

COMMODORE'S REPORT

The December January period is usually a quiet time for sailing at MYC but not for all members.

Quite a few members participate in the Iconic Sydney to Hobart race. This year we had 3 MYC yachts enter - *Supernova*, *Crux* and *Mondo*.

Two out of the three made it to Hobart with *Crux* doing exceptionally well by winning the IRC Division 3.

Mondo found itself smack bag in the middle of Bass Straight with a broken gooseneck causing the boom to fall off the mast. As usual the conditions of Bass strait were quite treacherous. Four other yachts lost their rudders as well as other boats experiencing significant damage. Lisa (skipper of *Mondo* and President of MYC) has already declared that *Mondo* will be back this year to have another go. If you are interested, find a *MONDO* crew and they will tell you the whole saga.

SHELLHARBOUR

The Manly to Shellharbour test race was conducted with 3 yachts on Australia Day this year.

The event was quite successful. The hosting marina was of high standard and were very cooperative. 22 sailors enjoyed the hospitality at Shellharbour.

We tested the rolling start concept and that worked well with the fleet motoring to just off Botany Bay before starting which allowed all of the competitors to finish in daylight thus ensuring that we can run this race as a CAT 4 event in the future.

AUSTRALIA DAY 2023 LOCAL HERO

SPORTSPERSON OF THE YEAR:

Evie Saunders of Freshwater has been sailing since the age of eight for Manly Yacht Club and in recent years became a coach there. Her passion, and drive, has seen her compete in the Youth World Championships, the Open Women's World Championships, various State Championships and she has qualified for the Youth Australian Sailing Team to compete in the Youth World Championships, winning silver. She was the only Australian medallist and the first female to podium at this event in 14 years. Last year she was awarded the Australian and NSW Youth Sailor of the Year. Her current world ranking is 149 in the open category. Her goal is to compete in the Olympics, and she is well on her way.

J24 AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

5TH - 8TH JANUARY 2023

J24

Australia

Ahh yes, the J24 Nationals! Qualifiers for the Worlds in Greece.

The brochure painted a picture of fresh NE winds, slight seas off the coast of Cronulla. Racing was to be over 4 days consisting of 12 windward/leeward races (2 drops). Hotly contested this year, as everyone wanted a ticket to Thessaloniki Greece. 18 boats entered - 6 from Victoria - and any boats considered

for ticket to Greece had to finish in the top 12.

The first 2 days of racing were abandoned because of high winds (30-40knots) and big seas. The RO was under pressure to get a series in so took us out halfway across the bay on the Saturday to our start line - trying for a true race angle. The sea was monstrous and though the wind had dropped to around 25knots, it was difficult to manoeuvre the J's with the sea state. Most of us went into survival mode - except for the big guns, of course.



That Saturday was at best, unpleasant, and at worst, ridiculous for the J's to race - but none the less, there was a fleet that made it around for the 3 races, albeit quite diminished by the end of the day with damaged boats and injury. The youth team from MYC made it around the whole day!


We (the girls' team) + Rob (trimmer - ailing with seasickness from well before the start) we're not at full steam as noted. Then after our first rip roaring downwind leg (no spinnaker) with Cath Rofe hanging off the side of the boat goose winging the head sail and me yelling "hold on !!" one

hundred times we jibed to negotiate the port gate. After the jibe we were surfing down a wave and were picked up and tossed down the face, ending in a Chinese jibe (all caught on camera, of course!) Two of the crew had head knocks and Lyn, a fat lip to boot. I decided to call it quits for the day.



Sunday was the brochure day which we enjoyed very much. We nailed a couple of the starts and felt we raced well. Tactical errors got everyone. Most of the fleet still had jibs on but the sea had abated to a congenial 1-2mtrs. We were in the mix mid fleet most of the racing but couldn't get any impressive runs on the board. The crew Cath, Lyn, Lee, Dee, Rob and I gelled nicely for the day but with our first day wiped we were never going to be in the running for a place for Greece. Disappointing, but that's life!

Turns out the 8 places might be well reduced due

GENE SCOTT 1939 - 2022

AN ABSOLUTE GENTLEMAN



Manly Yacht Club records show that Gene Scott joined the club in 1982. Very

Manly Yacht Club records show that Gene Scott joined the club in 1982. Very quickly he showed what an asset to the club he was and by 1986 he became Vice President to Doug Ebeling before taking on the presidency from 1987 to 2002. The club at this stage was at near insolvency. The concrete deck had been completed but the lower deck needed a lot of repairs, replacing of pylons and re-planking.

Gene took over and, with Bob Rowland, began to build some fund-raising activities utilising the new deck and refurbished main hall. At this stage the Club Captain, Colin Cameron, took responsibility for the upgrading of the wharf structure with his professional expertise. The club was now being raised by its bootstraps and Gene succeeded by gentle persuasion to mould a new club with the help of new Commodore, Bruce Davis, who revitalised the sailing program, and Chris Shead and Keith Woodward who took over the club maintenance.

In 1998 Sailability approached Gene about allowing 3 boats to be stored at the Club and so our long association with Sailability began.

As the 2000 Sydney Olympics approached Gene was on the Towards 2000 committee.

At the end of Gene's tenure as President, MYC had a 20-year lease at low rates; several moneymaking activities had been established which ensured financial viability; and club parents were beginning to rebuild a Junior fleet with other centre boards. Gene had effectively reorganised a viable sailing club from a very shaky position. After his presidency, Gene served on many sub committees within the Club, was made a Life Member of the Club and in 2003 was appointed to the Board of AYF. At all times until his illness he was a good supporter of the club and a mentor to many. His "gentle persuasion" found your editor with the job of Vice Commodore and then Commodore for 6 years between 2006-2012, with always an offer to "renew my contract" for another 10 years. I'm sure other members can also relate to his gentle persuasion.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This is the last Newsletter until February, 1990. Another decade has gone by and I'm sure it would be accurate to say that members of the MYC who have been around the Club longer than I have could never have imagined the great strides and progress that has taken place. The MANLY YACHT CLUB in a considerable less period than a decade has transformed itself into an organisation that is visible, active, competitive and is the envy of many of its contemporaries.

For those who enjoy sailing and the water may we continue to enjoy the MYC and all it has to offer.

I would like to wish all members a very happy Christmas and a successful, happy and prosperous 1990.

WHAT ABOUT GENE THE SAILOR?

One of Gene's first boats in the late 70's was *Karen*, a Julie-class 20-footer (later sold to club member Peter McDonald) which Gene used to teach his young family to sail; *Sarah* an Endeavour 24; *Felix* a Soling which, due to it being an Olympic class boat, was part of the popularity for the Soling fleet and the start of the Toto Cup Mini Regatta at MYC as we approached the 2000 Olympics.

There is a picture in the MYC hallway of Gene sailing Felix. Felix was sold to club member Julian McPherson (who now owns Kia Kaha with Andrew Watt). Julian says he will not forget that Gene was the reason he got into sailing. Tachi was another of Gene's Solings - a bit more highly spec'd than Felix; and finally, his beloved Cavalier 975 - Aussie Rules which won some races and series in its time at MYC.



Sail number MYC1 was proudly flown on her sails. This sail number, rather than being arbitrarily assigned, was auctioned at a fund raiser for the Club. It was only fitting that Gene "won" the bidding and carried that sail

number until Aussie Rules was eventually sold.

When he wasn't sailing on his own boats, Gene was having great adventures on Bruce Hitchman's yacht Pacific Breeze... I'm sure Brian Wilson remembers midnight, 31 Dec, just 200m short of the finish line in the 1994 Sydney to Hobart race, deploying the anchor to

> stop Pacific Breeze from drifting backwards and, as the breeze filled in, sending Gene forward to pull on the anchor to provide a slingshot effect over the line. The tactic didn't work but Brian will forever remember the image of Gene, arms going like pistons as he hauled that anchor up.

> > And then there was that rescue of 3 people in a rubber duckie off Wollongong in 40 knot winds, returning from the 1988 Sydney to Hobart race...

I'm sure "Mad Dog" (Peter McDonald) and Brian Wilson and many of the other people who crewed with Gene, will have many more tales to tell.

Special thank you also to John Crawford for essential delivery support; Dave West for training and particularly Nicola from Manly Sailing for promoting the juniors to the "grown up" yacht owners.

COFFEE, TEA, BONOX?







These three words may mean nothing to most of you. To those who were fortunate enough to be part of the long sailing campaign of the mighty Farr 38 *Pacific Breeze*, this phrase became synonymous with the great "Lord Gene" Scott.

As all offshore sailors get to quickly realize during those long, wet, dreary, storm tossed nights or even the dead flat breathless drifters; there's usually one member of the crew who takes charge. Not in a "mutiny of the bounty" sense, rather, the important task of helping pick up crew morale, and keeping an eye on their health and well-being.

Gene may already have been awake for 18 hours; damp, sticky and tired. Instead of going to his bunk for some well-earned rest, he always thought of his crew mates first. In these pitch black, sloppy conditions with the odd greenie running over the decks, it was Gene who constantly stepped up.

The top storm board would slide open and in Gene's baritone, well-heeled voice, the trifecta of heavenly heated beverages would be announced: "Tea, Coffee, Bonox?". That was all he would say, and that's all he had to say, to raise the heads of the dishevelled masses in the cockpit.

I've sailed offshore with lots of mates and that one crew member on a voyage that thinks of his fellow crew mates before his own comfort, is worth his weight in Rum. This was "Lord Gene". Always calm, cool and collected. He became one of the most important members of the motley bunch who used to race on Captain Hitchman's 38-footer.

As for inshore races, Gene had a few yachts in his life; *Karen*, *Felix* and *Aussie Rules*. Of these, he pushed *Felix* the hardest. She was a Soling, back when we had a good size Soling fleet at MYC.

When sailing on the harbour, we all know The Sound can get quite hairy; especially in an open 27-footer in a stinking southerly. Gene was a club stalwart, never missing a chance to pop a kite and get the bone in her teeth no matter the conditions.

Was he any good on the helm I hear you ask? Well, *Felix* wasn't the newest, nor the fastest boat in the fleet, nor did she have the latest sails. The rest of the fleet however became aware very quickly, that Gene was pretty damned good on the end of a tiller and could drive a boat well in any conditions.

To check out how fast Felix was, just look at her name emblazoned on the Honour Boards in the club.

Now Gene had a few more talents than just sailing. Most importantly he hooked Helen. Then together they created a great family, a thriving business, brought the club out of the dark ages, and volunteered for just about everything.

Most of all, Gene Scott was a good bloke.

PS: no one ever opted for the Bonox.

PPS: It should be noted somewhere that in his younger days, Gene was a prolific mountain climber. Due to an injury whilst mountain climbing, we never sent Gene forward of the mast.

In the first heat there was actually a 5 (or so) knot nor'easter and Ian sailed away to take the win. Then


the wind gave up the ghost – and after half an hour, it eventually came out of the SE. Iain was on it and flipped the course and again Mr Saunders drifted fastest.







A NEW OFFSHORE RACE

A GREAT ADVENTURE AND SOME LESSONS

CONTEXT:



Jason Bond developed this new offshore, cruising race while exploring the south coast during 2020 and brought to life with the help of the offshore Race Director, Stephen Teudt, Greg Wilkins, and the Sailing Committee for the 2022/23 offshore series - Sydney Harbour to Shellharbour.

The idea was a "cruising race", 50 nautical miles down the coast to Shell Cove (just south of Shellharbour) on Australia Day. The plan is to make this an annual event.

Shellharbour? Shell Cove? ... Think Wollongong then Port Kembla, then Shellharbour and then Shell Cove. Shell Cove is a very new, machine-dug marina just south of Shellharbour.

If driving, think Albion Park and then turn east.

The race is a Cat 4, which means a day sail with the intention of getting everyone to Shell Cove in time for dinner. This strategy is based on the successful race to a destination model used for the Sydney to Pittwater race each Good Friday, with dinner at the RMYC.

THE RACE:

The start line is between South Head (Hornby Lighthouse) and North Head.

The start time, a respectable 0900.

The wisdom of the race director included an allowance for no wind, or a slight breeze. One of the boats (Enigma was chosen) became the rolling start line with Qa (Peter Lewis and Phil Dressler), Lost Horizon (Brett Hudson) jockeying for position as we headed south under motor until the breeze reached a consistent 10kts. In actual fact this delayed start was used for a spot of morning tea or another round (to keep hydrated).

THE FINISH LINE ... a lesson here in design versus implementation. The design was that a bearing from the boat to Shell Cove breakwater would form the finish line.

The lesson was that the finish line needs a pin end. In practice the bias towards the farthest end of the finish line (260° from the boat), meant that the shortest distance to the finish line was to travel south east from Sydney Harbour for about 20 nautical miles.

GETTING EVERYBODY TO DINNER ON TIME:

Because different boats would sail at different speeds, in this cruising race, each boat if they believed they would not be able to finish the race under sail and get to dinner on time, could photograph their lay/long position, log the time, and then motor the rest of the way to Shell Cove. This result would then be calculated by the handicapper to determine the overall race results. In practice, the alteration to the finish line made the calculations for the race results a lot more complex than expected.

THE EXPERIENCE:

FROM ON-WATER REPORTER ISABEL RAWLENCE:

Dolphins everywhere as we began the rolling start off the Heads, Enigma (Jason Bond), motored south at 6kts until 10kts consistent wind, boats in radio contact, agreed start time of 10.30am with full start sequence called by Muir Watson on Enigma; the race was on. A steady 10kts nor'easter meant the prepared and waiting spinnakers had their chance to burst into life. Enigma and Ça Va had symmetrical kites up and followed the coast approximately 5 nm offshore, Lost Horizon flew their assy which took them further and further offshore until they were quite literally lost (over the) horizon. A clear sky, hot and sunny, calm sea state; Enigma's crew of 11 quickly relaxed into racing formation: some snoozing on the foredeck in the shade of the kite or others aft under the 'racina' Bimini.

Over dinner, the three skippers agreed to see who could get back to Sydney first the following day based on the forecast 25kts southerly and a 3m swell.

ISABEL: Enigma had just five onboard and gamely set the S4. "A heroic decision Skipper..." In a seastate-with-attitude, some "eventful" sailing, and an "eventful" dousing, we brought the S4 down, poled out the J3 and tracked north very nicely at 8kts. The crew could breathe again. Lost Horizon jibed, converged & crossed Enigma, swapped to their symmetrical kite, pulled ahead at Garie Beach and shot ahead, this time it was Ça Va who disappeared from sight out to sea behind us.



Horizon finished 1^{st} , Enigma 2^{nd} - passing Hornby lighthouse at 5:13pm. Just as the crew started to reach for refreshments, the skipper announced we were just in time to keep sailing and aimed for the start line for the Friday Twilight race! The rain eased and we enjoyed a golden evening while keeping a watchful eye out for CaVa's delayed return. Twilight result – Enigma 2^{nd} !



What is a SROS? Small Rig Open Skiff

In 2019 a small group of members formed a consortium to help our Junior Program grow by purchasing 9 Small Rig Open Skiffs (SROS) - formerly known as BICs - which they loaned to the club.

These SROS have been an integral part of our junior program giving hundreds of kids each year the ability to improve their sailing ability and have been critical to solving the gap between our beginner Optis and the Full Rig Open Skiff.

The total project cost for the new **SROS** boats was \$26,500.




