewhere in the vicinity of the Junction Buoy to start the race.

Carlyle settled south of the Junction Buoy, laying the MYC start buoy to port. The strong outgoing tide and the lack of breeze made it difficult for the competitors to position themselves behind the line.

With less than a minute to the start, San Toy performed a jibe which

didn't succeed. The battens on the giant windsurfer sail, failed to invert, and this, plus the tide, meant she slowly drifted

to the start pin with no steerage. An ignoble start as *San Toy* dragged the pin some 50 metres before crew could untangle the buoy from the rudder. However, that 50 metres was sufficient to put *Kryptonite* behind the line so she could start. In the meantime, *Jupiter* managed a clean start, while *San Toy* performed a penalty 360, and *Enigma* explored the other side of the Junction Buoy.

Jupiter and San Toy were in touch for a good portion of the race but Jupiter outpointed San Toy to lay last headland. Jupiter across the line first but on handicap in 3rd spot behind new boat to the club, Flight in 1st and San Toy 2nd.





In 2019 a small group of members formed a consortium to help our Junior Program grow by purchasing 9 Small Rig Open Skiffs (SROS) - formerly known as BICs - which they loaned to the club.

These SROS have been an integral part of our junior program giving hundreds of kids each year the ability to improve their sailing ability and have been critical to solving the gap between our beginner Optis and the Full Rig Open Skiff.

The total project cost for the new **SROS** boats was **\$26,500**.

Our plan was to apply for grants to be able to purchase these boats from the consortium to give our next generation of sailors the opportunity to participate in a fun outdoors family orientated sport in the beautiful sailing waters surrounding Manly.

But in the last two years we have been unsuccessful. So, we have set up a fundraising campaign via the Australian Sports Foundation so that all donations are tax deductible.




